# THE STUDENT COUNCIL

HE Student Council under a reduced membership has, besides attending to its regular duties, accomplished work in other fields of school activities.

The hand book which last year's Council had almost completed has been finished by members of this year's Council. This handbook will be of invaluable assistance to new students coming from other schools and also to our underclassmen.

The Student Council sent a delegation to the Columbian Convention on Student Government in which many ideas were exchanged with other schools from every section of the State of New Jersey. These conventions are held every year by alternate schools and in this manner ideas and helpful suggestions on Student Government are given to the various schools. This year's delegation consisted of, besides Seniors, several lower classmen who may be on future Councils and who thereby may have gained a knowledge of Student Government first hand.

The President of the Student Council following a precedent set two years ago has attended all of the Class Council meetings offering suggestions from time to time and also has reported any important business of the Student Council to the Class Council. In this way the two Councils have been in close contact with each other.

The parking problem which has become increasingly annoying to the students who bring their cars to school has been acted upon by the Student Council. The council petitioned Dr. Scott, the superintendent of schools, for the students. Dr. Scott has been planning some way in which a restricted parking space for student's cars exclusively can be successfully worked out. Although nothing can be accomplished this year, it is hoped that by the beginning of the next school year a definite space will be set aside for all those who wish to bring their cars to school. Thus when this year's Council disolves, it will look to the future Councils to carry on the work of past Councils.

### STUDENT COURT

HE Student Court, one of the outstanding organizations of our High School, has functioned this year with greater success than in years past. This fact is based on the number of appeals that have arisen from court decisions. Of all the cases handled by both the Boys' Court and the Girls' Court only two cases were appealed and in both cases the Student Court decisions were upheld.

The total membership of the Court numbers eighteen of which nine are boys and nine are girls. Each court is headed by a Chief Justice.

In most schools where students participate in the government a Student Court is conspicuous by its absence. It is here, claim most school authorities, that student government ends. Are we not to be proud then that we have succeeded where most other schools have failed?

Our Court has reached a high degree of efficiency mainly through the experience of previous courts. Formerly the court was held after school but this plan gave way to holding court in the morning before classes.

Much of the success that the Student Court has enjoyed can be traced to the tireless efforts of Mr. Knight, who, five years ago, introduced into our midst the system which has proved its worth. But the real success of the Student Court is in the hands of the student body. The wonderful attitude and spirit of cooperation from the students themselves have made this court possible.

To the Juniors, Sophomores, and the Freshmen lie the responsibility of carrying on the good work of the Student Court to even greater heights.



RGANIZED three years ago by a group of science students, the Engineering Club has become one of the most popular clubs in the school. At the meetings, the members speak upon and discuss current engineering and scientific topics. When possible, the members go in a body to neighboring manufacturing plants where they see scientific principles in actual application.

At the first meeting, after the election of officers and the appointment of Fred Gitzendanner and Ralph Friedel as members of the program committee, Frank Hatch opened the discussion of the year with a detailed talk on the history and development of Diesel engines. Mr. Marshall then spoke on light, a subject of vast interest.

Mr. Marshall gave a very interesting talk on the surveyor's transit and its use, demonstrating on an instrument the principles of operation. At the meetings following diverse subjects were spoken upon and discussed. Jack Waite gave a talk on the front wheel drive; Ralph Friedel spoke about floating airdromes. The first trip the Engineering Club made was to the Lighting Institute of the General Electric Company in Hoboken. They saw a moving picture of the manufacture of Mazda lamps. Lighting effects were demonstrated by means of a model city, movable wall devices, and the like. The other trips were equally interesting. Included the visit to the Kearny electric power station of the Public Service. The club was shown through the entire plant. One of the most interesting trips of the year was the one to the Brooklyn Navy Yard.

# DRAMA STUDY CLUB



## FOOTBALL

LTHOUGH the football season was a decided failure in the number of games won and lost, the victory over Barringer atoned in a great measure for an otherwise poor season. Only three of the eight scheduled games were won, but, as two of these were N. J. I. A. A. contests, the eleven managed to finish the season in a triple tie for the title. Kearny was beaten for the first time in East Orange history this year. Although the Cardinals have never been formidable, they have managed to meet the Red and Blue eleven during a slump, and for the two previous years, Harry Ronnie had defeated East Orange single-handed.

At the close of last year's very successful season a number of the crack players were expected to return and make this season just as victorious. Changing of schools and ineligibility, however, reduced the number of returning players to four. They were Captain Moe Frankel, Bill Hellmers, a fine end, Dick Weisgerber, and Reid. At the end of the preliminary practice season, a lineup replete with faces unfamiliar to East Orange football fans was running through the daily scrimmages.

Unfortunately for the green team the first opponent was the powerful Nutley machine, with a 52-0 victory already under their belt. For the first half of this tense game the fighting Red and Blue line held the vaunted Maroon backfield in check, while the East Orange backs were likewise stopped by the rangy visitors. The play centered about midfield until at length Nutley managed to get the oval in scoring position. Though twice repulsed, big Hank Stager finally carried the ball over the line, Hub Crawford added the point by a placement kick. Nutley continued her season undefeated, defeating all her other opponents by more than twice the margin of victory over East Orange.

Kearny was the first team to taste defeat at the hands of East Orange. The game was dull and poorly played. Weisgerber scored after intercepting a Kearny pass.

Columbia, with Pat Stark and Hienie Allen going strong, outplayed and outscored East Orange, 6-0, in a thrill-fraught game at Underhill Field. East Orange reached the South Orange ten-yard marker on one occasion, but failed to shove the ball over. South Orange, with the same opportunity, converted.

On the following Saturday Montclair was met and defeated at the local stadium. This was the first victory scored over the mountainside eleven in three years. Bobby Douglass was the star of this encounter, scoring the touchdown which won the game.

A journey was taken to Warren County with dire results, as the Phillipsburg eleven turned the tables on the Red and Blue to win 13-7. East Orange scored first when Ashcroft ran to a touchdown after seizing a fumbled ball out of the air. Weisgerber converted. Phillipsburg, by scoring a touchdown in each of the last two quarters, passed the East Orange total to win the game.

Plainfield conquered East Orange by the score of 13-0. East Orange put up a game fight, but the undefeated Red and Black was not to be denied.

The final encounter before the Thanksgiving Day fracas was a baleful one, Dickinson handing East Orange its only defeat in a series which is more than a score of years old. Only the fine work of a fighting line kept the score from mounting higher.

On a gray-skied Thanksgiving morn two of the poorest teams that ever represented East Orange-Barringer met before a capacity crowd at the Newark Schools Stadium. Both teams were inspired by the importance and tradition of the occasion, and put up their best brand of football. The first quarter was memorable. After an exchange of kicks East Orange found herself in Blue territory. On third down Bill Egan tossed a pass over the center of the line. An East Orange man touched it, then a Blue shirt, and then alert Moe Frankel seized the pigskin and raced the remaining distance to the goal. For the remainder of the quarter East Orange made aggressive gains.

In the second canto, the Red and Blue was again in scoring position. This time Bill let the ball fly at young Dave Burke, who caught it over the goal line for a second score. This time Weisgerber made a pretty dropkick to send the total to thirteen.

Caruso, Barringer back, returned the kick off of the third quarter for a touchdown. He slanted toward the left side of the field, broke for the sidelines, and cleared the East Orange defenses.

Barringer had more power and drive in the third quarter, accounting for their first down. At the close of the quarter, however, the Red and Blue were on the foe's five yard line.

Failing to push it over, Barringer took it on its own five.

With ten minutes left to play the Blue started in an unforgetable march down the field, which East Orange finally stopped a few yards from the last white line. The game ended before the teams could line up.

There was only one truly great played on this year's team, Captain Frankel. Injuries and changes of position slowed the big center up during the season, but his performance against Barringer, until injuries necessitated his removal should surely be written in the chronicles of East Orange football.

Dick Weisgerber, Bill Egan, and Phil Marfuggi were honored along with Frankel in the Daily Courier All-Oranges selections. Frankel was officially selected All-State High School center by Field Secretary Gus Falzer of the Newark Sunday Call.

Prospects for a successful season for 1930 are in the hands of the fates, but a few of the letter men are returning, and as yet no unfavorable reports have reached our ears.

## BASKETBALL

game between those schools. Kearny led during most of the game and finished up with a score of 26-19.



cessful season than any preceding team has ever experienced. They won every high school meet by one-sided scores and defeated two prep schools. The only defeat of the season was suffered at the hands of Lawrenceville, state champion in prep school ranks. As a gala ending to a superb season, the team journeyed south to Trenton and there annexed the state championship, defeating its nearest rival by ten points. This final win was loudly acclaimed, for East Orange

bad been runner up to Atlantic City for seven or more years in succession before this year's team came through and defeated them decisively.

The team entered two open meets, the Columbia and Pennsylvania Interscholastics. It took first place in the Columbia meet defeating the best high school teams in the East. In the Penn meet two prep schools were the leaders with East Orange third leading the high schools.

Several members of the team have done outside swimming which had added to their fame. The most outstanding of these is "Skinny" Chalmers. Besides taking first places in the Penn and Columbia meets, he was the key man on the Newark A. C. team. He won the national interscholastic championship and the Senior Metropolitan championship in the backstroke as well as the national junior 300-yard medley championship. These accomplishments are all the more notable when it is remembered that last year George Kojac was the holder of the Senior Metropolitan championship. In the national interscholastic individual championships he competed against the pick of the nation's best high school swimmers. In addition to this he was invited to swim in the national senior championships and placed second in the backstroke.

The other members of the team who have done outstanding swimming are "Devvy" Smith, Donald Chalmers, and

Walter Ashley. All swam for the Newark A. C. and Donald Chalmers took third in the Columbia Meet, and third in the national championships also. Walter Ashley besides swimming for N. A. C. took second in the national individuals at diving. He was a vital factor in the relay team, and took first place in diving in the state meet. "Devvy" Smith swam both the 40-yard free style and in the relay. He won in the state meet at the 40-yard swim and helped win the relay. He also placed fifth in the national individual championships.

The other outstanding member of the team was Harry Green who swam in the relay and helped it win the Columbia open meet, the state meet and to break the East Orange High School pool record by two seconds. Early in the season he swam the 200-yard free style but it was found that he could do better in the sprints so he was used in the relay. Walsh, Cashen and Cleveland swam well and did their part in wining the dual meets.

## TRACK-1929

HE East Orange track team completed a fairly successful season last spring. The team's first meet, a dual with Glen Ridge, was a decisive victory for the Red and Blue. Glen Ridge was outclassed in nearly every event, winning but three first places. Captain Kingsley Schroeder was the star of the meet rolling up twenty-one points, first in the high jump, first in the shot put, first in the pole vault, second in the high hurdles, and second in the discus throw. Cap Johnson won his favorite events, the high and low hurdles without the least bit of trouble; and he also took second in the 220-

yard run followed by George Marshall. Dick Hardy took first in the 100-yard dash with Ed Haldeman third, and first in the hunning broad jump with Marshall second and Irving Krieger third. Krieger was also runner-up to Schroeder in the pole vault. In the quarter mile run East Orange took all three places, Joe Coburn first, Bill Hellmers second, and Bob Hopkins third. East Orange took highest honors in the Javelin throw Tom Scriggens first, and Art Lange second, but lost all three places to Glen Ridge in the mile. Other scorers for East Orange were Elson Burroughs, Ed Bruen and Gil Jones. The final score was 81 to 36.

East Orange made a respectable showing at the sixth annual track and field meet held by South Side High at the Newark School Stadium. Cap Johnson was East Orange's outstanding performer, accounting for two-thirds of the team's points, in upholding his claim for the high and low hurdles titles. King Schroeder, Dick Hardy, Linton Marsh, and Art Lange scored the other five points for East Orange. Schroeder took second and Marsh tied for fourth in the high jump, Hardy came through with a fourth in the 100-yard dash, and Lange tied for fourth in the javelin throw.


A week later the East Orange trackmen were defeated in a stiff dual meet with Columbia High. Johnson, Schroeder, and Hardy starred for East Orange. Cap Johnson captured the high and low hurdles and King Schroeder won the high jump and the shot put. Other tallies were made by Hardy, first in the 100-yard dash and a close second in the broad jump; Marsh, second in the high jump and third in the javelin; Elitch, second in the mile; Lange, first and Scriggens second in the javelin throw; Dordleman second in the discus; Burroughs third in the low hurdles; Boud third in the half mile; Coburn third in the quarter mile; and Haldeman tie for third in the high jump. The final score stood, Columbia 63½, East Orange 49½.

In the N. J. I. A. A. track and field meet at Monclair,

East Orange took third place. The powerful Montclair team won the meet easily. East Orange trailed Barringer by only a few points and Dickinson brought up the rear. Cap Johnson was East Orange's individual star winning the high and low hurdles as usual. King Schroeder took first honors in the high jump and fifth in the high hurdles; and Dick Hardy also starred when he broke the meet record by stepping the 100-yard dash in ten seconds flat. He also placed fourth in the broad jump. Other tallies made by East Orange trackmen were Linton Marsh's third in the high jump and fifth in the broad jump; Art Lange's fourth in the javelin; and Elson Burrough's fifth in the low hurdles.

The last meet of the season was the New Jersey State Interscholastic Championship held by Barringer at the Newark School Stadium. Cap Johnson successfully defended his two championships in the high and low hurdles. King Schroeder and Dick Hardy were East Orange's only other scorers. Schroeder tied for first in the high jump and Hardy took third in the 100-yard dash.

The prospects for the 1930 season are not so bright, having only two lettermen left, Dick Hardy and Linton Marsh. Coach Benatre, however, will undoubtedly round up a well balanced team from his host of candidates.

## **ORCHESTRA**

HE entire student body of the school may well be proud of the Senior Orchestra this year. Many honors, tributes, and prizes that have been won during the year have made the orchestra one of the most successful since Mr. Herfurth took charge of the instrumental music in the school.

Mr. Herfurth succeeded in organizing, during the past year, a full symphony orchestra, numbering sixty-two pieces—the largest in the history of the school. Many instruments have been added to the orchestra also during the past year. The violin section has been greatly improved and augmented, the viola section has been increased substantially, and the number of basses has been increased to six.

All these additions have proved very profitable to the orchestra, and is shown by the favorable reports received from many critics at the various concerts during the school year.

The outstanding activity of the orchestra for the entire year, was the continuance of the series of Children's Concerts. These concerts proved so popular, that it was necessary to repeat each concert twice, at a week's interval. Attendance at these concerts, given for the benefit of the grammar schools of the city was not compulsory, but each concert found the auditorium filled with grammar school students, eager to hear

the orchestra. The Glee Club gave one of these concerts this year, while the orchestra gave two, and the orchestra and band combined to present the final one of these concerts on April 28.

East Orange once more had the honor of sending more musicians to the All-State High School Orchestra than any other high school in the state. As usual, the organization, composed of more than 225 pieces, met in Atlantic City, in the early part of November. A concert was given in the Atlantic City Auditorium to the largest audience ever assembled under one roof in the State of New Jersey. The orchestra, which draws its musical talent from the best players of every high school orchestra in the state, was praised very highly by all music critics. The same organization was asked to play again in February for the National Supervisors of Music Conference, but the offer was kindly declined.

The National High School Orchestra also had several East Orange names in its personnel. This orchestra, under the direction of Mr. Maddy, of national fame, Walter Damrosch, and other noted conductors gave concerts at Carnegie Hall, Philadelphia, and Washington, D. C.

One of the outstanding events of the year for the entire orchestra, however, was the winning of the first prize in the

New York Graphic Contest at Madison Square Garden, on March 29. For this achievement, the judges, including Edwin Franko Goldman, and John Phillip Sousa, awarded the large loving cup to the East Orange High School Orchestra. Not satisfied with winning first prize in the orchestra division, the band captured third prize in competition with twenty-one other bands. East Orange was the only High School band to reach the finals.

The band has also been active in appearances during the year, playing at all of the football games, participating and winning a prize in the dedication of the New City Hall; giving several concerts combined with the orchestra; and presenting many minor engagements.

The Upper-class and Lower-class chapels were entertained by both the band and orchestra in their concerts given April 2, and May 1.

Because of the high degree of success with which both the band and orchestra have met during the year, Mr. Herfurth holds every hope of both these organizations winning first place again, it will make the third consecutive year it has received this honor, and it may then keep the cup it has now, permanently. The orchestra has succeeded in capturing one first prize and one second prize during the two years it has competed in the contest. Two years ago, it was narrowly defeated for first place by Atlantic City, while last year the tables were reversed, and East Orange captured first, with Atlantic City trailing in second place. May 2 should find the band in excellent condition, ready to fight hard for possession of the first prize cup. The following day, May 3, will find the air of New Brunswick filled with beautiful music, and East Orange will be in the pink of shape to once more face their ancient rival of Atlantic City.

The active season of both of these outstanding organizations will culminate in the annual concert of the orchestra and band, on May 8 in the High School Auditorium. The favorite selections that the band and orchestra have played during the entire year will find a place on the program.

The members of both the orchestra and band want to thank Mr. Herfurth sincerely for everything he has done for them during the past year. The graduating members wish to take this opportunity of showing their appreciation to Mr. Herfurth for leading them to so many honors during the years of their membership, and to wish both the band and orchestra the best of luck in years to come in every undertaking—large or small.

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

## CLASS OF 1930 HOLDS FIRST REUNION

With all the spirit of a class fresh from high school, three hundred members of the Class of 1930 held their first reunion at the Ritz-Carlton Hotel, in New York City, on February 12th, Lincoln's birthday.

From the moment when the doors of the dining room swung open, up to the time of the singing of the last E. O. H. S. song, Walter Turkus the famous cinema star, led chorus after chorus, picking up each tune as Jack Mason, radio's foremost baton-wielder, played on the piano, and only stopping from time to time as the toastmaster. Emanuel Sarotzkin, whose recent translation of Ovid's Metamorphoses had made him famous, wished to call on a speaker. Lewis Grosenbaugh, editor of the New York Times, Dr. Leo S. Bell, eminent physician, Priscilla Anderson, the wellknown writer, and Robert Douglass, who is "wowing" audiences with his wise cracks, composed the committee in charge.

A special guest of the evening.
