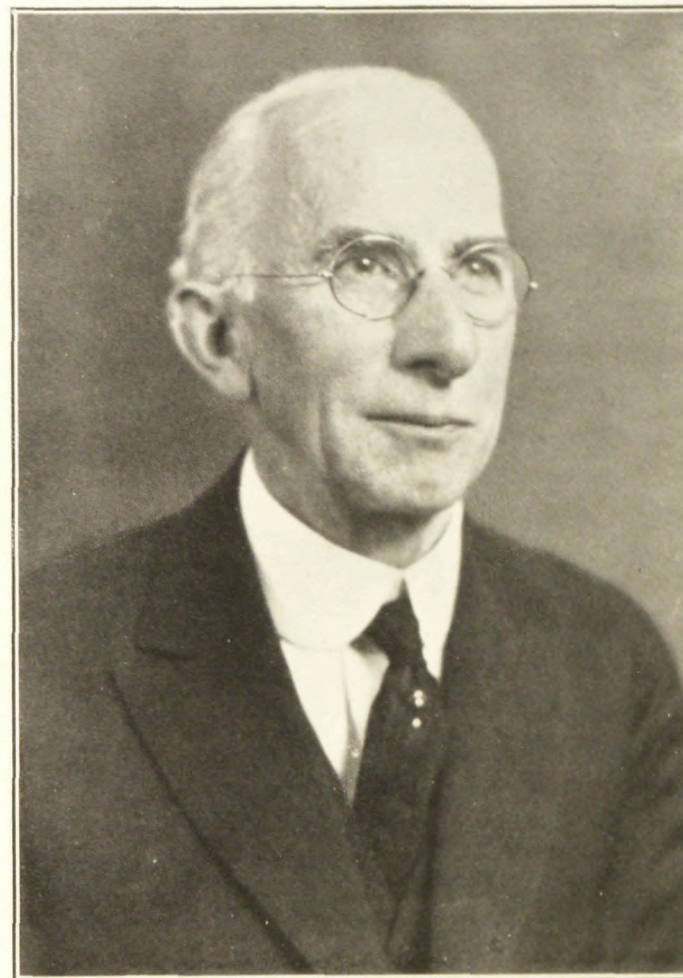

HEN we made our first appearance in E. O. H. S. in 1920, the remainder of the school was thunderstruck. The faculty and office force worked overtime to make room for us. There were over seven hundred green Freshmen to account for, and to be sent strolling about the building on foolish errands under the kind supervision of the Sophs. Despite our greenness, we plunged eagerly into activities. Two of our husky fellowmen obtained positions on the football squad. The track team had a goodly number of our members, one starring in the mile run while another gained honors in the high jump. For the first time in the history of E. O. H. S., the tennis tournament was won by a Freshman. Our subscription to Stadium bonds surpassed those of any other class. The socials that were given were voted a big success. When June came, class officers were elected, and we settled down to chisel our name in the records of the school.

During our sophomore year, more glory was added to the class, when one of our members designed a ring that was adopted by the entire school. This year we boasted about our importance in sports. Six of our group obtained positions on the football squad, four on the baseball team, and many on the track team. We also won the Interclass Basketball Tournament. In the annual debate we defeated the Freshmen; and in the socials, we gained such success that the upper classmen set aside their dignity and attended them.

As Juniors, the Class of 1924 assumed an even more prominent role in school life. Our committee co-operated with the Seniors and made the committee dances an event of the year. In February, the long waited for prom was enjoyed by both classes. As in former years, we more than held our place in athletics. In debating we were supreme. The majority of the debating teams were composed of our fellowmen, and the

When September of the Senior year arrived, we entered the last lap of our journey with the customary dignity and willingness of Seniors to participate in activities. The football team gained honors for us. The committee dances were continued with success, and in February, the Junior-Senior Prom, which had promised to be a failure, turned out to be a glorious triumph for the class. A basketball team was organized after a lapse of seven years, and it had a favorable season. Our debating ability was again displayed when after a desperate struggle Delta Epsilon, composed entirely of Senior boys, defeated Ken Mair. Our ability as actors was displayed in senior dramatics, and the glee clubs showed that our voices had not been neglected.

If, in the days to come, any of us are forced by circumstances and the police, to look forward to a four year term in Sing Sing, we won't be downhearted, but will remember how swiftly the same time passed as a member of the Class of 1924. To be sure, we are not comparing our noble high school to the penitentiary; but in both cases, it can't be denied that we emerge, after four years, a great deal wiser than when we entered.

We, the Class of 1924, have successfully jammed and pushed our way through the subway of learning, and few have been lucky enough to take the ride sitting down. But we've finally arrived at our station, and graduation finds us piling out, up the steps of Life. Some will take them three at a time, and others will climb more slowly, but we'll all finally get to the sidewalk and feel the sunshine of Success.

Student Council



THE record of this year's Council will very likely be entered in the annals of our alma mater as marking an epoch in the advancement toward an ultimate system of student government. The Secretary, in searching through the records of previous years, finds nowhere such important strides as have been taken under the seventh administration.

This great experiment, for it is still an experiment, is the student supervision of study halls. The Student Council, at one of its meetings, resolved to try the plan out in the senior study hall, and if it proved successful to make it a permanent part of our student government. Because the time was so short, it was found advisable not to extend the student supervision, but to leave this important work to our successors.

Three other changes in the old order of things were made. Most important was the Council's work of revising the constitution and by-laws of the E. O. H. S. A. All amendments passed since the beginning of the Association have been gathered together; and, with other changes that were advisable by the Council, have been incorporated in its basic law and organiza-

tion. This is the first revision of those documents ever made.

The second change was in the strict enforcement of attendance regulations as passed by last year's Council. It has fared hard with Council members who have failed to attend the regular meetings this year.

The third change was in the matter of awards. The rifle team developed into so important an organization that the Council decided to award an emblem similar to the cheer-leaders' emblem to members who shot in 90% of the matches.

Finally, a most important work of the Council was to clear up the debt on the student's war memorial. A drive for contributions, ordered and carried on by the Student Council, netted \$252 or about half of the total debt. The Council then donated to the War Memorial Fund \$250, thus practically wiping out the account.

With such a record as testimony, we feel that the clubs and students whom we represent will agree that we have attended to our duties faithfully, and that to those of us who leave they will accord the satisfaction of accomplishment and the privilege of feeling that our work is appreciated.

Football

FROM a hasty glance at the record of the 1923 football team, the casual observer may carry away the impression that last fall East Orange had failed to come up to the standard set in former seasons. This erroneous idea would most likely come from the fact that our greatest rival, Barringer, won the annual Thanksgiving game. On the other hand a more careful observer would notice that the team went through an exceedingly hard season of ten games, losing only two and landing third place in the state ratings.

The first opponent on the schedule was the Bloomfield eleven. This game was typical of early season games and was marked with frequent fumbles and errors, but East Orange with more practice behind it came out on the long end with a 20-0 score.

On the following Saturday, East Orange journeyed to Phillipsburg and humbled the home team by the score of 33-6.

The Phillipsburg team was mostly inexperienced and was below the standard of teams Phillipsburg usually produces.

The game with Trenton High School proved to be a third victory for East Orange. The score was 20-0 and was the result of a straight game of football, neither side using many forward passes.

East Orange won the fourth consecutive game when it took the measure of the Montclair Academy on their own field to the tune of 13-7. This contest was exceedingly hard and was marked by the playing of Owens and D. Clark for East Orange. The field was slippery, and for this reason a few fumbles were made, but the Red and the Blue handled the ball with marked improvement. After this battle had been won, the sport writers began to figure out East Orange's championship possibilities.

The first league game was played with Montclair High

School, and once more East Orange came out on top, the score being 14-7. East Orange received plenty of opposition in this contest and the fans were truly thrilled when Stollwerck of Montclair intercepted a forward pass and raced 75 yards for a touchdown. Montclair fought to the end to tie the score, but was prevented from doing so by the heavy East Orange line.

Plainfield was next encountered and proved to be an easy opponent for the husky East Orange team which won out by a score of 34-6.

East Orange played its second league game with Dickinson on Armistice Day and won out by a score of 33-6. This game furnished plenty of thrills, due to the end running of Roephe and Smith of Dickinson. The latter ran the length of the field for a touchdown on the kick off.

After winning seven straight games and being seriously considered for championship honors, East Orange received a setback

at the hands of Neptune, who afterwards won the state honors. In this game East Orange showed her true fighting spirit and fought right up to the last moment of play.

Orange was next encountered on a wet and muddy field, and the game see-sawed back and forth for three quarters. Then Owen lifted the soaked pig skin over the bar from the thirty yard line.

On November 29 came the fatal championship game with Barringer at Ashland Stadium before the largest crowd ever packed in the field. Although the score was 20-7, the outcome was in doubt until the final whistle had blown. This game firmly established Leigh Owen and Ed Tropp as being of all-state calibre.

Next year with Grosie as coach and Leigh Owen as captain, the team is expected to make an excellent showing, and we sincerely hope that it will be a championship team.
