

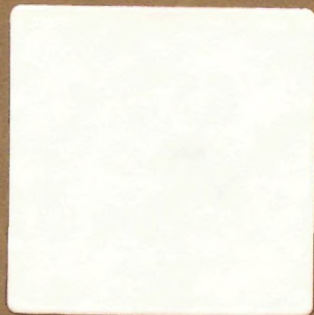

## East Orange High School



AST Orange High School, one of the best in the United States—in reality, one of the three best in the country—and, to us, the best in the world, is a school of which one may well be proud to be a member. To hold a diploma from, or a prominent position in, E. O. H. S., is to be a person of reputation and standing.

In the words of one graduate, "If you are anything at all in East Orange, you would be the whole shooting-match in any other high school."

In 1889, there was no East Orange High School, only several isolated grammar schools with a two-year or three-year high school course. That same year, the schools were consolidated and a board of education chosen. Its first annual report recommended the building of a high school. Land was purchased, and a high school costing \$120,000 was erected. The building was completed in December 1891, and contained ten recitation rooms, two study halls, a drawing room, a chemistry laboratory and a gym. Superintendent Vernon L. Davey was the first principal. In 1898

he was succeeded by Lincoln E. Rowley. Two years later, Charles W. Evans became the head, followed in 1912 by Ralph E. Files, our present principal.

Enrollment in the new school grew rapidly and steadily; and in 1911 a new addition was built, which was in fact, almost a new school.

The present building, with the 1923 gymnasium addition, includes forty-five class rooms, fourteen laboratories, three large study halls, an auditorium, a library of over 5,000 volumes, three health inspection rooms, an infirmary, two gymnasiums, a swimming pool, and a lunch room capable of feeding the entire school.

In 1891, there were four high school teachers and 159 students. Last fall there were 1970 pupils and a faculty of over ninety, many of the latter prominent in state educational circles and other fields.

The scholastic standard of East Orange is high, and practically all colleges accepting certification will take that of East Orange.



In athletics, E. O. H. S. is one of the most consistent rankers in the state. At various times we have held the state championship in every major sport, and that for tennis for nearly twenty consecutive years. Among the nationally famous athletes graduated are Nelson Sherrill, holder of the world indoor pole vault record; Cy Aschenbach, the All-American football star; and Kenneth Appel, ranking national junior tennis player. Edwin (Red) Van Brunt, E. O. pitcher two years ago is signed up with the *Boston Braves* this season.

In student government, school spirit, and initiative, our high school is far in the lead. The student governing body is the General Organization, which is over all the clubs, societies, and teams of the school. It legislates, conducts elections, makes appropriations, and unifies the extra-curricular activities of the entire school. Freshmen are organized under the Freshman Council, and have entire supervision over their study halls. A few years ago, the need of a concrete stadium for Ashland field, the scene of our football encounters, was felt, and an issue of ten dollar bonds

was floated through the schools of the city. The stadium now stands testimony to the activity of East Orange boys and girls.

Mention of a few former members of the school will illustrate the quality of our graduates:

William Beebe, the great naturalist now cruising in the Sargasso Sea, attended E. O. H. S. Ann Harding (our Dorothy Gately) has appeared on Broadway. Winthrop Hearsey is the vice-president of the Bethlehem Steel Company. Burr and Philip Cook, dramatic critic and playwright respectively, were graduated from E. O. H. S. Betty Bronson, of *Peter Pan* fame, and Alan Crosland, who directed *Under the Red Robe*, a million dollar production, also trod our halls. Many others might be mentioned: physicians, clergymen, missionaries, teachers, and men in public office.

Of its origin, growth, present status, and product, East Orange is justly proud, and the present and future graduating classes hope and expect that they will be as worthy alumni of E. O. H. S.

STUDENT Council never becomes glaringly prominent in school life, but the most important tasks of the student government are executed by that body.

This year's Council prides itself not so much on individual achievements, though many are evidences of our work, as the consolidation of the student body, and the creation of a greater participation in extra-curricula activities than ever before.

The actual membership in the G. O. was increased noticeably in comparison with former years, and the clubs reported large improvements in membership and attendance.

The work of the first half-year was undertaken by Leigh Owen as president, but with his withdrawal from school at the mid-year, his place was taken by James Hodge, and Frank Baldwin was elected to fill the office of vice-president.

At the time of writing, the most important step of the year is under consideration. This is the proposed amendment to the constitution to provide for the proportional voting of the classes for the officers of the Council. No definite step has been taken,

but if the proposal is adopted it will radically alter the present student government system.

As was mentioned, the Council has found its chief road for service this year in developing those activities which contributed toward the good of the greatest number of students. In pursuance of this objective, those clubs which had arranged special programs or procured interesting speakers opened their meetings to the entire school, instead of limiting themselves to a small group.

The usual drives and social functions have been carried on with results extremely gratifying to the committees in charge and the Council.

It is not a series of small attainments on which this year's Council bases its work and gives to the students for a record of their trust in them as their representatives. It is rather an entirely new aim in school life, the subordination of the clubs to the benefit of the entire student body. When such a spirit is evolved in a single year, a council may justly consider their task well done.

T is not without a twinge of regret that the class of '25 presents its last history. Four years have passed in rapid succession since our first but not meager history was written. Indeed, these four short years have been happy ones, so happy, that we now truly and more fully sense a spirit of gratefulness to our instructors, who have striven to make these years the more pleasant and profitable.

It was the usual crowd of greenhorn, baby-staring freshmen that came to East Orange High School in the autumn of 1921. But they were, in a measure, more self-assertive than any of their predecessors, for it was not long before a new legislative body in the school, the Freshman Council, was functioning under the guidance of Miss Warner and Mr. Tewkesbury.

The following fall found the class, organized as sophomores, entering into the larger responsibilities of school citizenship as set forth in our East Orange High School Creed. During that year four sophomores played on the football team, while track also had its supporters from the yet young class. Not alone did athletic prowess distinguish the sophomores, for one of them, Howard Gardner, debated on the school team. Moreover, several members held important parts in the operetta, *The Bells of Beaujolais*.

The unique spirit of initiative of the class came to the fore perhaps most prominently during the junior year. The only two East Orange football players to receive all-state honors, Leigh Owen and Edward Tropp, were juniors. The track team was guided by a junior, Frank Smyth, and the baseball team was captained by Mike Rudyanski, another member of the class. The first prominent social event, the Junior-Senior Prom, was an outstanding success.

The senior year began with that confidence which is the heritage of every upper class. The committee dances of the year, run under the leadership of the upper classmen, were some of the best in the school's history. In order to give their ardent support to an entertainment of a more serious nature, the fourth year class decided to give up their expected class performance in favor of the operetta. Practically the whole cast of leading characters was drawn from the senior class to enact *The Maid and the Middy*, an operetta which proved a delightful success. Interest in the annual upper-class dance, the Junior-Senior Prom, seemed enhanced rather than lessened by its postponement until spring. It was a party attended by a large and happy throng.

On May 15 and 16, a costume play, *La Bourgeois Gentil-homme*, by Moliere, was given in English translation for Senior Dramatics. The cast included about sixty talented seniors. The music for the play was composed by Jean Baptiste Lulli, the creator of French opera. This charming comedy-ballet of the period of Louis XIV proved a delightful success and was well acted.

Early in the summer the class held its last social gathering, the Grad Dance. Little need be said of its success, for what senior class has ever failed in its last party?

This year brings an end to our achievements as students of East Orange High School. It also marks a beginning of a new and different life. Some of us may enter college; others may find business more to their taste; but what ever be our diverse occupations, that East Orange High School spirit must follow on with us.

As the years pass, this high school and the friendships that we have made here will grow more significant and dear to us.

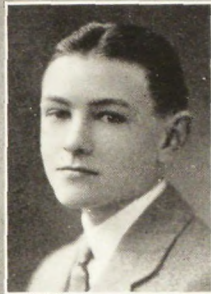

Besides acquiring numerous improvements, we sprang a big

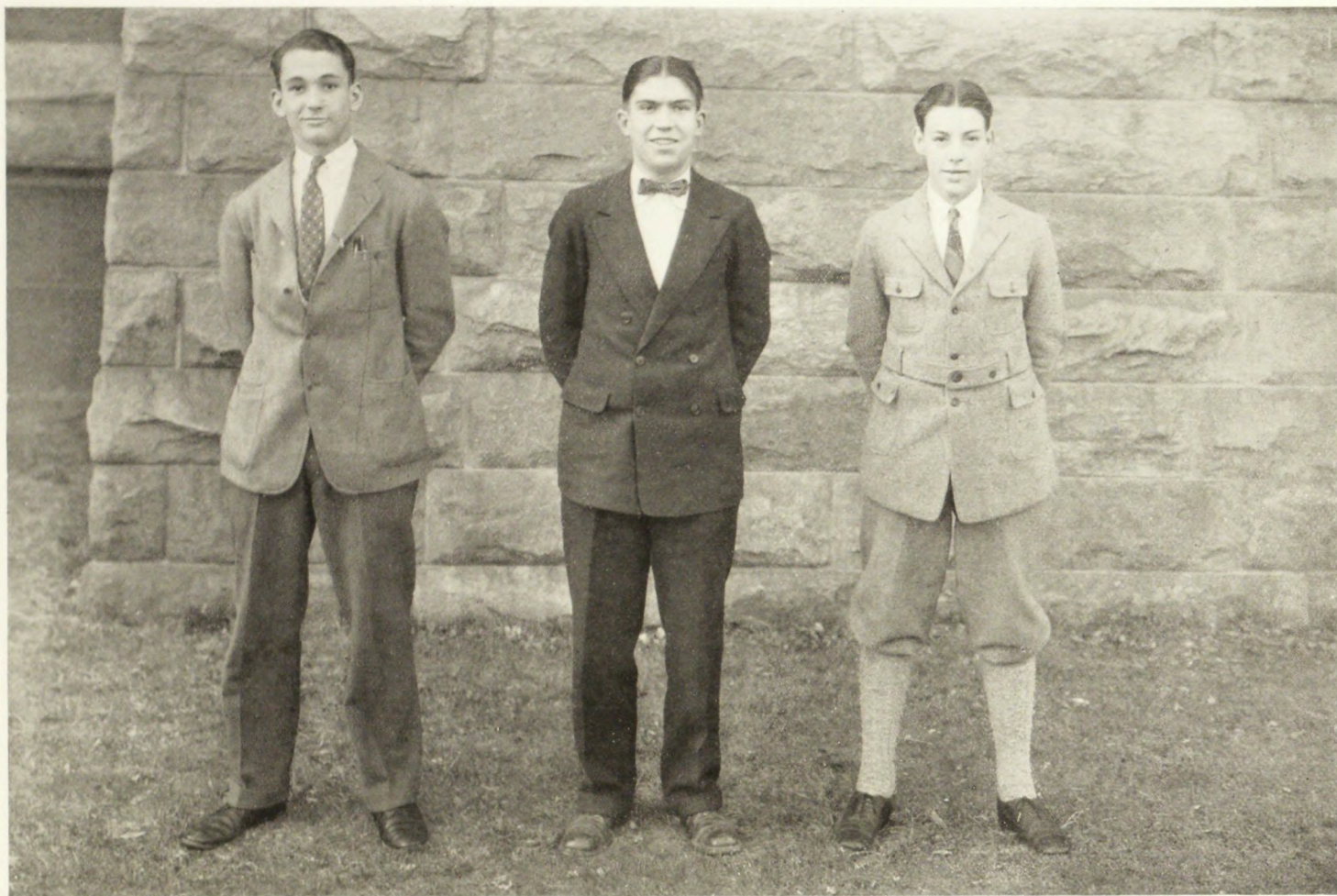

## Football



THE football team representing the East Orange High School enjoyed one of the most successful seasons in recent years. But for the unfortunate defeat at the hands of Barringer, the slate of the 1924 eleven would have been unsullied.

Although team work was the factor that made such a successful campaign possible, individual playing of high caliber was not lacking. Captain Leigh Owen was a tower of strength on offense and defense. His plunges featured many games, and credit is due the linemen who made these rushes possible. Of the linemen, Ed Tropp stood out. He played havoc with more than one opponent, and Barringer, with three men guarding him, felt his presence.

The season opened with a new opponent in the form of Hackensack High School. The game see-sawed back and forth until a line smash by Captain Owen, and a nicely placed drop-kick tallied nine points without allowing the Bergen County boys to cross the Red and Blue goal line.

The next game, with Trenton, was played in the capital city, East Orange triumphing in a one-sided game by a thirty-six to nothing score. The Trenton team rarely threatened but at times showed stubborn resistance.

Dickinson offered the stiffest opposition of the early season games by holding Coach Grosenbaugh's charges to a seven to nothing score. Both teams were at a standstill until a pass from

Owen to Schroeder netted East Orange the seven points needed.

The invaders from Phillipsburg were easily repelled by the East Orange machine. Brilliant runs netted twenty-seven points, while an alert defense spoiled the Phillipsburg passes and running attack.

During the first half of the game with Montclair the odds were decidedly in favor of the mountain town team. The second half, however, was of different aspect; for as soon as the Red and Blue steam-roller was under way, the Blue and White fell before it with the score of twenty-six to nothing.

In contrast to the great team of 1923, Neptune succumbed easily to the varied attack of the East Orange backfield. In view of the fact that the Barringer eleven was at the game, the ultimate score of eighty-two to nothing created a favorable atmosphere in East Orange. Once a pass by the shore team brought the ball to East Orange's two-yard line, but nervousness on the part of the quarterback failed to push the ball over with four downs to go.

On a biting cold day, Plainfield threw a terrific scare into the East Orange ranks by holding the home team to a three point score. In the last few seconds of the game, Owen called for the ball without signal and placed it between the uprights for the only score.



Thanksgiving dawned crisp and clear for the annual Turkey Day classic. The stands were packed with colorful crowds when the teams took the field. Barringer immediately opened up her far famed aerial attack and scored a touchdown in the initial quarter. Harris, the Blue's quarterback, managed to place the ball between the uprights for the score which eventually won the game.

By rushing the ball two-thirds of the length of the field, Owen crossed Barringer's line on a terrific smash, but failed to make his dropkick count. Barringer scored another touchdown in the second period and scored the point after touchdown by capturing a punt of Owen's, which the high wind carried wide. Some nice end runs by Owen and O'Dell brought the ball to the ten-yard line. Owen called for time out, but some misunderstanding by the time keeper left Owen cleaning the mud from his shoes as the half ended. If this dropkick had gone through, East Orange might have succeeded in beating the Blue. In the second half, Pinky Clark brought the crowd to its feet by running back Barringer's kick-off sixty yards. The kick-off was following Owen's second touchdown, and things looked rosy after Clark's run; but soon after this, a failure to make a first down yielded the ball to Barringer.

The game ended without further score, and the Newark team left, victorious by a single point.

## Soccer



NEW varsity sport was inaugurated at East Orange last year. Soccer claimed the attention of over seventy-five boys in the fall and early winter. Six squad teams were formed and went through a short series of games before the class teams were organized. The finalists in the inter-class competition, the seniors and the juniors, played three tie games before 1926 won the series.

At this late date Coach Griffin organized a varsity team, and a few games were scheduled. The first game, a victory over Plainfield, was the last, as snow put the fields in such condition as to make the completion of the schedule impossible.

## Basketball



THE basketball season just passed at East Orange was a complete success. It is only the second year since the readoption of basketball as a major sport at E. O. H. S., but out of a schedule of fourteen games, the team under Captain Davoll, won ten, tied one, and lost three.

East Orange was eliminated in the first round of the State Title Tournament by Hackensack, the team which E. O. had vanquished earlier in the season, and the one that put an end to Passaic's string of 159 victories.

In the early part of the season, Coach Benatre's quintet, besides scoring a win over Hackensack, beat Montclair in an extra-period game, which caused sport critics to take notice. Two victories also were scored over South Orange, the Class B state champions. Throughout this season, as well as last, the team was undefeated on the home court.

The first game on the schedule, with the Newark Tech freshmen, was won by a big margin. Montclair next fell in an

extra-period game, 25-23. In the following game, played at Plainfield, the squad lost by one point.

The team came through the four succeeding games with victories, including one over the towering Hackensack five. Overconfidence, the jinx of many successful teams, caused the squad to stumble, however, and a tie with West Orange, and a defeat by Belleville resulted.

The team recovered and beat South Orange, only to lose to Montclair in the worst defeat of the season. In a final spurt, the squad disposed of Stevens Prep, Plainfield and the Alumni. The victory over Plainfield, who had taken our measure before, was featured by the shooting of George Currey. This win gave E. O. a victory over every team that had defeated us during the season.

For the first time in many years, East Orange had a representative team in the state tournament. In our only game, in the first round, Hackensack won 23-20. An idea of the thrilling rally staged in the last quarter, the like of which is rarely seen, may be gained from the scores at the end of the second and third quarters, 17-2 and 18-6, against East Orange.

A. champions. With the old E. O. spirit, the boys came through, winning one one hit, a triple by George Currey, and the marvel pitching of Savacool, who held the losers to two singles. It would do well to state here that Savacool received sensational support.

The South Orange game on April 21 was won 12 to 11 by a brilliant four-run rally in the ninth, and the next, with Montclair, was won easily behind Savacool, 7-4.

Altogether, the entertainment was a complete success and the participants may well feel proud of their production.





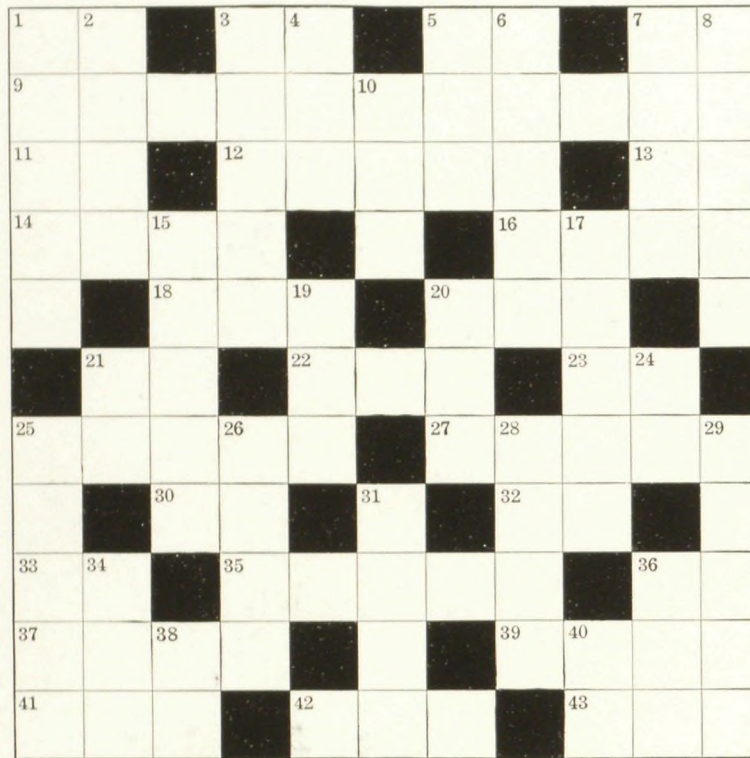

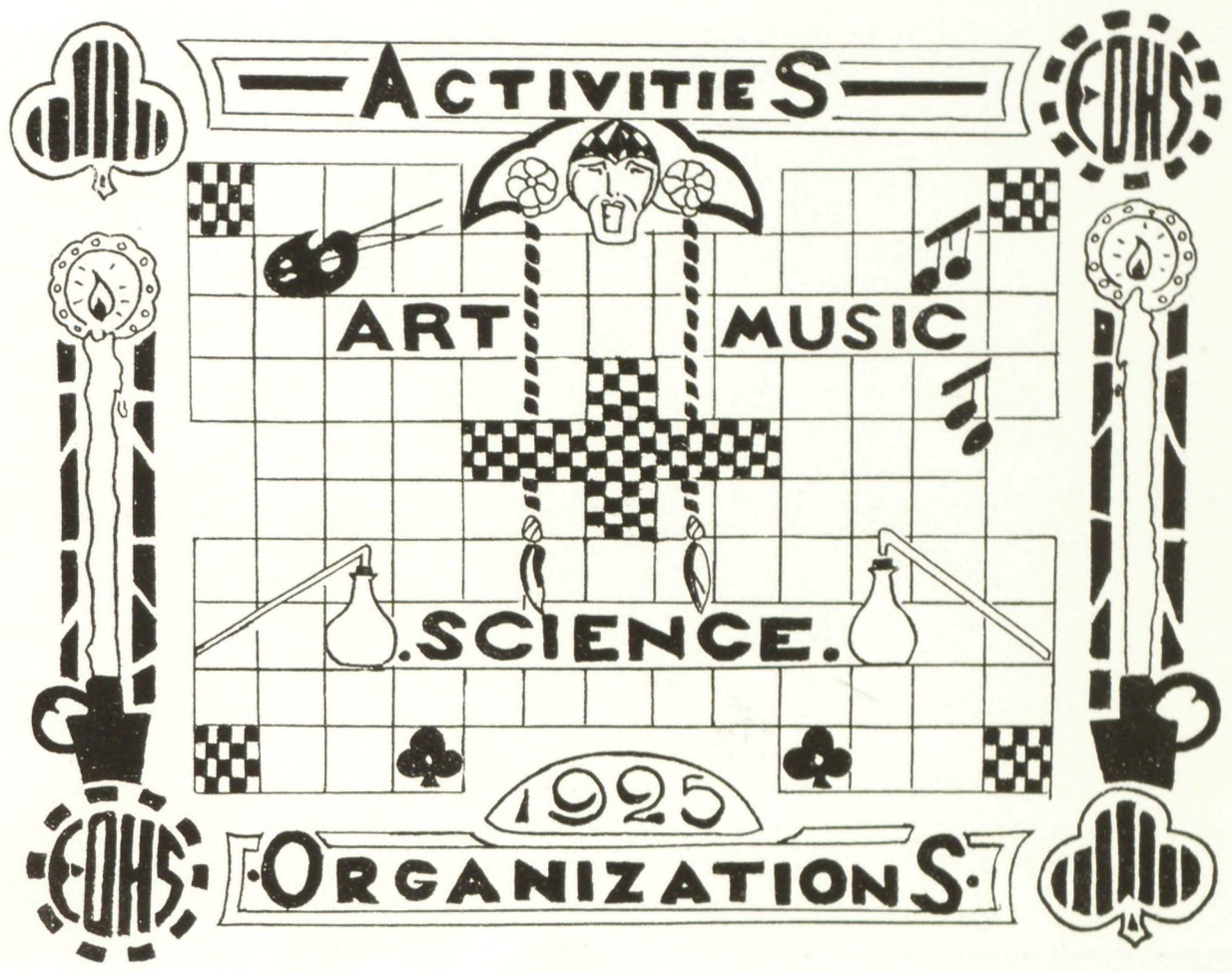

E abre la sesion. La secretaria va a leer el acta del ano 1924-1925." *La Sociedad Espanola* is holding its annual meeting and is about to hear the Secretary read the report for the year 1924-1925. The report as translated into English follows:

"During the past year *La Sociedad Espanola* has been living up to its principles of increasing the interest of the high school in Spain and the Spanish speaking nations, and increasing the knowledge of Spanish of the members in a conversational way. At the September and October meetings, short plays were presented by members of the club. In November some of the members gave an informative debate on the subject of a republic in Spain.

"At the December meeting we were told of the Christmas season's festivities, as they are celebrated in Spain and in Spanish America. It was at this meeting that the society decided to serve refreshments occasionally, after the regular meetings. An excellent social was held in January, at which everyone turned out.

"At the February meeting the constitution was amended to provide for the holding of two meetings monthly instead of one. This would give more time for recreation and entertainment at the meetings. At this session, Mr. Mosher told us about Galicia, that

little-known district of Spain. A very interesting meeting was held in the second week of March, with some of our own members as speakers on the general history and geography of Spain.

"A new system to increase the attendance at meetings was devised at this session and was well under way by the club's first meeting in April. According to this new system, the club is divided into two teams which compete for the greatest number of points to be reckoned according to the attendance of the members. At the end of the year, the losing team plays host to the winning side at a party.

IN September, 1924, the Mathematics Club opened the season with a bang. A large membership was enrolled at the first meeting, and the slide-rule was described and discussed at length.

Throughout the autumn, the Math Club remained the oasis for embryo mathematicians. All sides of the fundamental science from longevity tables and magic squares, to surveying and quick multiplication were discussed.

Throughout the year the club has been assigned one problem a meeting, an award being made at the end of the term to the member handing in the greatest number of correct solutions.

As even great mathematicians, however, must have a recess and recreation, the big event looked forward to by every true Math Club member is the picnic which comes at the end of the school year, and at which discussing of log tables and slide-rules is cast aside for the more simple problem of putting twelve sandwiches in one stomach.

## Scientific Society



THE Scientific Society of the East Orange High School was organized in 1918 by Mr. C. R. Collins, the present faculty adviser of the society, for the purpose of "bringing together those boys who are interested in problems of a scientific nature for the study and discussion of these problems."

At the present time the society consists of twenty-four active members, all of whom must maintain a high scholastic standing to remain on the club books. At each meeting two members give talks on some problem of their own choosing, at the conclusion of which an open discussion is held in order to clear up any questions that may have arisen.

In addition to talks at the regular meetings, the society visits places of interest where the members become familiar with the manufacture or assembly of some industrial product or commodity.

During the past two years, the society has visited, among other places, the American-LaFrance Fire Engine Company of Bloomfield; the New York Telephone and Telegraph Company's broadcasting station WEAJ; the Ward Baking Company; and the locomotive works of the New Jersey Central Railroad.

These visits have done much to promote a fuller understanding of the practical application of science to the problems of industry.

WHEN Dorothy Gatley in 1919 acted as temporary chairman of a group which met to form a club for the study of drama, she little thought that five years later the Drama Study Club would point with pride to its first chairman as one of the most promising young actresses of America.

To the majority of boys and girls of high school age, the actor and his profession mean motion pictures or musical comedy. Few realize the entertainment and profit to be gained from the legitimate stage. It was to remedy this condition that the Drama Study Club was formed.

Come with me to a meeting of the club. First, a paper is read on the technique of the one-act play. It is then illustrated by the reading of a one-act play and an informal discussion of it follows. Now we have a digest of what the best critics think of the plays in New York and Newark at the time. Some of the club members have seen these plays and interesting discussions follow. Parliamentary law is rigidly adhered to throughout the meeting.

The club during the past year, in addition to its work in the study of drama, has presented several plays for the benefit of its members and one for the Senior and Junior assembles.

On April 30, the club held a reception for its parents, and at that time two plays, *Two Crooks and a Lady* and *Enter the Hero*, were presented.

To give the club a broader vision, men and women prominent in dramatic work have been brought to speak to us, among them, Dr. S. Marion Tucker, President of the New York Drama League; Mrs. Margaret Fealey of the School of Dramatic Art; Frederick Boun, a member of Edwin Booth's last company; Edith Wynne Matthison, an actress of international reputation, and Charles Rann Kennedy, the author of *The Servant in the House*.

In this pleasurable manner the Drama Study Club imparts to its members knowledge of one of the most important—and in the public schools, most neglected—means of the study of life, the drama.





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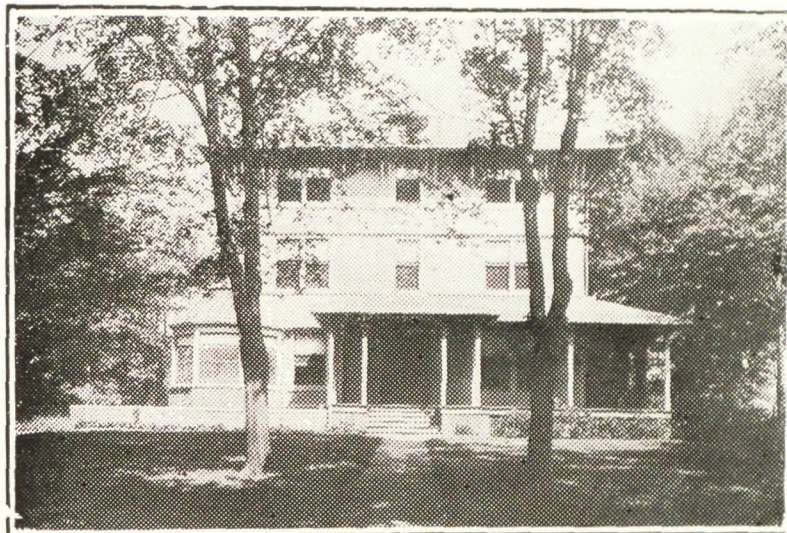
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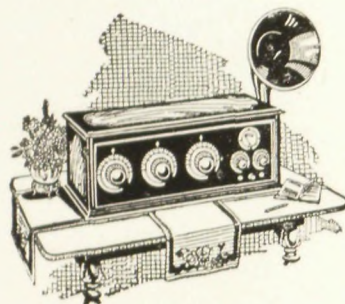
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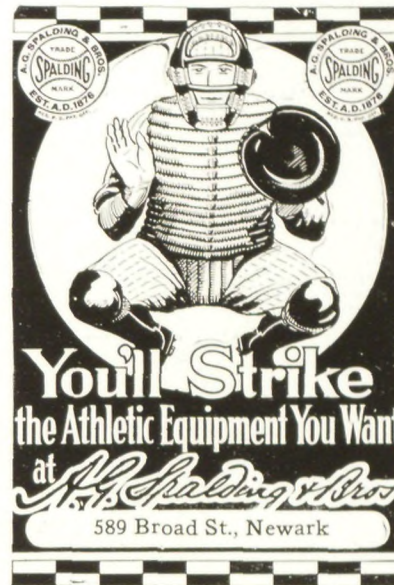
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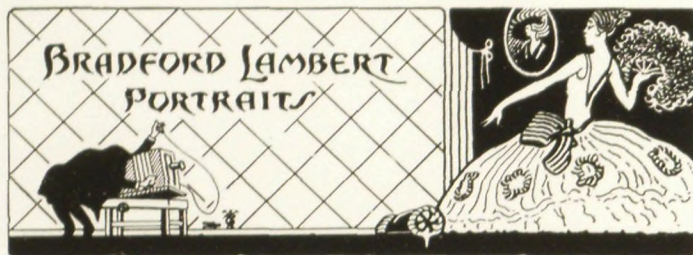
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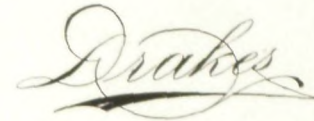
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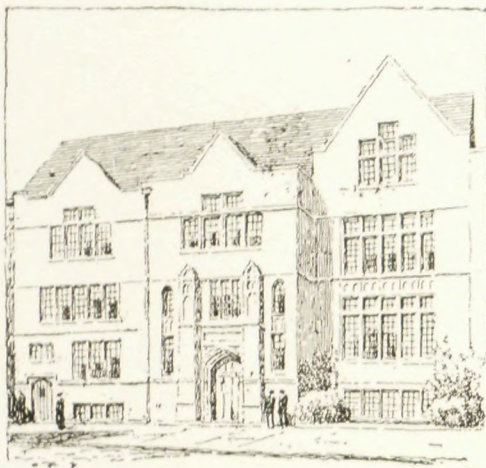
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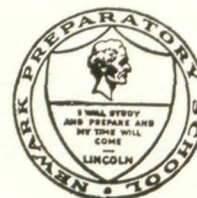
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
