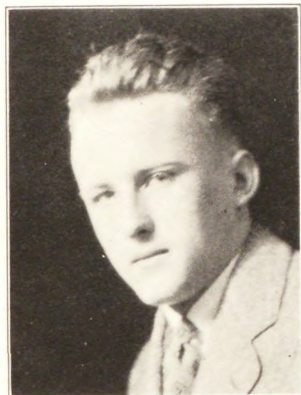

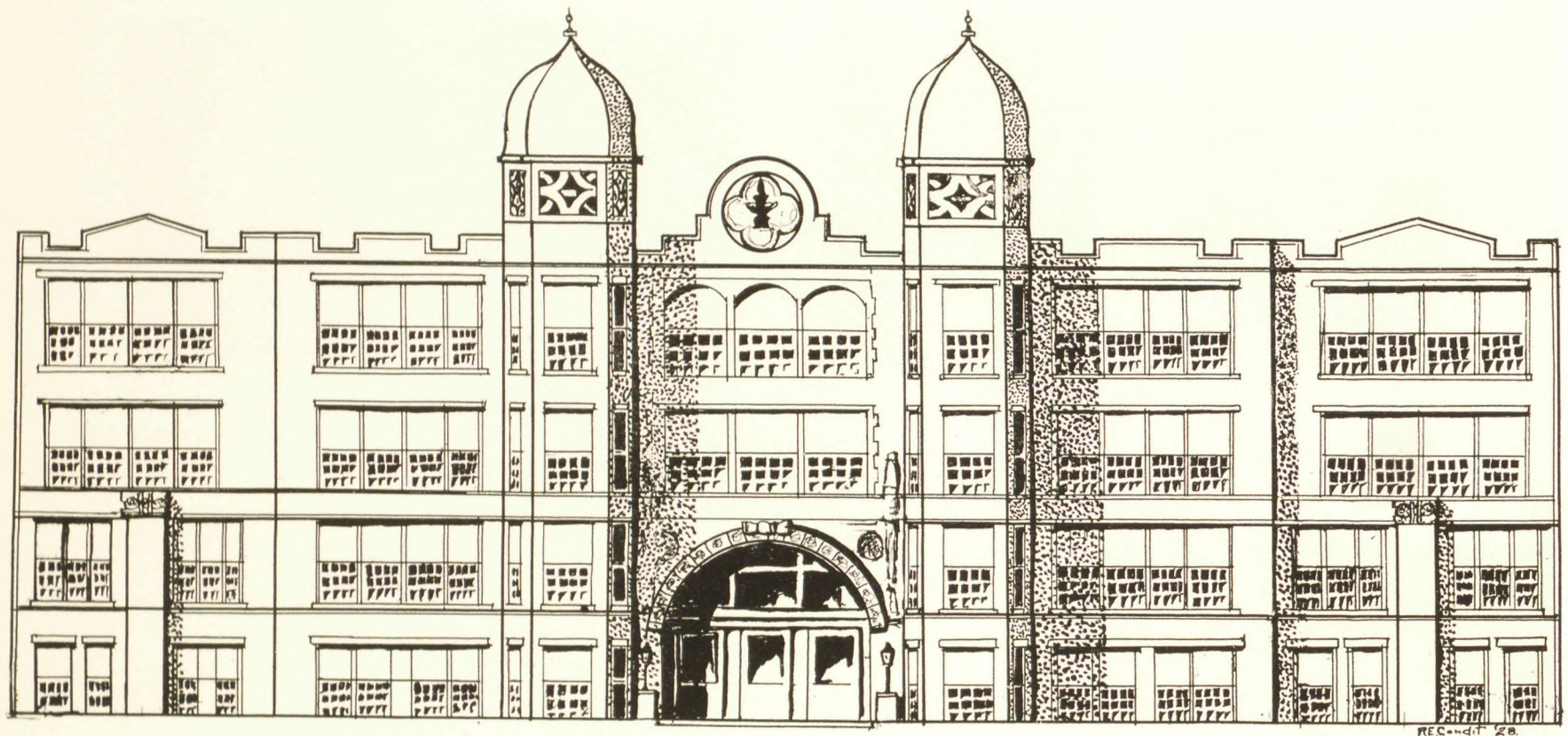

THE EAST ORANGE HIGH SCHOOL

East Orange High School



WHEN the present senior class entered East Orange High School four years ago, they entered an institution which embodies the best features of the public school.

The opportunity to enter such an institution did not exist in 1889. At that time there were several grammar schools, some of which were supplemented by a two year high school course and others of which enjoyed a three year high school course. In 1889 these schools were consolidated and a board of education was chosen. It was through the efforts of this board that the high school came into being.

In 1891 in the Winans Street building, the new high school was established with an enrollment of 150 students and a faculty of four teachers. Superintendent Vernon L. Davey was appointed the first principal. Not until 1911, however, was the present main building erected to accommodate the 750 students then enrolled. Another addition in 1923 again increased the

facilities of the school, so that now there are 45 class rooms, 14 laboratories, 3 study halls, an auditorium, a library, 3 health inspection rooms and an infirmary, 2 gymnasiums, a swimming pool, and a lunch room. Changes at present being made will convert what was formerly the boys' gym into two new class rooms.

The faculty of 88 teachers, many of whom are prominent in educational fields, have in charge this year 2005 pupils. The preparation given in our school has enabled graduates to enter over forty universities and colleges of high standing in the United States. East Orange students are accepted for entrance by certification at practically all schools where students are admitted in that way.

The General Organization, composed of a large group of students, coordinates the many organizations and activities of the school. The power of the General Organization, vested in its officers and its legislative body, the Student Council, has this year been extended to include a judicial department. The

Corridor Patrol has assumed police duties; and a student court has been organized to punish offenders.

East Orange students have an opportunity to participate in a wide range of interests. It would be difficult to describe them all; but there are opportunities for every type of mind to find some field of activity in the clubs or on the teams.

The record of the school in athletics is an exceptional one. A glance at the long list of names of her alumni who have gained prominence in college and in professional athletics is illuminating. Such men as John VanRyn, star of the Princeton tennis team and runner-up in the National Indoor Tennis Tournament; Cyril Aschenbach, line coach of Dartmouth; and William Neidlinger of Dartmouth fame; such men have brought our school much favorable notice.

The foundation gained at East Orange High School has enabled her alumni to rise to prominent positions in other fields. Ann Harding has succeeded so well in her profession that she is now playing leading roles with Ben-Ami, one of the greatest actors on the American stage. Mention of Edwin Wolf, formerly actor and director with the Mansfield Players, and now director at the American Academy of Dramatic Arts; Ernestine Gaines, who has secured a reputation in the theatrical world; or Garrett Fort, scenario writer for Cecil DeMille, will suffice to show the places which many of our graduates occupy.

It is to be hoped that the Class of '26, about to sally forth into the world, will measure up to this same high standard. Certainly, as graduates of East Orange High School, the best has been given them for a start on the way to their future.

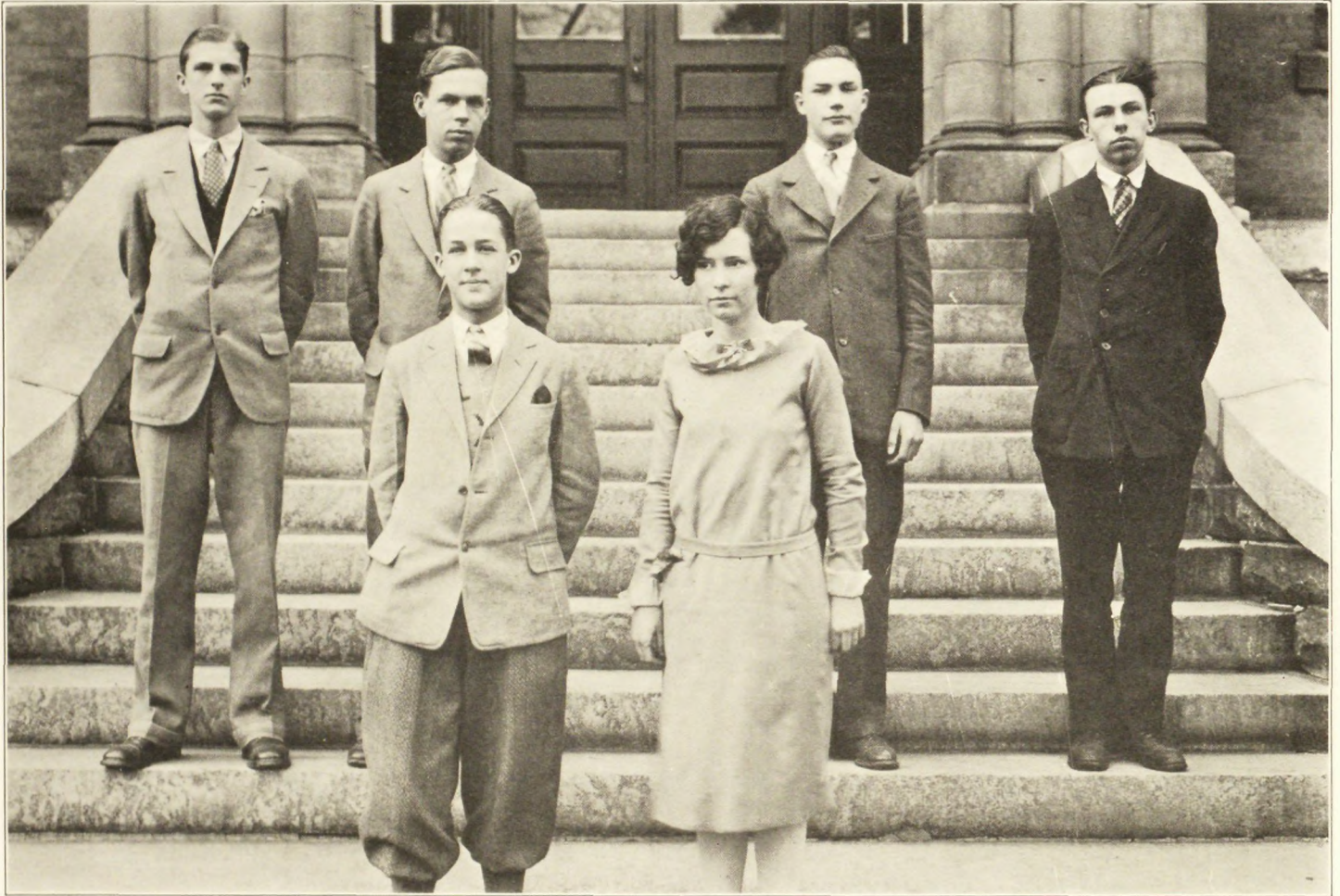


HERE is no doubt but that our class, the class of '28, is a very exceptional one. That is very easily proved by the fact that we were the first to have successfully instituted Student Government.

HIS year the Student Council changed the manner of voting for officers of the General Organization; that is, each Freshman vote counts as one-half unit, each Sophomore vote one, and each Junior and Senior vote counts as one and one-half units. By this method the Freshmen, with their large numbers, who are not very familiar with the ability of the various candidates, will not carry the vote. The feasibility of this measure is yet to be proved, but in the minds of those who discussed the project, it is a prudent move.

Another step was the gathering of all the rules and regulations of the high school. These were ratified, revised, and issued in pamphlet form. Thus the restrictions in and around the school building were given definite form for those concerned.

As the next change, a new corridor patrol was organized whose duties were to cover a wide field. Better order among students was the result of this more efficient method of patrol.

From this policing of the school building evolved the student court, established to try all infringements of the school's rules

and regulations. The court procedure follows the same lines as a municipal police court.

Another item of special interest was the referendum, submitted to the students for their approval or disapproval, prohibiting smoking by East Orange High School students in the vicinity of the school. This drastic move caused some stir among students, but it has proved very effective in eliminating unfavorable impressions on the part of outsiders.

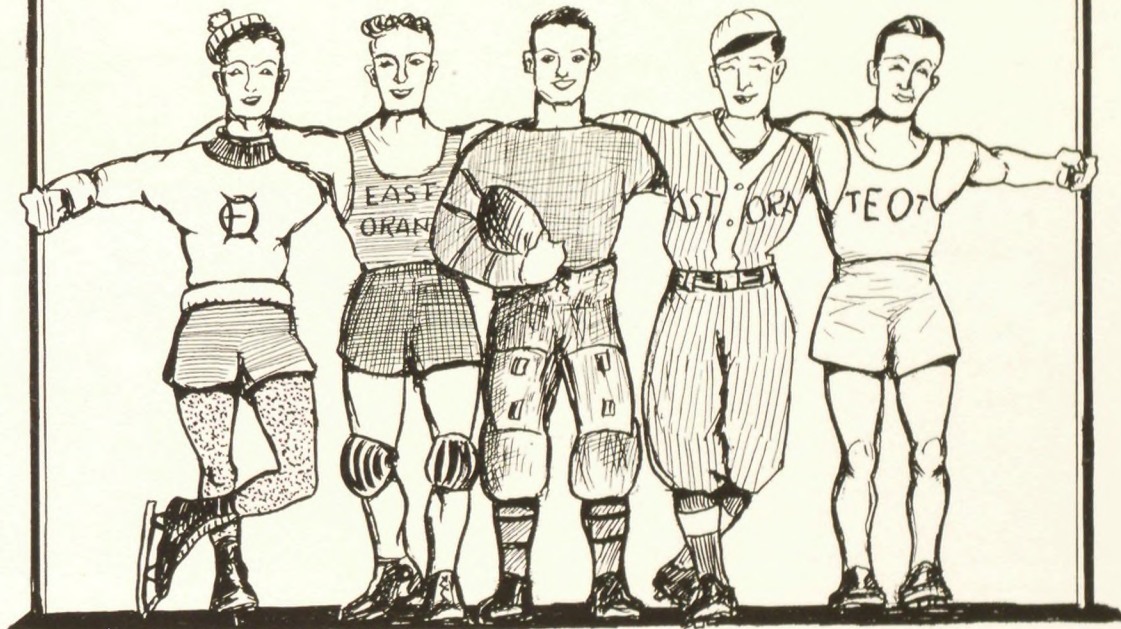
A point worthy of note was the enlargement of the Student Council by the addition of the Freshman Debating Club and the Girls' Rifle Club.

Football



FOR the second successive season, the East Orange High School football team went through almost its entire schedule without being scored on, only to meet defeat at the hands of its old rival, Barringer High School. Much credit is due to Coach Grosenbaugh, who developed a winning team with only four letter men as a nucleus. A total of one hundred nineteen points was scored against opponents who garnered only nineteen.

The initial game of the season was with Hackensack. The Red and Blue team managed to shatter the visiting team's obstinate defense, push over a lone touchdown, and make the extra point.

On a biting cold day with a bitter wind sweeping across the field, a new opponent appeared. Advance newspaper comment heralded the New Rochelle team as a dangerous aggregation. A scoreless first half was evenly contested. Then East Orange unleashed her offensive and piled up twenty-six points without endangering her own goal line.

The first game away from home was played with Neptune, and the usual crowd of East Orange supporters went to Ocean Grove. The shore machine presented few difficulties, and the Red and Blue emerged at the long end of a twenty-nine to nothing score.

The second game in a foreign town was played in Phillipsburg on the following Saturday. As the game was played on a boggy field during a down-pour of rain, it was not a true test of the East Orange team's scoring ability. The game ended in a scoreless tie.

Returning to its home gridiron, East Orange conquered Dickinson High School on Election Day, sixteen to nothing. The Jersey City lads had a shifty offense and a dogged defense. After this game Captain Blackmar was first mentioned as a possibility for all state honors at tackle.

On the morning of Armistice Day, Montclair High School met East Orange at the Stadium. Although they had not yet won a game during the season, the Mountaineers played daringly enough to throw a scare into everyone. Twenty-eight to nothing was the final score, but the game was more exciting than the results indicated.

In the last game before the big Thanksgiving Day tilt, the Red and Blue went through the most gruelling game of the season. Plainfield fought tooth and nail during every second of play. Four times East Orange had the ball within its opponent's five yard line and once on the two foot line, but the Plainfield sturdy defense prevented a score. Fortunately Frank Wolf's forty-five yard drop-kick in the first quarter and a safety made later in the game was a sufficient margin for East Orange to win, five to nothing.

The 1925 Thanksgiving Day Barringer-East Orange game was the twenty-sixth annual contest between these old rivals, and for the first time this interscholastic football classic was played in the new Newark Schools' Stadium. The stands, with a capacity of twenty thousand, were inadequate for the crowds which clamored to see the big game. The 1925 contest was to determine the champion of the N. J. I. A. A., and the victor would be unquestionably the state interscholastic champion.

Additional interest was given to the game by the radio broadcast play by play description.

A light blanket of snow covered the arena, and after a few minutes of scrimmaging, the field became a quagmire. The players kept their footing with difficulty.

Shortly after the opening kick-off, East Orange drew first blood with a safety. By well executed forward passes, the big Blue team scored two touchdowns and led twelve to two at half time.

During the first eight minutes of the third quarter, East Orange held the ball continuously. Down the field went the East Orange boys for a touchdown while the Newark team feebly attempted to stop the onslaught. The Red and Blue was on the way for another six point tally, when the uncertain footing prevented a first down, and the ball was yielded to Barringer. Throughout the rest of the game, the East Orange attack was dangerous but lacked the vim and spirit which brought about the first touchdown.

Early in the fourth quarter Barringer again made a touchdown by way of its superb forward passing. This score spelled defeat for the Red and Blue for the fourth consecutive year. The game ended nineteen to eight. Captain Edgar Blackmar's playing in this game confirmed him as All-State tackle.

In spite of the defeat by Barringer, East Orange may rejoice in having been placed second in the state scholastic ratings.

Four first team men will graduate this year, leaving four men for the team next year; Wynne, Captain-Elect; Lucas, Smith, and Heimert will return.

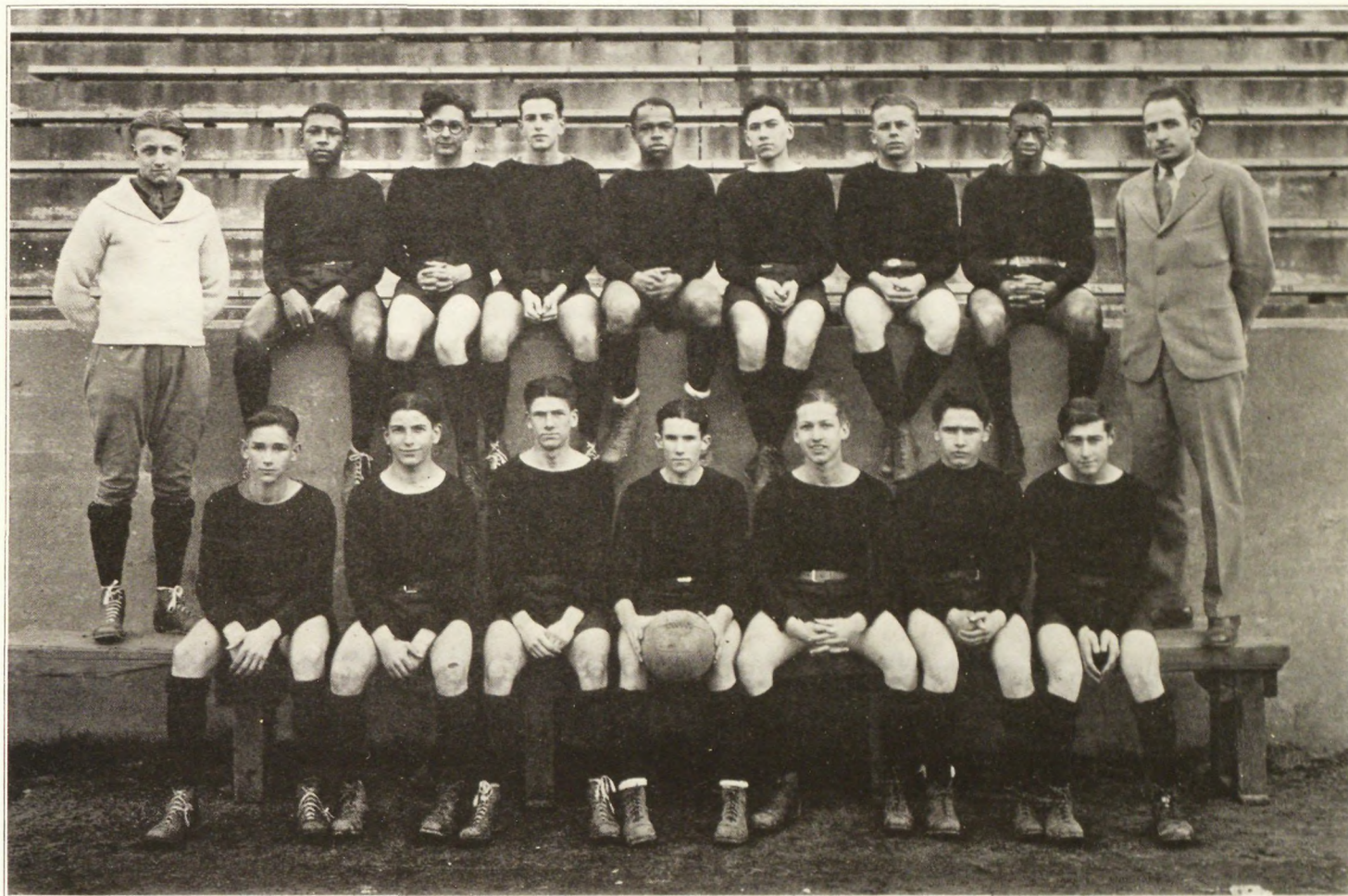
Soccer
