From October, for because of infantile paralysis the opening of school was postponed for a month, to June the days fled smoothy and surely, leaving no marks.

Then came our Sophomore year and we went into things with vim. At the very start we elected class officers. Committees were then appointed and we chose our colors and pins, which were designed by a member of the class. As individuals, our members showed a tendency for winning prizes and silver cups. Our country was in the war, so with true E. O. spirit we did not only our bit but every bit we could possibly do. Our class subscribed to the utmost in all things. We had men in the service and our

Liberty Bonds and War Savings Stamps were in back of them. Again when Uncle Sam wanted boys to do farm work, over fifty per cent. of the boys enrolled in the Boys' Working Reserve and the Junior Industrial Army. But time moved swiftly and we entered our Junior year.

Hardly had the year begun, when school closed for a month while influenza was at its height. Despite our hopes to the contrary, school was resumed about November first only to have the first week broken up by false news of peace and the second week by the actual signing of the armistice with Germany on the eleventh.

The Juniors quietly, unobtrusively entered activities and soon took charge of them. We started the Camouflage Club and disguised everything but the fact that it was a

success. The football team boasted three Juniors, one of whom was the "star" in our great Thanksgiving Day game. Committee dances were held frequently throughout the year and foremost in our memory is the Junior-Senior Prom. The remembrance of our athletics and our admiration for the heroes of the Gridiron, Track and Diamond will always remain deep in our hearts. Then the end—Our Class Night—an original and splendid idea worked out by a committee of class members, Our Graduation and it's over. But "Oh! ain't it a grand and glorious feelin'" to have been a Senior?

Football



THE 1919 football season was one of the greatest ever enjoyed at East Orange High School. The season was one of the most successful, although the last game was a hard joit and spoiled a marvelous record.

When we think back to the early days of September, and recall the meeting for the candidates for football, how surprised we were to see the number of boys present. Most of these fellows had never been out for the team before and had played little football. We may also look back at the first day of practice, an extremely hot day, but the boys turned out just the same. There were at least seventy-five fellows, and with no two clad alike, in fact many dressed in very peculiar fashion. Yet it was these fellows who came out regularly, practiced hard, and fought eagerly, that formed the fine and praiseworthy eleven that represented E. O. H. S. on the gridiron the past season.

Yet who was responsible for all this? The same man who is responsible for the excellent teams we have year in and year out. "Grosie" whipped into shape one of the most formidable teams in the state, out of all that green material that showed up the first day. Yes it certainly is "Grosie," the man behind it all, who deserves great credit. In the practise before the first game, he was continually behind the team, giving suggestions, spurring the fellows on, making changes, and giving every fellow a chance. And that was a difficult task for there were so many fellows to be tried out for the various positions, and there were but few veterans who held down regular posi-

tions. In fact Scriggins was practically the only man who had played quite regularly last year. However, Sanderson, Deignan, McGee and Menzel all had played in a number of games last season and were put right into regular places on the first team.

It seemed a very short time between the first practice and the first game, in which we were all anxious to see how the eleven would shape up. Our team showed its great power and skill by defeating Yonkers 18-0, as it did throughout the entire season. In our next contest, the game with the alumni, which resulted in a tie 0-0, the team showed it could take punishment from bigger, older, and more experienced players. In the third game we successfully defeated Lakewood 26-0.

It appeared that the Phillipsburg game would be a hard tussle, for they were noted as being a very formidable team. However, the High School disposed of them, defeating them by the decisive score of 34-0. We also expected to have a bad time with Trenton. The team of the capitol city was not as strong as that of the preceding year and they went home beaten 26-0. Asbury Park, also a team up till that time unscored upon, offered little resistance to the Blue and Red, who showed their superior strength in the score 17-0. Montclair proved easy for us although it was not until the second half of that game that we really started and piled up the 38 points. Dickinson also fell easy prey, as was shown by the high score of 36-0. Montclair Academy fought hard and kept us down to 6 points. This game started the slump that

ensued until Thanksgiving Day when Barringer so decisively defeated us to the tune of 29-7. This, of course, was a great surprise and disaster for us, although as we think back over it all Barringer did outplay us, she was the stronger team. Barringer had received her defeats in the beginning of the season and had worked up to the highest point of efficiency while we seemingly dropped.

Anyone and everyone who saw that game certainly wants to see the next one and see East Orange come back strong, and come out with the large end of the score.

Yes we all want to see that but we won't or at least not at Ashland Field unless you all know the answer, that is unless we get that stadium so lets all boost it.

From Thanksgiving Day to the present we were all rather hurt about our defeat but certainly we should be elated for the high standing team we had. The reason for having this fine showing is probably two-fold. The coaching of "Grosie" and the captain-ship of Deignan.

THE CUP SERIES

This year one of the greatest attempts in sporting was tried in our school, namely, the formation of a league for fellows not on the first or second teams in football.

This year it was decided to form a league, composed of the smaller, and underclassmen to play for a cup. This idea is indeed a remarkable one in view of the fact that it starts fellows out for the team early. They get the experience and coaching in their first years so that later they have more of a chance for the first team. It also keeps the squad large and furthers the interest of the boys who don't get into the big games.

It was decided about the middle of the season this year to select two teams and to have these teams play for a cup. The fellows elected Stevenson and Wilson for captains and these two chose their teams.

The first game resulted in favor of Stevenson's "Bearcats." The next was a tie, and also the third game, so that it was decided to play still a fourth game. This game Stevenson's team also won, thus gaining the cup.

TWO years ago the students of the East Orange High School instituted a new organization. It was called the East Orange High School Association, or the General Organization. Next year, the boards will not experience a complete change, as the lower classmen will fill the vacant positions. A prosperous and brilliant career for “The News” is confidently looked forward to.



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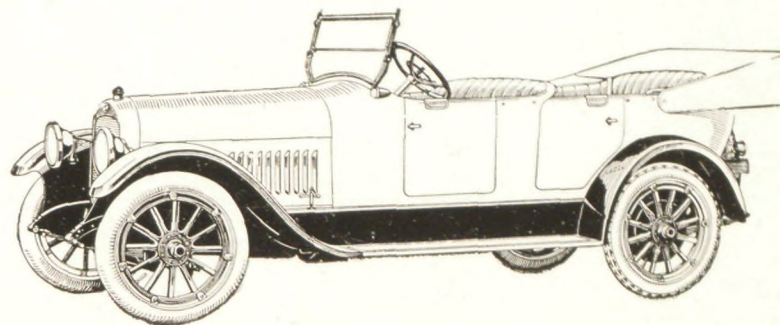
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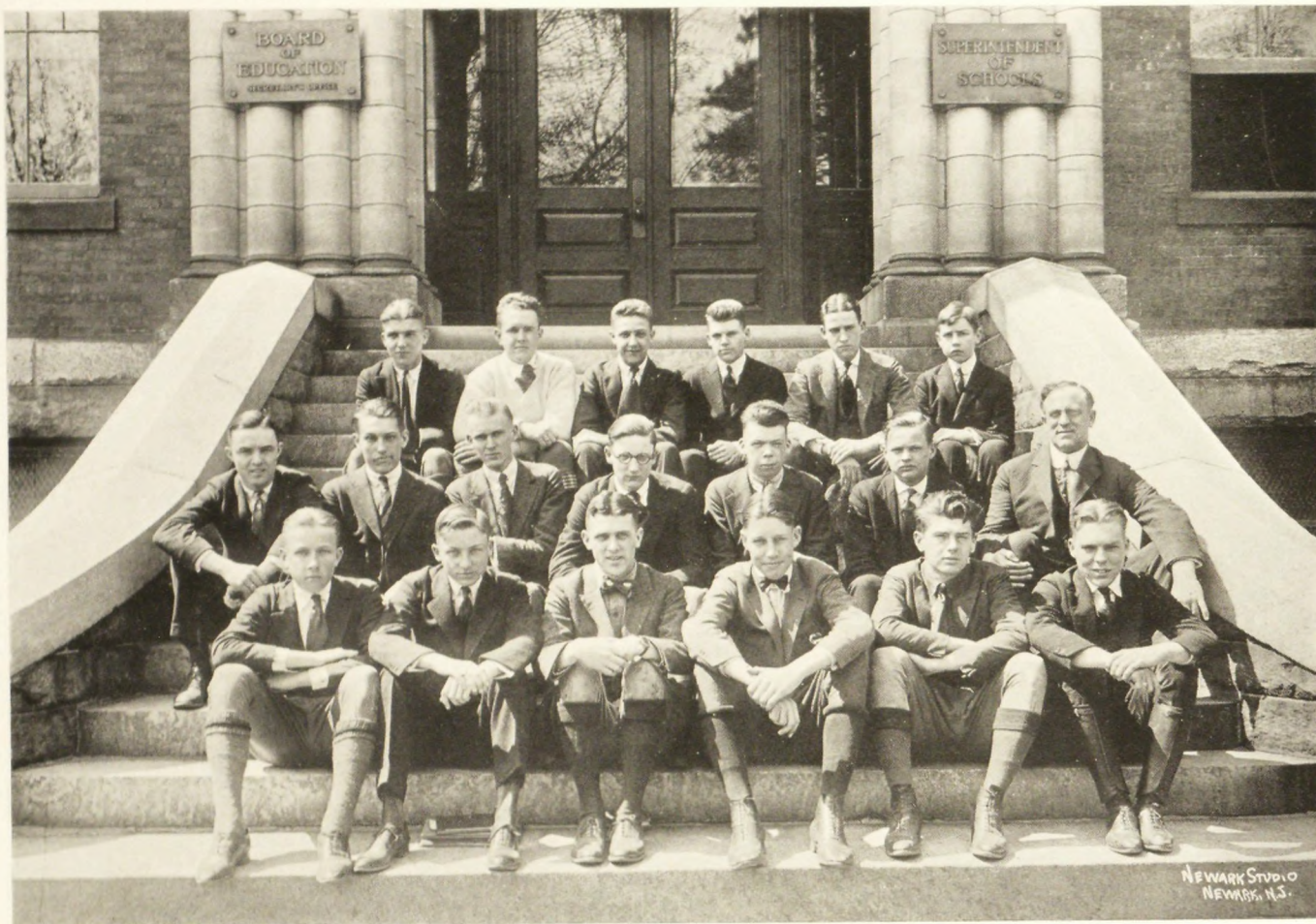
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Junior-Senior Prom

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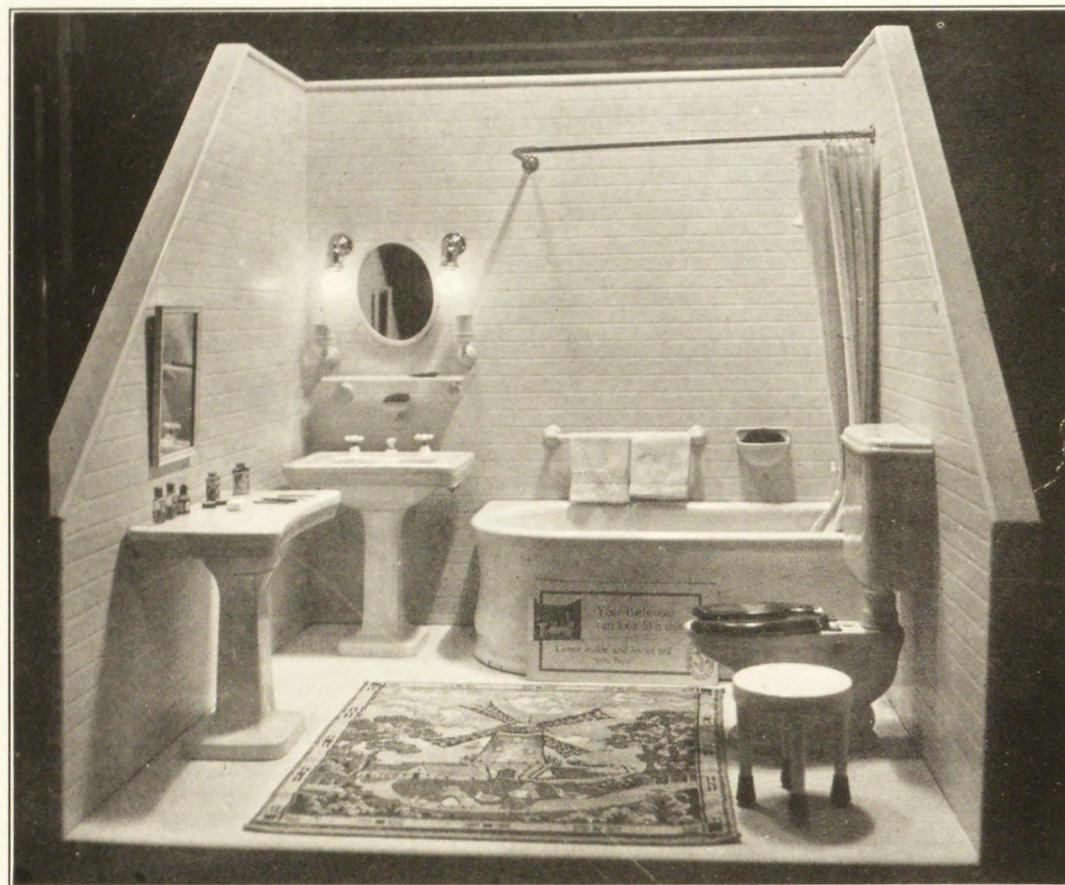
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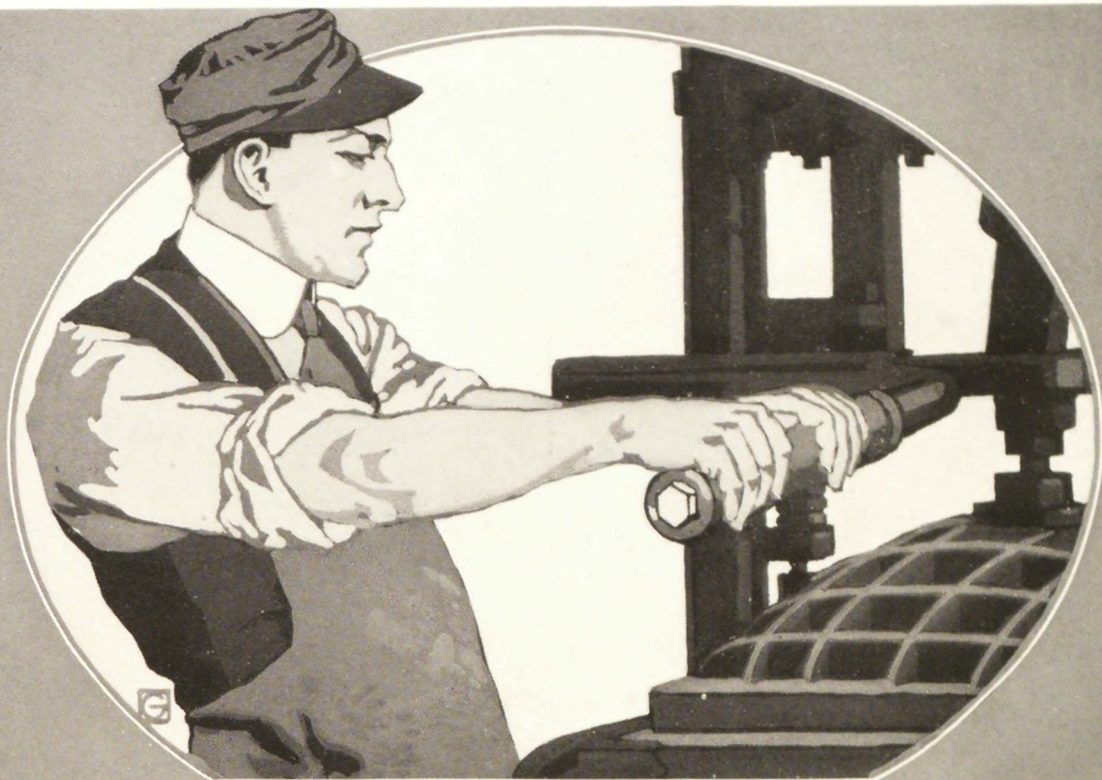
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
