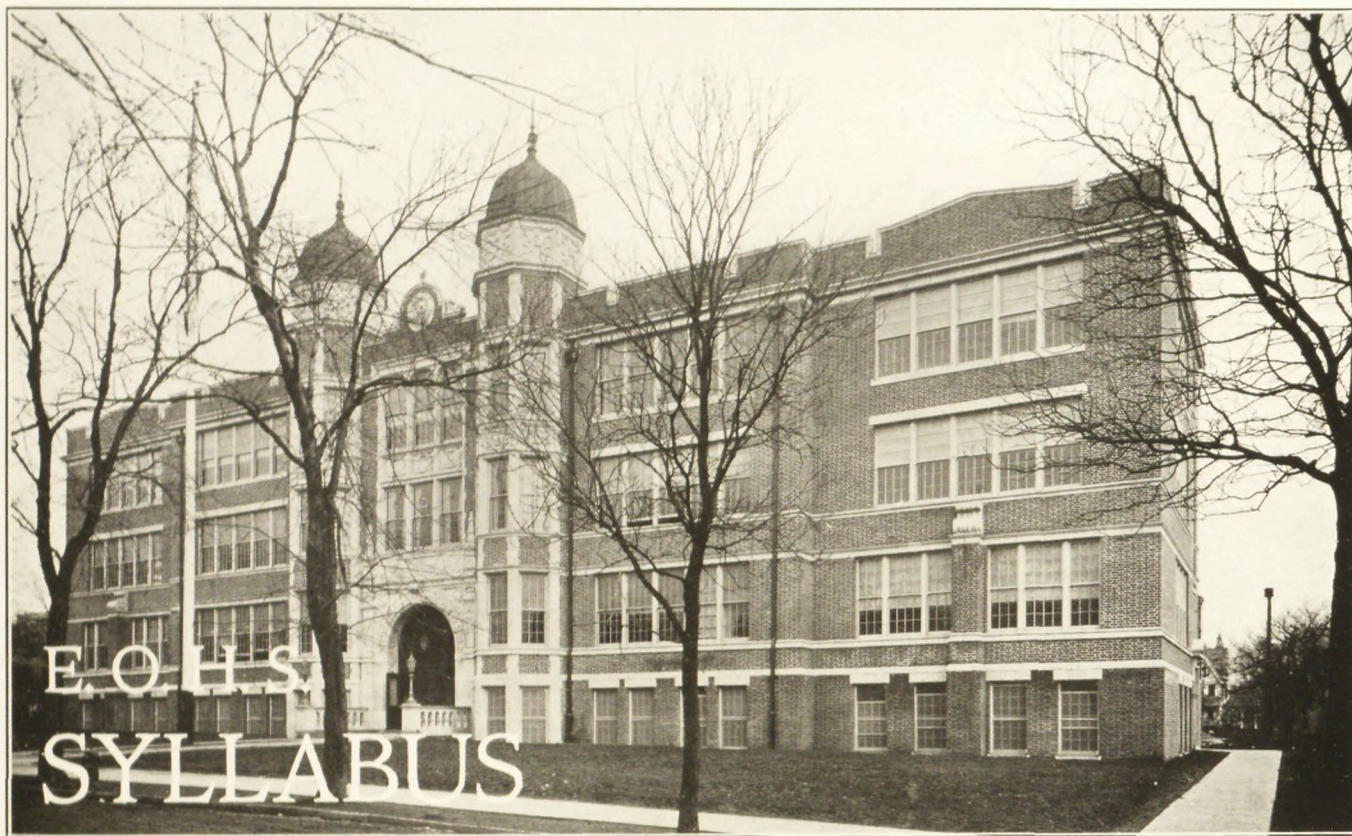

IN 1917 the East Orange High School Association or General Organization was formed. This is a union of the various organizations of the High School with a governing body called the Student Council. The power of the organization is increasing yearly as affairs and needs arise in which it is required to act.

The Association, as a whole, has not done anything very important during the year, but the meetings of the Student Council have been exceptionally busy ones. This governing body has full charge of all activities in the school, consequently the following will be a summing up of the work done by the Council.

At the first meeting of the Council, a Ways and Means Committee was appointed for the purpose of backing up new and miscellaneous problems. The first question to be brought up was that of the Corridor Patrol, which was thoroughly discussed before putting it before the student body. Everyone will agree that this was a great step toward student government and has proved a success in many ways. Another problem brought before the Committee was the question of the number of socials each organization should be allowed during the year. It was decided that as many socials as are deserved should be per-

mitted, provided only one of these is financed by the Association Treasury.

A bill was passed by the Student Council stating that no pupil should belong to more than two clubs meeting once a week, and not more than three clubs under any conditions. There are a few organizations, however, that are exempt from this ruling. A law of this kind was in great need for many students were doing more than they could properly attend to and still keep up their scholastic standing.

It was found that a new flag and staff were needed for the auditorium, resulting in the appointment of a committee to price flags. Everything was found reasonable and so the Student Council has presented the school with a silk flag which will, perhaps, establish a precedent for the years to come.

During the year, visitors, representing several schools, have attended the meetings of the Council, being interested in forming an organization similar to our own. We feel quite complimented to think that other schools should wish to see how we manage things, and we hope that their faith in us is fully justified.

Many new organizations having been admitted into the school life, we feel that the past year has been most successful.

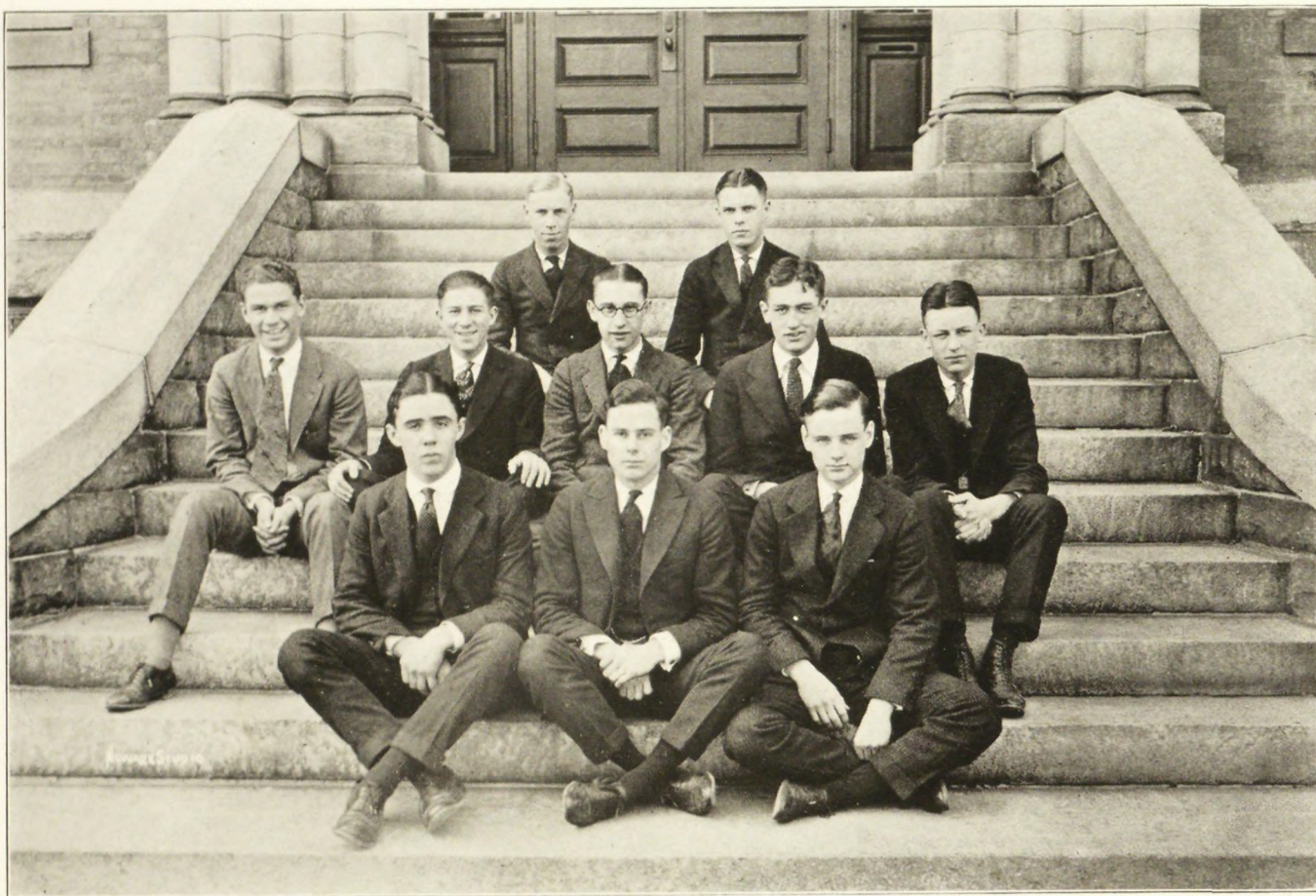

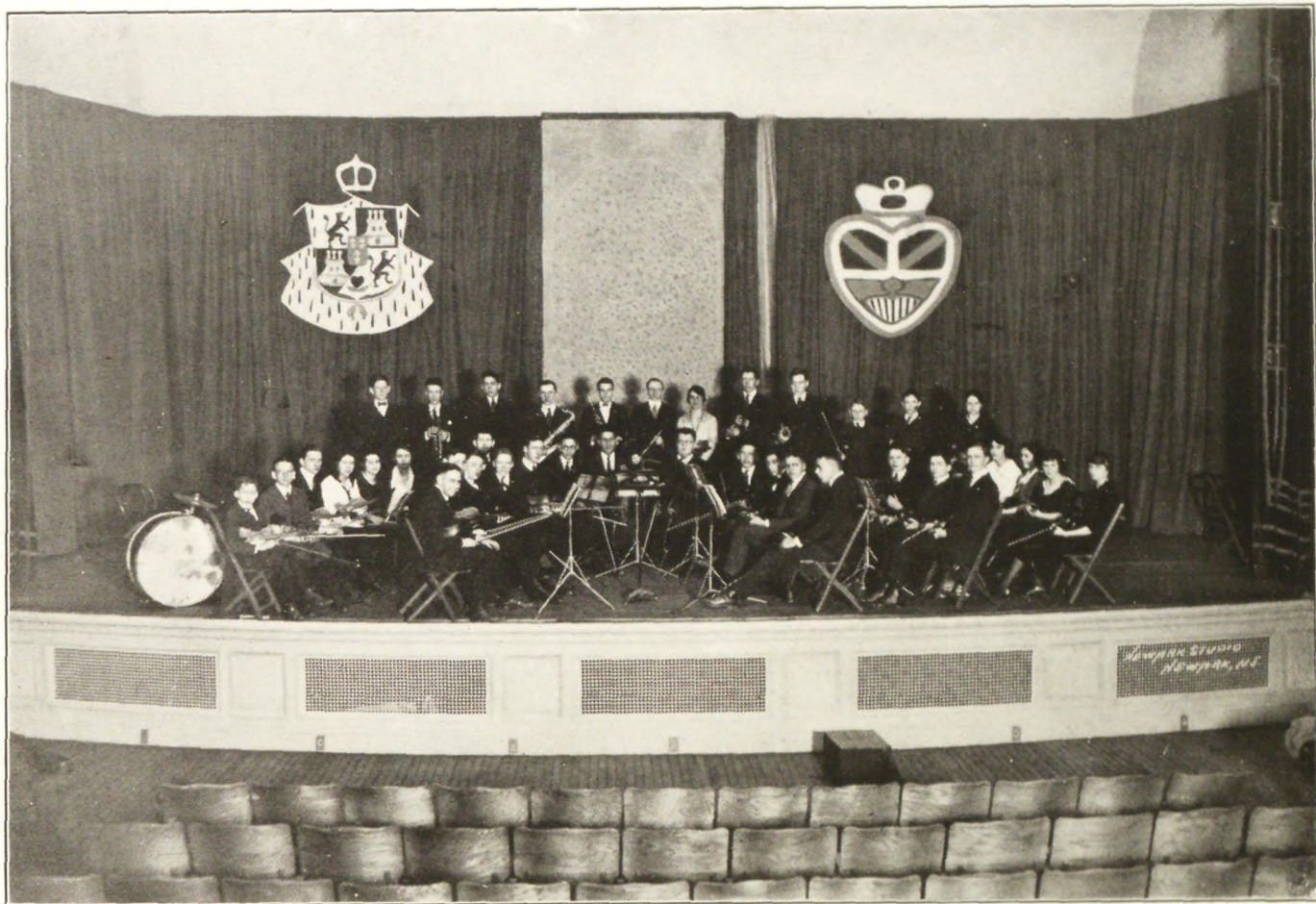

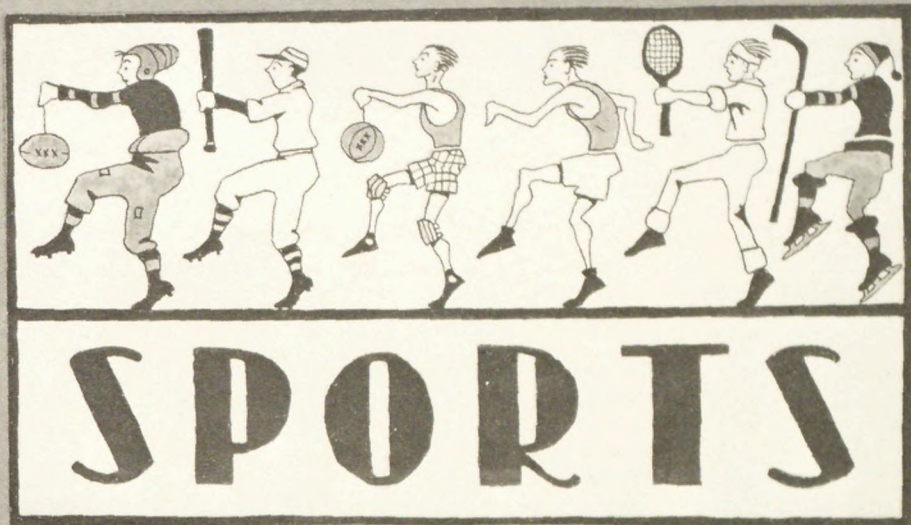
The Pageant

Football, 1920



AST Orange High School in the year past has witnessed one of the most unique football seasons in the history of the school. When the first call for candidates was sounded, back in early September, the usual crowd of fellows responded. There was such an amount of excellent material, that it was most difficult to select the best. As time past a strong team was whipped into shape. Among last year's men, we had Failing, Leigh, Sanderson, Hershey, and McGee, a fine nucleus for a good team. The last two mentioned and also Leigh were on the All-Scholastic eleven of 1919.

On October 2nd we opened our season by slipping one over on our Alumni to the tune of 9 to 0. It was a good game, and showed that we could fight older and more experienced men, successfully. Then our Poly Prep friends of Brooklyn invaded our field and were sent home rather crestfallen at having lost by 13 to 0. In 1919 Poly Prep was crowned champion of the Metropolitan district, but they found more than their match in East Orange. The next game was, with the exception of the Barringer game, the best and hardest fought of the season. The score of 14 to 0, in Princeton's favor, does not indicate the snap with which the game was fought. In this game we received our first serious setback by the loss of Failing, our star quarterback. His physician advised him to stay out for the rest of the season. Then

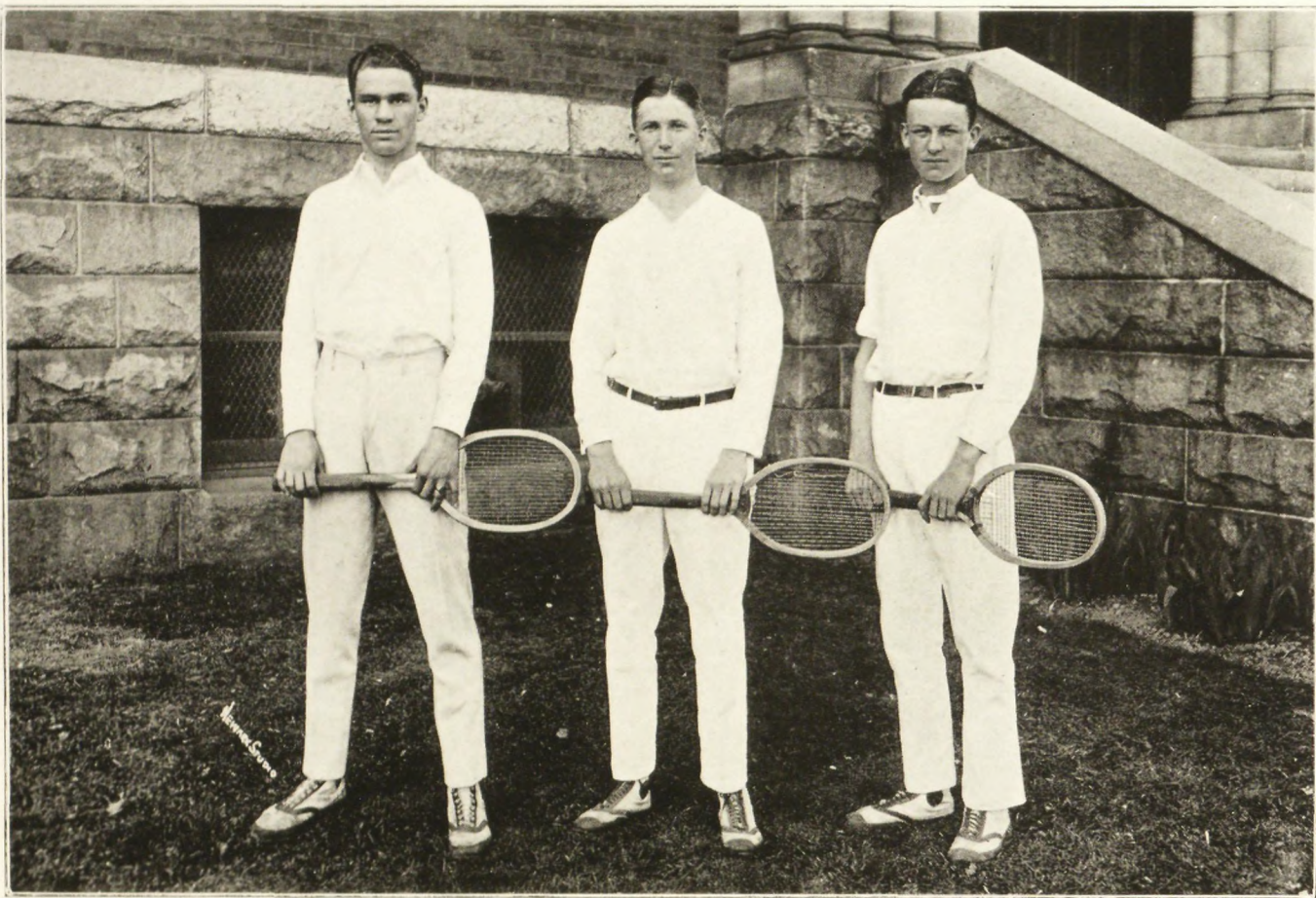
followed the disastrous Philipsburg game, in which we not only lost the game by 3 to 0, but also the services of one of our best halfbacks and captain, Jimmie Sanderson. He suffered a severe break in one of his legs. We fought hard to overcome the little lead of three points, but our opponents fought equally hard and we were forced to lose. In our next game, with Asbury Park, champions of the state, we had only five regular men, the other six being forced to stay out because of injuries. We lost by a score of 24 to 0. Then came our first league game, that with Dickinson. We outplayed them by a wider margin than the score of 6 to 0 indicates. On Election Day the Rutherford team, backed up by many rooters and Joe Basile's band, beat us seven to nothing. Several times we were within the ten-yard line, but at these times the Rutherford team held. The next game was the bitterest defeat of the season. Montclair had never conquered an East Orange team, but in this season of upsets they put one over, defeating us by a score of 26 to 0.

Then the day of all days arrived, Thanksgiving Day. The joyous crowd that thronged our new stadium witnessed a great game. Few of us will ever forget that game with our friendly rivals, Barringer, when Bassett zig-zagged his way through a broken field and tied the score, which was 7 to 7 after the goal was kicked.

Next year we are going to look forward to big things. We will have our old coach Grosie at the helm to coach us, and Jack Failing as captain.
