

Now, perfectly fitted and qualified for the commencement of our life work, we leave the scene of our misdeeds and triumphs to play a greater part in the affairs of the world.



HE largest and most important activity of student life, The E. O. H. S. News, this year reached its highest peak of perfection. A staff that supplied 1,700 students and

their parents with all the news of the school every fortnight is proud to say that not once did the issue fail to appear on time, a record before unequalled. Not once has appeared in the columns of the publication a useless word, or an article that did not represent the highest type of student journalism.

Following a clearly defined policy, The E. O. H. S. News fully developed its stated purpose to "Report Truthfully the School's Activities and to Uphold Its Honor and Traditions."

Legitimate news held the dominant place, but literary and artistic work was likewise encouraged. Especially noteworthy were the ten-page Christmas and Thanksgiving Day numbers, the latter appearing with a football supplement on the first school day after the game. Several excellent articles by members of the faculty, and a series of extremely good cartoons lent additional interest to the newspaper.

The first book ever written by E. O. H. S. undergraduates made its appearance in March, 1922, when "Smiling Thru 'Til Half-Past Two," a collection of cartoons and humorous prose and verse written by three seniors, was published by The E. The E. O. H. S. News this year has occupied a place in student life that will be hard to duplicate.



Another sensible move was the preparation of the history of the club from the beginning up to the present time. This report fills a long felt need of a complete history of the club.



AST ORANGE HIGH SCHOOL in the past season achieved its long hoped for ambition by winning the Interscholastic Championship of Northern New Jersey. This is the first championship in football received

in the past four years. The season was a distinct success. We lost only one game to another school. A great number of players responded to the initial call in September, most of whom stuck through the entire season. The season's success was due to the conscientious co-operation of Coach Grosenbaugh and the entire team, which included Captain Failing, Taylor, Bayles, Leigh and Knowles of last year. Knowles, Taylor, and Leigh received positions on the All-Scholastic eleven.

September 24th opened our season with a defeat at the hands of our Alumni, but the result of this defeat was shown when the team journeyed to Lawrenceville and under bad weather conditions defeated their opponents 6 to 0.

The next game, with South Orange, was the first one with a Class B team in some time. We conquered the invading team by a score of 20 to 6 after a hard fight. The following game we vanquished Phillipsburg 21 to 0, which avenged our loss of the last year. Then Trenton entered our field with high hopes of eliminating us as contenders for the State Championship. The teams were evenly matched and the result was a tie, 7 to 7.

Montclair came down from the hills with the fond hope of repeating its victory of last year, but the tables were turned when we beat them to the tune of 26 to 21 in a very exciting game.

On Election Day, Dickinson was outplayed and defeated by 28 to 0. Neptune, another aspirant for the state title, having beaten Trenton, was, after a hard battle, finally defeated by 20 to 0. At this game the first moving pictures of our team were taken for state educational movies.

On November 19th we journeyed to Montclair minus the services of Captain Jack Failing and Elliot Leigh, due to the pending game with Barringer. The game was hard fought, but we were beaten by a team that was better than we were at that time, the score being 19 to 6. This defeat had a two-fold effect; it unfortunately broke a long string of victories while, on the other hand,

it was a great factor in the winning of the Barringer game.

Thanksgiving Day soon arrived and with anything but ideal weather conditions to play in our team succeeded in subduing our old rivals by a memorable comeback in the last quarter. During the first ten minutes of play, Barringer picked up a fumble and ran for a touchdown, but failed to kick the goal. Thus handicapped, our team outplayed their opponents in every stage of the game and made a gallant showing by getting two touchdowns


in the final period. The game ended with the score of 14 to 6.
