## THE SENIOR CLASS HISTORY

WE, the members of the class of 1931, feel that we have faithfully fulfilled our parts in our four years of high school, and are now ready to set out for our respective goals. We feel that our education of the last four years has not been solely academic, but has been also four vears of experience in student government, athletics, debating, and other school activities.

We can well remember that eventful September morning when we trod clumsily, like the freshmen we were, to our Alma Mater. Then we were not the "cream of the earth," and we looked up admiringly to our elders, those dignified and respected seniors, juniors, and even sophomores.

The outstanding social event of the year for the senior girls was the Mother and Daughter Social, which was a decided success. ## THE STUDENT COUNCIL

$\mathcal{A}$$T$ the completion of its second year under the revised constitution, the Student Council can look back on fourteen years of service to East Orange High.
The most noteworthy business which was enacted this year was the revision of the smoking law. Research into the possibilities of alteration of the old law was begun at the start of the school year by a committee under the direction of Edward Stasse. After investigating the former law, the committee decided on revision by modification. The old law prohibited smoking on both sides of all the high school block, and one hundred feet in any direction beyond. The modified law reads as follows:
"All smoking by students of East Orange High School shall be prohibited between the hours of $8 \mathrm{~A} . \mathrm{M}$. and 4 P . M. in the following area: both sides of Walnut Street and Winans Street on the high school block, and all cars parked within that area. Smoking outside that area shall be referred to Mr. Files."

While the old law was practically a dead-letter, the new
smoking law has met with better success.
In addition to the new smoking law itself, a related addition, that of an executive committee, which was left incomplete last year, was finished by this year's council. The amendment provides for a committee of ten C. P.'s, selected for their merits as law enforcers, whose duty it is to consider problems of enforcement, and make additions and removals from the Corridor Patrol, with special attention to the smoking law. The committee has been in office since January, 1931.

The problem of a parking space for students' cars has been solved this year. Formerly, the cars were parked on Walnut and Winans Streets, where they were often muisances to the people who lived there. This year, however, the students' cars have been parked in the school yard by the gymnasium, and the new system has been very successful.

Under the revised constitution, the Student Council has worked in cooperation with the class councils, and the two groups, instead of being relatively separate organizations, have acted as branches of the E, O. H. S. association.

## THE STUDENT COURT

$\mathfrak{O}$HE close of this school year marks the completion of six years of successful operation on the part of the Student Court. Since the beginning of student government in East Orange High School, the unique experiment of a students' court has undergone many changes in method and management. At one time there was one Chief Justice with a Boys' Justice and a Girls' Justice as associates. At another time, there were separate courts for each class. The number of judges also varied with the years.

The system now in operation employs nine judges on the Boys' Court and nine on the Girls.' At the beginning of the year, each group selects one of its members to serve as Chief Magistrate. Court session is held during the short study period between 8:30 and the first period. That this method is efficient is shown by the fact that there have been no appeals from either court, in spite of the fact that extra sessions have had to be held several times during the year.

The Honor Study Hall, which was tried out this year for the first time, necessitated a complete change in the number
of hours of detention given out for offenses.
Whenever the members of East Orange High School at tend student government conventions, they find that our court is as successful as, if not more successful than, those of other schools. We can give the credit for six years of operation to several members of the faculty, along with the students active in such affairs. Among the former, Mr. Knight stands out. He has never interfered with the court's decision nor tried to influence the judges in any way. He has left all decisions to the students themselves, relying upon their fairness and impartiality.

This year's seniors have worked hard to put across a student court, and their work under Chief Justices Stasse and Bruen has received the reward of gaining the respect of the student body as a whole. The task remains for the juniors, sophomores, and freshmen to take up the work in such a way that the democratic, self-governing ideals for which former classes have labored shall not die out.

## THE CORRIDOR PATROL

3E East Orange High School Corridor Patrol, under the supervision of Mr. Davis, has just completed a very uccessful year. As most people know, this group of ju iors and seniors is the police body of our student government system. The Corridor Patrol is made up of the members of the Junior and Senior Class Councils, the Student Council, and also many pupils especially suited for C. P. duty, who are selected by Mr. Davis. This group has the task of keeping order in chapel, patrolling the lunch lines and corridors, and enforcing the various laws of the school, in the buildings and on the property.

During the 1930-31 school year a new system has been undertaken to enforce the smoking law of the school. A special committee of eleven was selected whose duty it is to prohibit
smoking on the school grounds and both sides of Walnut and Winans Streets between the hours of 8 A . M. and 4 P . M. on school days. The effectiveness of this committee was immediately shown by the marked decrease in violations of the smoking law, a law which is doubtless the most difficult to enforce of any school regulation. This committee, made up of Frank Hatch, Edward Stasse, Eugene Reichert, Walter Johnson, Douglas Hall, Leslie Pearson, Walter Pruden, Edward Scully, Murray Dietrich, Robert Riker, and Jack Cashen, also has the power to remove C. ## BOYS’ DEBATING CLUB

$\mathfrak{T}$IE first meeting of the East Orange High School Debating Club was held at 2:25 Wednesday, October 29 , 1930. At that meeting Mr. Greenan was reported absent on account of illness, but with the helpful assistance of Mrs. Adriance, the club managed to get along until December 10, 1930, when Mr. Greenan returned. Because of the absence of the adviser the first interscholastic debate was omitted. The teams representing East Orange in the first interscholastic debates of the year were highly successful. On February 6, 1931. the East Orange team, composed of George Dyson, Captain Wilbur Bowen, and Ferdinand Madrygin, alternate, went to Westfield with Mr. Greenan, the debating coach. Westfield was represented by J. Pearson Smith and Marguerite Degenring. The distinction of winning goes to East Orange, for Westfield was badly beaten.

By the student vote, East Orange won 84 votes, to Westfield's 19 ; by the faculty vote, East Orange had 14 votes to 6 for Westfield. George Dyson was declared the best speaker by a student vote of 79 , to 18 for Marguerite Degenring of

Westfield; and by the faculty vote the captain of the East Orange team again won 13 votes to 7 for his Westfield opponent.

The following Wednesday, February 11, 1931, Paul Anderson, Captain, Joseph Millimet, and Doris Stern, alternate, debated against Montclair at East Orange Paul Anderson, Captain of the East Orange team, was awarded the place of best speaker by the vote of the audience (receiving 16 votes to 7 for Robert Eichner, captain of the Montclair team). Representing Montclair was the team composed of Robert Eichner, Marion White, and Dorothy Walsh, alternate.

With these two victories at the beginning of the interscho'astic debating season, and with weekly practice on such timely subjects as the Prohibition Ouestion, State Control of Hydro-Electric Power, the Soviet Situation, Installment Buying, and the Chain Store Monopoly, East Orange has high hopes of coming through with a perfect score in the last interscholastic debate on the question: "Resolved: That Interscholastic Athletics Should Be Abolished.'

## BUSKIN AND BRUSH

BUSKIN and Brush, honorary dramatic society, was established to promote skill in the acting and producing of plays and to encourage among the students of the school an intelligent interest in the theatre. Membership in this society is open to all students who have been awarded the required number of credits for participation in school dramatics. The name Buskin and Brush is significant of the two-fold activity of the club. ## FOOTBALL

(NE of the finest football elevens in years, after a tie with West Orange, began a season of easy victories marred by losses to our bitterest rivals, Columbia and Barringer. Coach Spear, assisted by Bill Helbig, Ernie Benatre, and Frank Davis, achieved a fine record during his first year as head coach.

The boys who received their letters were Captain Dave Burke, Harry Howard, Don Whitehead, Nils Anderson, Carl Anderson, Ed Savage, Frank Ferrari, Karl Jensen, Johnny Clark, Bill Nichols, Dick Weisgerber, Arnold Cross, Dick Cross, Ben Marfuggi, Harry Green, Bob Ball, Dayton Matoon, Ed Downs, Lloyd Foley, Dick Helbig, and Manager Ed Stasse.

The opening game of the season with West Orange resulted in a 6-6 tie. Harry Green intercepted a West Orange pass and, aided by some fine interference, ran thirty-five yards for a touchdown. The opposing gridmen rallied to score late in the final period.

The Kearny game went to East Orange, 13-0, mainly through the fine work of Johnny Clark, whose spectacular runs netted the tallies.

This game was followed by a general rampage over Phillipsburg, 25-0, thus avenging the defeat in 1929. In this game Weisgerber and Clark each scored two touchdowns.

East Orange's first defeat of the year came in the game with Columbia, who won mainly through the use of the unbalanced line, a system adopted by East Orange later in the season. Nevertheless, the Red and Black eleven were generally outplayed, and it was only by inches that they escaped a tie. This battle royal takes second place in importance to the Barringer tilt only, for it proved a contest worthy of both elevens, who exhibited the finest type of sportsmanship both on and off the gridiron.

The opening period was not very old when Weisgerber, East Orange plunging back, plowed through the center of the South Orange line for a four-yard gain, but in being spilled, dropped the pigskin, which was on Columbia's forty-six-yard line. A series of line bucks, spinners, and a deceptive aerial attack brought the ball within feet of the East Orange goal. After meeting a stone wall on two successive tries, Sandbach went over for a touchdown. From that point on it was East Orange's game. Try as they would, however, the Red and Blue team could not pass that final chalk mark, although several chances failed by the smallest of margins. East Orange had their chance to pull the game from the fire when the ball was on the one-foot line, but poor judgment was shown in trying to go through Pat Stark, all-state linesman.

The game with Montclair went, by the score of $26-0$, to the Red and Blue warriors, who trampled at will over the upper New Jersey boys. Helbig, Weisgerber, Anderson, and Clark each went over the line once.

The annual Election Day feature with Plainfield was fought in a sea of mud, but East Orange defeated their rivals for the first time in four years, 19-0. The Plainfield squad was unusually weak and proved easy prey for the East Orange players, who were right at home on a muddy field. Terrific line drives, and an exceptionally fine passing attack were the keynotes to this victory. Although the visitors held our men to a $0-0$ deadlock for the first quarter, they were swept off their feet in the last three periods, in which, through the excellent work of Nichols, Anderson, and Savage, the home team scored once each period.

Coach Spear's men continued their winning streak, taking over the Eastside Newark eleven, 26-0. This game was featured by runs of forty-one and forty-five yards by Johnny

Clark, netting a touchdown in each case. Weisgerber scored the other two.

The annual Thanksgiving Day classic went to a powerful Barringer team, 34-12, in one of the biggest upsets of the year. The Newarkers broke their losing streak, which had started back in 1928, mainly through the excellent work of Captain Mike Berman and Fred Caruso. The latter back started the onslaught with a sixty-five-yard run that netted a touchdown in the opening period. In the following quarter, he ran fiftyeight yards before being downed by Clark on the six-yard strip. Berman took the ball over on a center concentration attack and kicked the extra point. The second period was barely under way when Gialanella, giant linesman, made a beautiful field goal from the thirty-yard line, making the score 16-0. An intercepted pass by Berman brought the total to 22-0. 'It was then that Carl Anderson caught a pass from Cross and ran seventy-five yards to the Blue's six-yard line. Nichols went over for the first East Orange tally. He scored late in the final period on a pass from Clark, but Berman retaliated with another touchdown, thus increasing his total to three. The final score remained 34-12.

The post-season fray with West Orange went to East Orange, 20-6, avenging the tie earlier in the season. A fumble by Nelson in the first period was caught by Hannon, who ran thirty-seven yards for West Orange's only score. A furious aerial attack in the third and fourth periods paved the way to victory, Anderson scoring twice on passes by Clark, and Clark himself running sixty-five yards for a touchdown in the last quarter. This is the first game ever played by East Orange for charity.

In one of the closest elections in years, Dick Weisgerber was elected captain of the 1931 team by a small margin over Frank Ferrari, and next season Halsey "Red" Warner will replace Stasse as manager.

The Demrofer Club of the First Reformed Church of East Orange awarded Don Whitehead the silver loving cup given each year to the best interference man.

Clark, Nichols, Burke, N. Anderson, Howard, Savage, Helbig, Green, Whitehead, Jensen, Ball, Matoon, Downs, and Foley all graduate in June, leaving few men for Coach Spear to work with. Weisgerber, Ferrari, C. Anderson, A. Cross, D. Cross, and Marfuggi will be the only letter-men back.

The opening contest with Kearny proved an easy victory the home five triumphing, 30-17. Skilling, who played for part of the season, topped the list with nine points. The game was never in doubt, and the Red and Blue players had an easy time of it.

The Columbia tussle proved a heart-breaking defeat, 22-21. Ken Sandbach proved the winners' ace, scoring Columbia's last two-pointer that brought the score to 22-19. Then Johnny Clark made it 22-21, with fifty-eight seconds to go, but the South Orangers "froze" the ball for the remaining time.

## SWIMMING TEAM

0OACH STAN GRIFFIN'S snappy crew of acquatic performers enjoyed a very successful 1931 season, with ten wins out of a possible eleven in dual competition, all of which were overshadowed by a glorious victory in the state meet at Trenton, where the Red and Blue won the championship for the second consecutive year.

Led by their captain, Don Chalmers, the home team began the season with an easy 44-22 victory over the Montclair "Y" aggregation. East Orange captured every first place except in the fifty-yard sprint, in which Ryan of the losers took the event by a nose from Harry Green.

This was followed by a victory over West Side of Newark, 48-18. Chalmers placed easy first in the hundred and two hundred. Cook of the downtown team won the forty-yard backstroke from Bob Mervine for Newark's only first place.

The Barringer squad also proved an easy victim, with East Orange holding the long end of the score, 45-21. Chalmers once again proved his worth by collecting first honors in the hundred and two-hundred-yard events. Johnny Kashkevich, big Blue star and holder of many records, took the backstroke event and was a close second to Chalmers in the two hundred.

Plainfield then bowed, 39-27. The Union County team
placed first in only the 160-yard relay and dive. The home team experienced no difficulty in winning this fourth straight victory.

Blair Academy gave East Orange a fight to keep its record untarnished, making Griffin's proteges step to win 38-28. Donelly and Carpenter were the Blair team's outstanding performers, with firsts in the forty and hundred-yard dashes respectively.

Pingry proved easy opposition, losing the meet, 50-16. Harry Green featured for East Orange with first places in the forty and hundred-yard free-style events.

Barringer again suffered a reverse, succumbing 47-19, and the South Side contingent lost their meet, 53-13, in the highest scoring win of the season. East Orange took every first and second place in this competition.

Plainfield again lost, 40-26, and Pingry was conquered, 43-23. Then the last dual meet of the season with Lawrenceville was lost, 47-19. The individual rivalry in this swim was unmatched throughout the season. Cashen was beaten in a close finish in the breast-stroke by Taylor of Lawrenceville, and

Chalmers suffered his first defeat in the two-hundred-yard free style when Berizzi of the winners won the event in the fast time of $2: 174 / 5$.

On Saturday, March 14, the entire team traveled to Trenton, from which they emerged victorious, winning the state crown, with 29 points, West Side of Newark and Plainfield tieing for the second place with twelve points, with Hasbrouck Heights, 10 ; Hackensack, 5 ; Atlantic City, 3, and Asbury Park and Barringer, 2.

East Orange placed first in the relay, the two-hundred and the fifty-yard free styles, and the breast-stroke, and took enough second and third honors to secure the meet. The feature of the entire meet was the breast-stroke event, in which Jack Cashen set a new record for the hundred-yard distance, one minute, fifteen and two-fifths seconds.

Captain Don Chalmers, Healy, Condon, Mervine, Anderson, Cashen, Cleveland, Wildnatuer, Green, Wynne, and Simpson all received their letters.

## ORCHESTRA AND BAND

$\mathfrak{T}$HE excellence of the E. O. H. S. orchestra and band, under the able direction of Mr. Herfurth, will soon become a tradition in the high school. This year, as in those preceding, the two groups have grown in instrumentation and have developed as fine a quality of tone as ever.

During the school year of 1930-1931 the orchestra has given two formal concerts, two childrens' concerts, and one concert in the Junior High School, while the band has given one formal concert, and one childrens' concert, both in conjunction with the orchestra.

This year marks the fourth annual state contest for orchestras and bands of all preparatory or high schools that care to enter. Our groups have each won first place, twice out of the three trials and, at the time of this writing, have great hopes and expectations of capturing the trophies for the third time. after which these statuettes will become the permanent possessions of the high school. It is confidently expected that the orchestra, if it wins, will enter the national orchestral contest.

It is significant to say that E. O. H. S. had the largest representation of any high school in the All-Eastern Orchestra, which was composed of selected high school students from the ten eastern states, and which met at Syracuse, New York. Our delegates numbered twelve.

The additions to the orchestra have been three harps, an English horn, and two key of C piccolos, while there have been none to the band. With these new instruments the orchestra now numbers seventy-seven, which includes two post-graduates, nineteen seniors, twenty-four juniors, and thirty-two sophomores and freshmen. The band boasts a membership of sev-enty-two, consisting of two post-graduates, seventeen seniors, seven juniors, and the rest sophomores and freshmen.

Both groups were organized this year on a plan embodying the popular election of officers, whose duty it is to see that all things are functioning properly, to assist in the planning of concerts and trips, and in other ways to help Mr. Herfurth as much as possible. The officers were elected from only the seniors and juniors and for this year were as follows: President, Robert Fenwick; Vice-president in charge of orchestra, Robert Elder; Vice-president in charge of band, Marcus Messing; Secretary, Jack Waite; Treasurer, Charles Bergmann; Librarian, John Emma; and Student Leader, Marcus Messing.

The outlook for next year, as Mr. Herfurth sees it, is quite promising, as there will be enough good musicians from the junior orchestra to fill the places left by those who will leave the school this June. And so we may look forward confidently to having as fine an orchestra and band in the years to come as we have had in the past.
