The East Orange News

FOR an unbroken span of thirty-four years, East Orange High School has been represented by the *News*, which has appeared over this course of years, both as a newspaper and as a magazine, and which has ranged in price from five cents to fifteen cents. For a publication dependent on the support of the student body, this unbroken stretch of publication is something to be proud of, although sometimes the paper did not receive the whole-hearted support of the students.

In the year 1899, the first issue of the *News* appeared in the high school, called simply the *News*. The paper was a small eight-page, three-column journal, selling at five cents a copy. The editor of the pioneer edition was William H. Bingham, and the associate editor, H. Seaver Jones. It was issued, as the present paper, bi-weekly. The articles in the paper did not carry headlines as in an ordinary newspaper, but merely titles, as on an everyday editorial page.

The following school year, and for the succeeding nineteen years, the *News* appeared in the form of a magazine. The magazine averaged between twenty and twenty-six pages, consisting of two columns each. A special section of the magazine was devoted to advertising. The editor-in-chief of the first magazine was George G. Smith. Appearing in the form that it did, the *News* naturally contained feature stories, as in an ordinary magazine. The paper, which was issued monthly, was priced at ten cents a copy.

In the year 1906-07, the style of the magazine was changed slightly. The pages, which had heretofore been made up of two columns, were transformed into one column pages, which had the effect of making the articles stand out more. The paper also had a higher average as to the number of pages. In the issue of the year 1913-14, the paper in the magazine was changed to the unglazed type. The pages were more numerous and slightly narrower, and the price went up to fifteen cents a copy. Again in 1914-15, the style of the magazine changed. The glazed paper was again employed, and the pages were enlarged. The magazine was also changed back to the two-column page.

Issue number twenty, of the year 1918-19, was the last issue of the magazine. During the school year a campaign was held as to the students' choice of the type of publication. In the end, it was decided to issue a bi-weekly newspaper instead of the former

magazine. The staff of the *News*, under the leadership of Thomas L. Dartnell, the editor-in-chief, issued in June of 1919, a sample of the new style paper, as an example of the change in policy. From that day until the present, the *News* has existed formally as a newspaper.

The first year of the newspaper was under the editorship of Benjamin W. McCready. The paper consisted of eight pages of four columns each. There was a feature page, a sports page, and an editorial page. The cartoons of Norton B. Jackson were very prominent in this issue. The paper still contained, moreover, a few original stories by the high school students. The price of the bi-weekly paper was five cents a copy, although the next year the price was raised to ten cents, where it has remained until the present day.

The paper, during recent years, except this year's paper, has had but minor changes. The title has been officially changed from the *E. O. H. S. News* to the *East Orange News* of this year. In more recent years, the pages were not so large as those of the earlier editions of the paper, although the present paper has the largest pages of any edition so far.

At the close of the year 1931-32, it was discovered that the *News* had lost over five hundred dollars because of lack of support and the existing economical conditions. It was decided that the paper must be able to pay for itself, if it was to be published. The subscription system, which had been abandoned after 1930, was again tried. For a few weeks the fate of the paper was in doubt, but after much discussion and canvassing for subscriptions, the paper was able to be published. The subscription rate was reduced to one dollar, and an installment system, by which the subscriber was able to buy ten issues at ten cents each and receive the remaining issues free, was inaugurated. The number of pages was reduced to four, but the size was increased to five columns. The number of feature articles was reduced, to include more actual news articles. Because of the retirement of Mr. Evans as head of the English department, Mr. Bauer, who succeeded him, was unable to continue as faculty adviser. Mr. Theron E. Coffin, the former assistant adviser, became the adviser, being assisted by Mr. Paul Bowden, who, with the cooperation of the entire *News* board, have made the 1932-33 edition of the *News* a complete success.

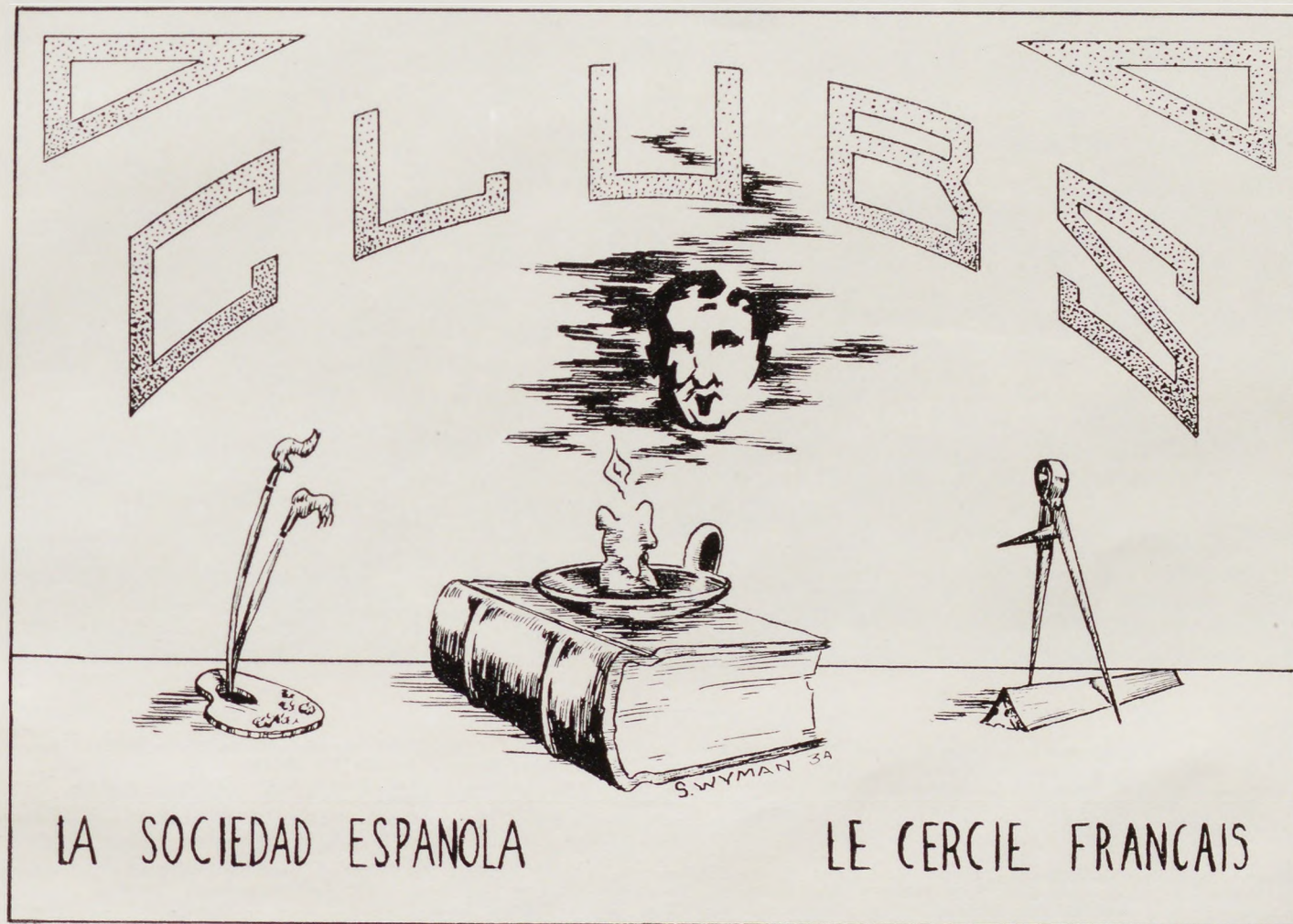

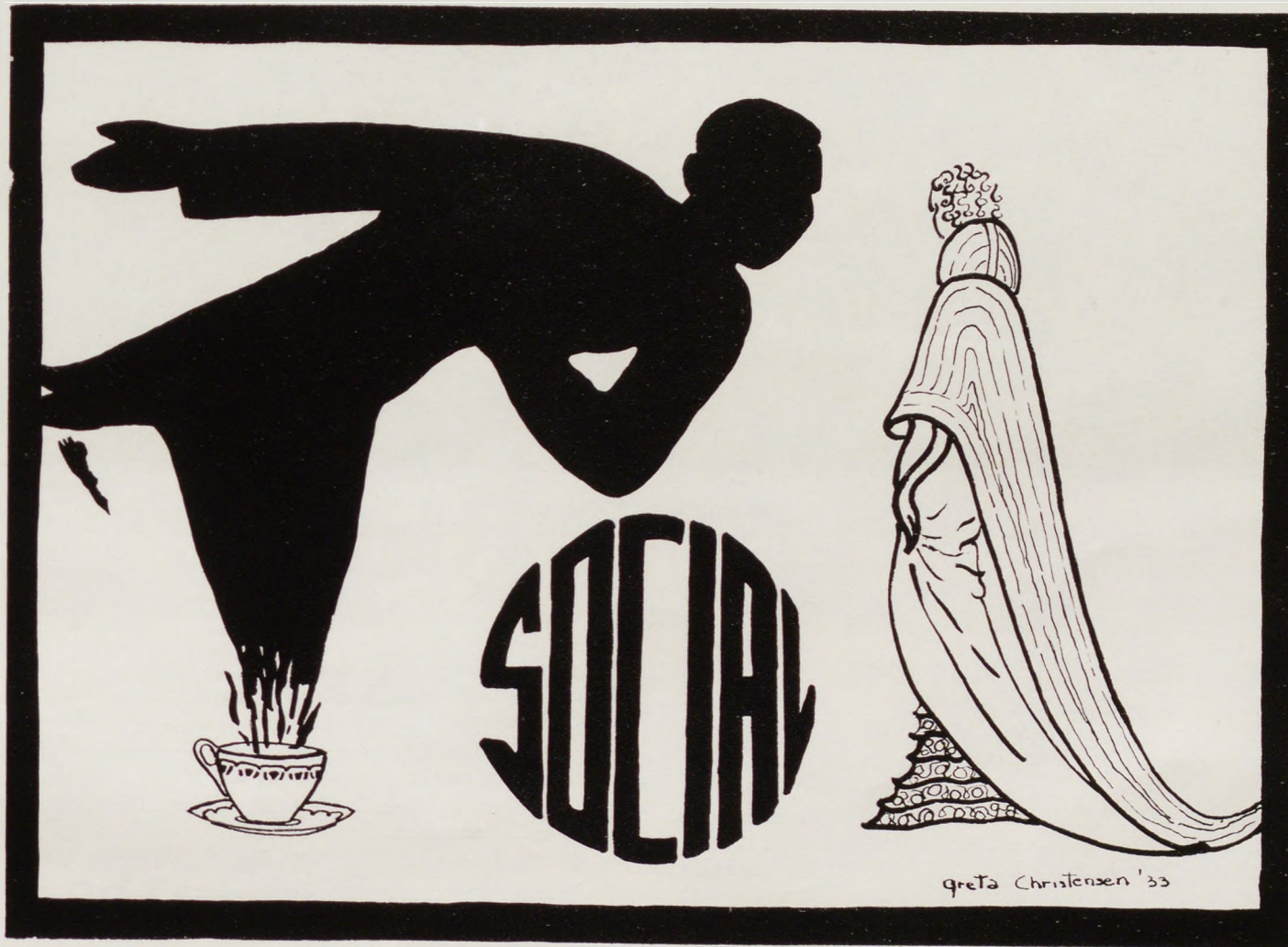
All meetings are made as interesting and as beneficial as pos-

THE *Cassilis Engagement*, the famous four-act comedy of English society by St. John Hankin, was presented under the direction of Laurence B. Goodrich on the evening of Thursday, March 9, 1933.

The Cassilises of the play are an aristocratic family of Leicestershire. The engagement is that of young Geoffrey, the pride and the heir of this family, who at the beginning of the action considers himself in love with the pretty but unsuitable Ethel Borridge—much to the delight of her mother and the dismay of his. The gentle but firm determination with which Mrs. Cassilis sets out to end this engagement constitutes the strong motive power of the plot.

The twelve roles of the drama were played with convincing assurance by a talented cast. Mary Simpson, as Ethel, conveyed vividly the winning charm and rebellious resentment which combined to make her interpretation one of vital contrasts. In the role of Mrs. Borridge, her mother, Ruth Ann Williamson gave one of the most vigorous pieces of character acting seen on the high school stage. She entered into her part with an imagination and enthusiasm which delighted the audience. Charles Hearsey lent sensitive sincerity and warmth of feeling to the impulsive but somewhat inarticulate Geoffrey. The Countess of Remenham, as interpreted by Ruth Collins, displayed an acrimonious distinction which contrasted interestingly with the gracious poise of Jessie Lee's Lady Marchmont. Janet Roberts brought understanding and patrician dignity to the exacting role of Mrs. Cassilis. As Major Warrington, Arthur Rosen played with a spontaneous relish that made his difficult character entirely convincing. Betty Ogston portrayed Mabel with simple restraint and charm. Marvin Raskin made a vigorous and witty Rector, and Edith Walling was an appropriately supercilious Mrs. Herries. As Dorset and Watson, Jean McIntosh and Paul Schwartz played small parts with care and finish.

Old gold hangings, elegant lamps and furniture, and a profusion of colorful flowers gave distinction and grace to the setting, which, combined with the effective acting, made a very attractive production.

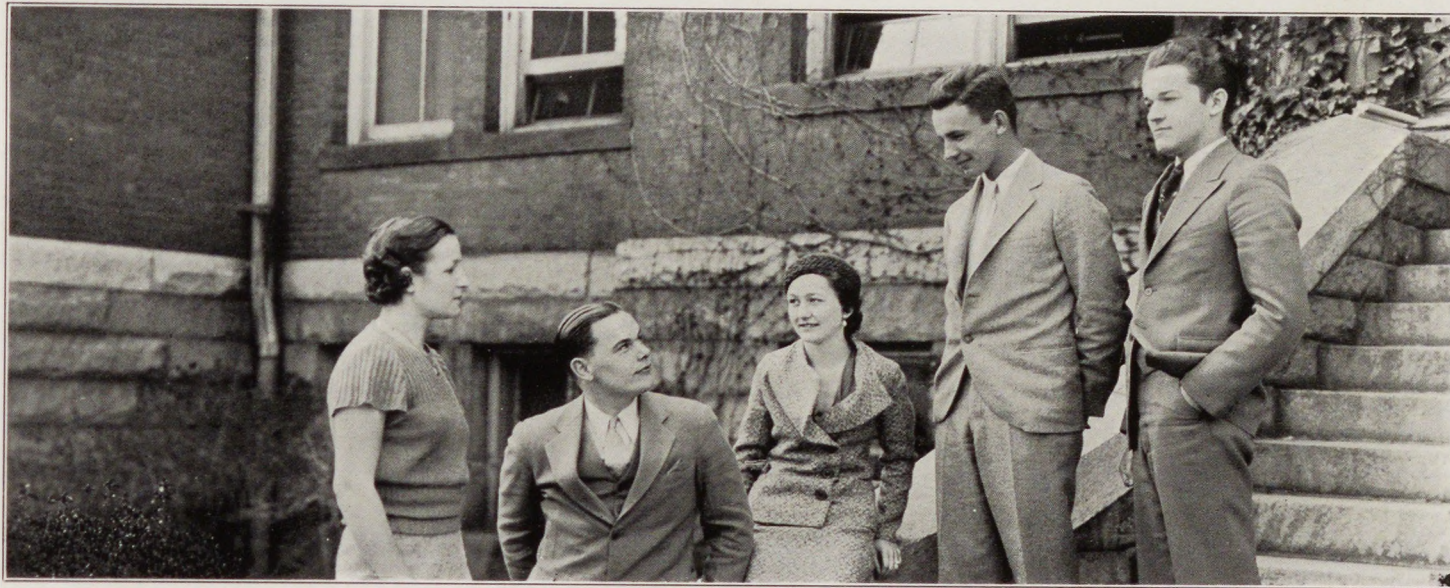
"PINAFORE"

Band and Orchestra

THE band and orchestra, under the capable leadership of Mr. C. P. Herfurth, the conductor of the two organizations, have just completed another fine year.

The officers of the two groups were elected by popular vote of the members. The orchestra elected Rowland Rose, President; Sidney Brantley, Vice-President; Lois Decker, Secretary; Jack Waterbury, Treasurer. Sidney Brantley was Concert Master. Officers of the band were James Martin, President; Robert Stempel, Vice-President; Stuart Hand, Secretary; Jack Waterbury, Treasurer. Robert Stempel and John McIntosh were Librarians for both groups. It was the duty of those elected to see that all things functioned properly at meetings. A committee, appointed to assist Mr. Herfurth in planning concerts and trips and to be in every way helpful, consisted of the officers of both organizations and Robert Wilkinson, Donald Wilson, and Erving Arundale.

It is significant to say that three members of the orchestra, Arthur Kuby, Edward Dragnett, and Robert Goodman, attended the All-State High School Orchestra held at Atlantic City in November, 1932.

The programs of the band and orchestra for the school year, 1932-1933, were as follows:

The band played at the football games during the season. At the final game on Thanksgiving Day, the band formed the letters "B. H. S." for Barringer and "E. O." for East Orange. It may be fitting to say here that Robert Raymond, Drum Major of the band, died in February, 1933. The band also gave a concert of patriotic selections at the Lincoln's Birthday Celebration held at the City Hall on Monday, February 13, 1933.

At the first of the semi-annual Children's Concerts given on Tuesday afternoon, December 13, 1932, the orchestra played *Ballet Egyptian* by Luigini; *Lobengrin*, Prelude to Act III, by Wagner; *Waltz of the Flowers* from the *Nutcracker Suite* by Tchaikowsky; and *Farandole*, from *L'Arlesienne* by Bizet. On Thursday evening, December 15, 1932, the orchestra gave the same numbers in a joint concert of Christmas selections with the Glee Clubs.

The cooperative spirit of the band and orchestra in giving free concerts for the entertainment of the citizens of East Orange

was shown by the three Sunday evening concerts at Columbian Grammar School, Franklin Grammar School, and the Vernon L. Davey Junior High School in March. The selections played by the band were *Atlantis Suite* by Safranek, and *In a Chinese Temple Garden* by Ketelbey. The orchestra played *Four Indian Love Lyrics* by Amy Woodfarde-Finden, and the entire *Ballet Music* from Gounod's *Faust*.

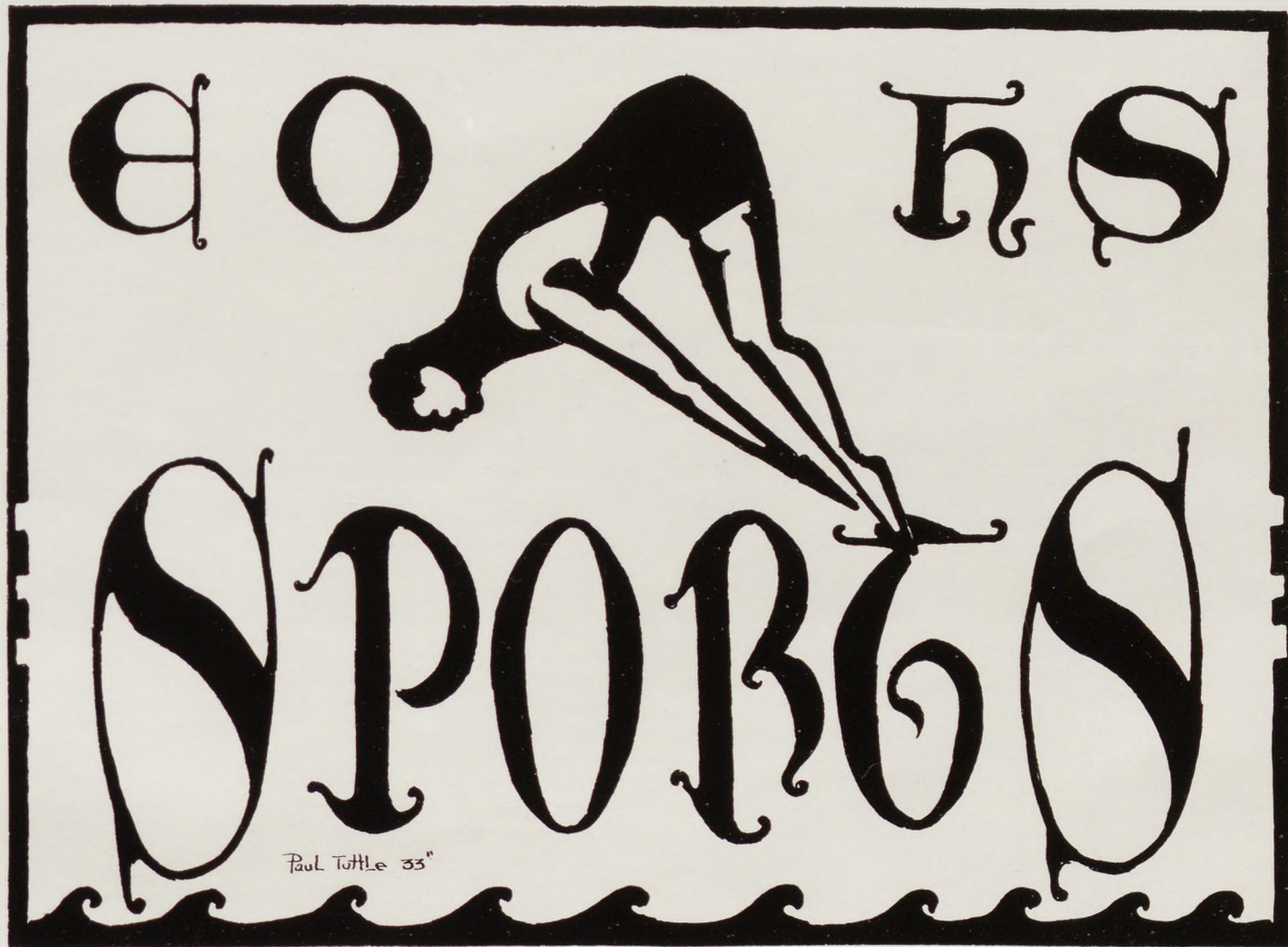
At the invitation of the supervisor of music at Roselle Park High School, the band and orchestra gave a joint concert there on April 26, 1933. The orchestra played, in addition to the selections mentioned above, the *Andante* from the *Fifth Symphony* by Tschaikowsky and *Triumphal March* by Grieg. The band played the pieces mentioned above, and *Bolero* by Ravel and *Coronation March* by Meyerbeer. Likewise, at the invitation of the supervisor of music at Verona High School, the orchestra gave a concert in April, 1933, in Verona, consisting of the same selections as played at Roselle Park.

This year the state band and orchestra contests were held at Elizabeth on April 29, 1933, under a new system of judging which gave every contesting organization a fair chance. The required contest piece for the orchestra was *Triumphal March* from *Sigurd Jorsalfar* by Grieg. The optional selection of Mr. Herfurth and his committee was the *Second Movement*, or *Andante*, from the *Fifth Symphony* by Tschaikowsky. The required band number was *Coronation March* from *The Prophet* by Meyerbeer. The optional piece was *Bolero* by Maurice Ravel.

At the second of the semi-annual Children's Concerts, held on May 10, 1933, the band and orchestra, in a joint concert, gave the same program as that played on April 26 and repeated it at the annual evening concert, presented on May 11.

At the state contest held in New Brunswick on May 7, 1932, the band placed second to Atlantic City, who thereby gained permanent possession of the band trophy, having won twice previous to 1932. The orchestra was ineligible to enter the contest in 1932, having gained permanent possession of the orchestra trophy in 1931.

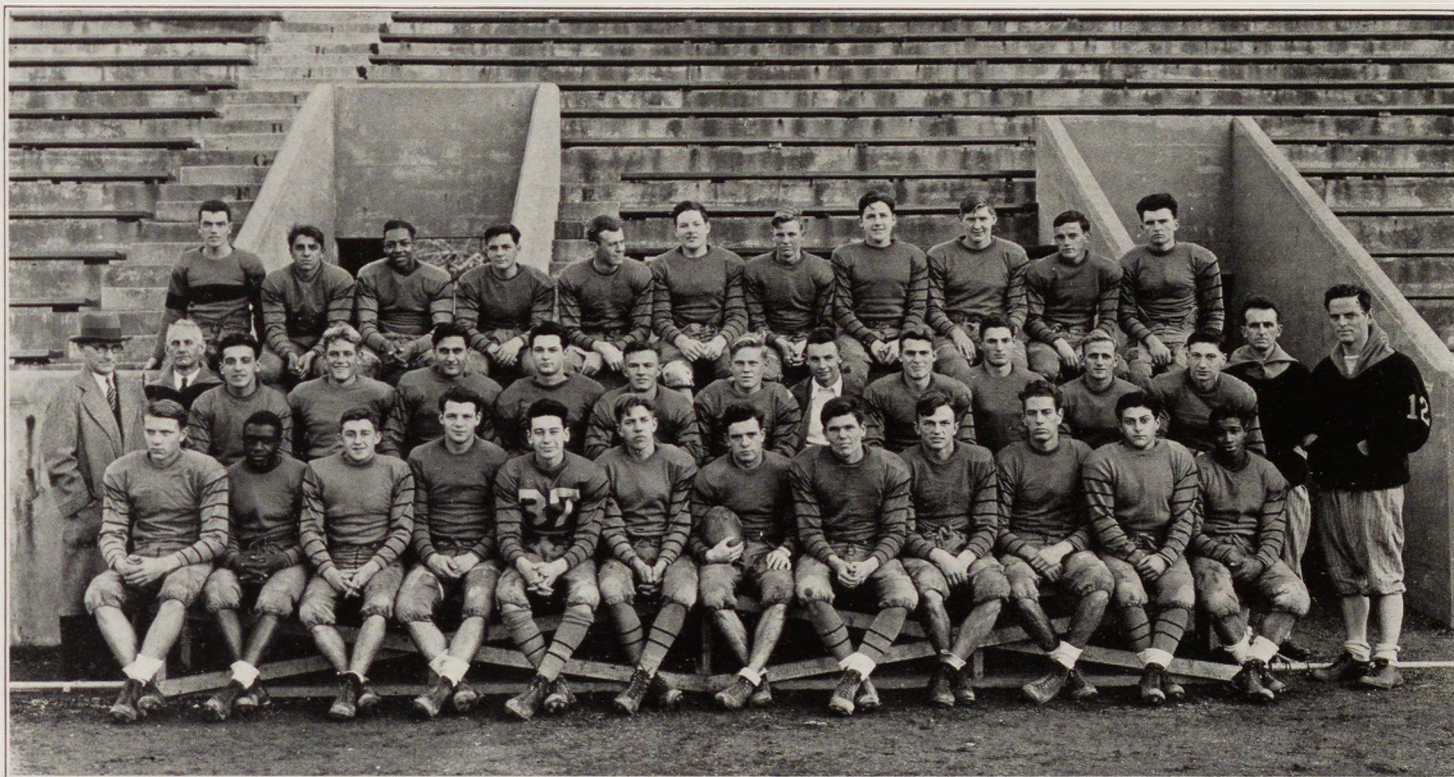

Football

ALTHOUGH the 1932 East Orange High School football team was by no means a great team, it was, however, one of the best elevens to represent the suburban school on the gridiron in many years. A green squad early in the season, it developed into a fighting and well-balanced machine by November.

Candidates for the team reported for a short spring practice session, but it was not until September that Coach Spear sent his charges through intensive drills. Only a handful of veterans remained, and the Red and Blue coaching staff was also hampered by the extreme lightness of the boys.

On September 24, the suburbanites opened their season with West Side High School at Ashland Stadium. Showing unexpected strength, the Green handed the homesters a 12-0 set-back. A strong passing attack was West Side's main factor of victory.

Kearny High played host to the team on October 1 and scored an easy victory over the greatly outweighed Red and Blue eleven by a 26-6 count. Alvin Caesar raced thirty yards for East Orange's only score late in the game.

On the following Saturday, October 8, East Orange cast a bombshell into local competition by defeating West Orange, 13-0. The Walnut Streeters kept inviolate their record of never having been defeated by the Maroon and White, although several games have resulted in ties. Wyman and Caesar scored for the winners. The victory fell hollow, however, when Roger Hurlburt, varsity center, was removed from the field with a badly fractured leg. Eddie Owens also went on the injured list with a broken shoulder bone.

Although the Plainfield High eleven defeated the local team 6-0 on October 15 at Ashland Stadium, East Orange was accorded a 1-0 forfeit victory later in the season, as Plainfield had used an

ineligible player against the Red and Blue. The East Orangeites outplayed the visitors during almost the entire game except for a minute early in the second half, when Plainfield pushed over the winning score on a trick play.

Journeying to Essex Field on October 22, the Red and Blue machine recorded an easy 12-0 victory over Montclair High. Only a desperate Montclair defense prevented the visitors from running up a much larger count.

Orange High visited Ashland Field on October 29 and held the East Orangeites to a scoreless tie in a rather slow fray. The Red and Blue backfield advanced the ball several times deep into Orange territory but failed to click for a score.

On November 5, one of the strongest football teams ever to represent Nutley High School moved into Ashland Stadium to do battle with the team. For three periods, an inspired Red and Blue team held the famed Nutley offense at a standstill. With three minutes to go in the final period, the home team cracked under the terrific strain, and the Maroon pushed over two touchdowns to win, 13-6.

A strong Columbia High football machine swooped down on Ashland Stadium on November 12, confident of victory over the light East Orangeites. Red and Black hopes soared when the villagers pushed over a six-pointer early in the second period, but the Walnut Streeters were not to be outdone, and they, in turn, scored only a few minutes after Columbia. After this, the visitors were swamped by a flood of East Orange attacks and scoring sorties, and, when the final whistle blew, the score was 26-6 in favor of the Red and Blue eleven.

Elated by their overwhelming victory over the Villagers, the team settled down to strenuous drill before the traditional Thanksgiving Day clash with Barringer High School.

City Stadium, the scene of the battle, was in poor condition when the two teams trotted out to warm up on the eventful day. As the elevens lined up for the kick-off, the Barringer players seemed to be veritable giants in comparison with the light Red and Blue squad, and, after the game had commenced, the Blue derived a great advantage from their superiority in weight.

The Barringer backfield gained almost at will through the light suburban line on a series of crushing spinner and off-tackle plays interspersed with short passes. The light but fast Red and Blue backs, on the other hand, could not get going on the muddy turf and were repeatedly thrown for big losses by the hard-charging Barringer linesmen. In all, the Blue pushed over four touch-

downs and an extra point for a total of twenty-five credits while holding the visitors scoreless.

Although many members of the 1932 squad will be lost by graduation, an almost entirely veteran eleven will report to Coach Spear next season. Both varsity quarterbacks, Eddie Owens and Wally Nelson, will be missing, but Coach Spear will have a wealth of other promising aspirants to pick from in order to replace these two stellar performers.

Among the varsity men who will graduate this year are Clark Curchin, Eddie Owens, Wallace Nelson, Ray Sanders, Gordon Doudt, Roger Hurlburt, and Captain Lloyd Foley.

Swimming

DESPITE the fact that graduation had left him but three of last year's swimming champions, Coach Griffin cheerfully took up his task of developing another swimming team of which East Orange would be proud. By winning ten out of eleven dual meets, and by taking third place in the state meet, the inexperienced East Orange team turned in a more than satisfactory season.

After taking over a surprisingly strong Montclair team, 38-37, and Columbia, 40-35, the boys went to Lawrenceville and were beaten 55-20, but came back by defeating Plainfield, 40-35; Col-

In the state meet, the 200-yard relay team composed of Manning, Wilson, McClave, and Peschel, placed third, and the 150-yard medley team (McClave, back stroke; Baker, breast stroke; and Manning, free style) took second. Don Wilson added two val-

uable points, as he took third in the 100-yard free style; and in the 50-yard free style, Al Peschel became the hero of the meet, as he took the only East Orange first.

Consistent high scorers were Don McClave, letter man of two seasons, who gained many needed yards swimming on the relay teams; Clarence Healy, another veteran, turning in many good performances in the 200-yard free style; and Horace Wynne, star

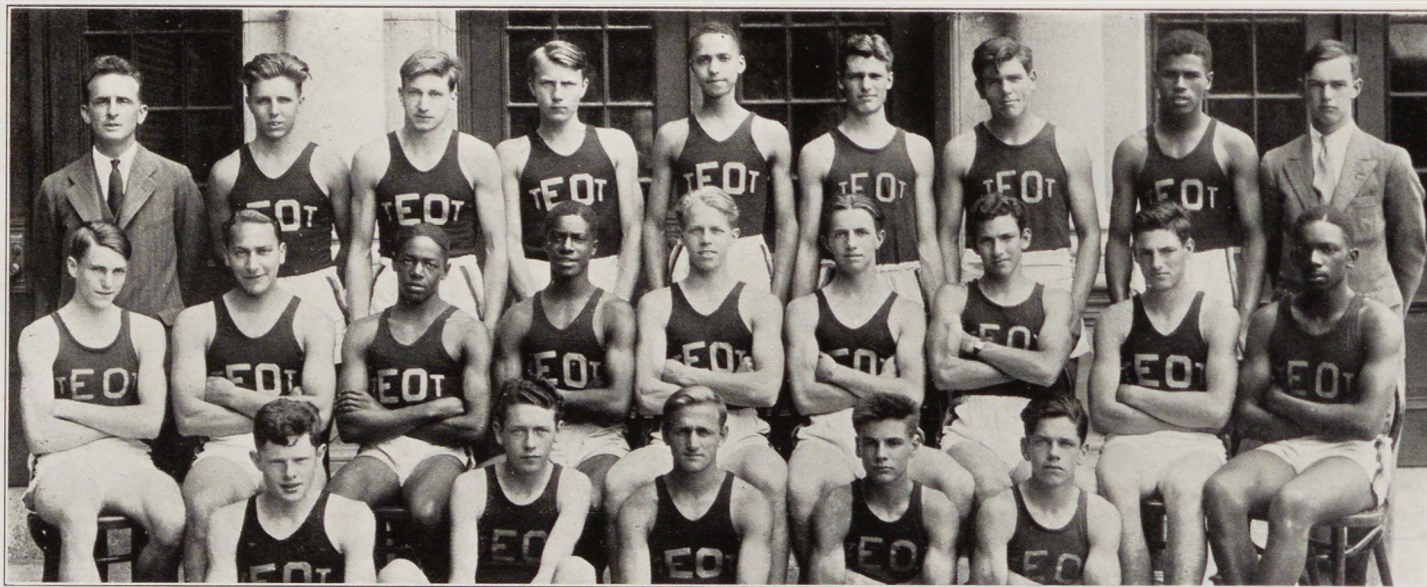
diver who won his letter for the third year. Al Peschel took high place among the scorers by collecting no less than 16 first places swimming in the 40-yard free style and the 100-yard back stroke, while Dick Baker, dependable breast stroke star, and Bob Manning, sprint star, also were high scorers.

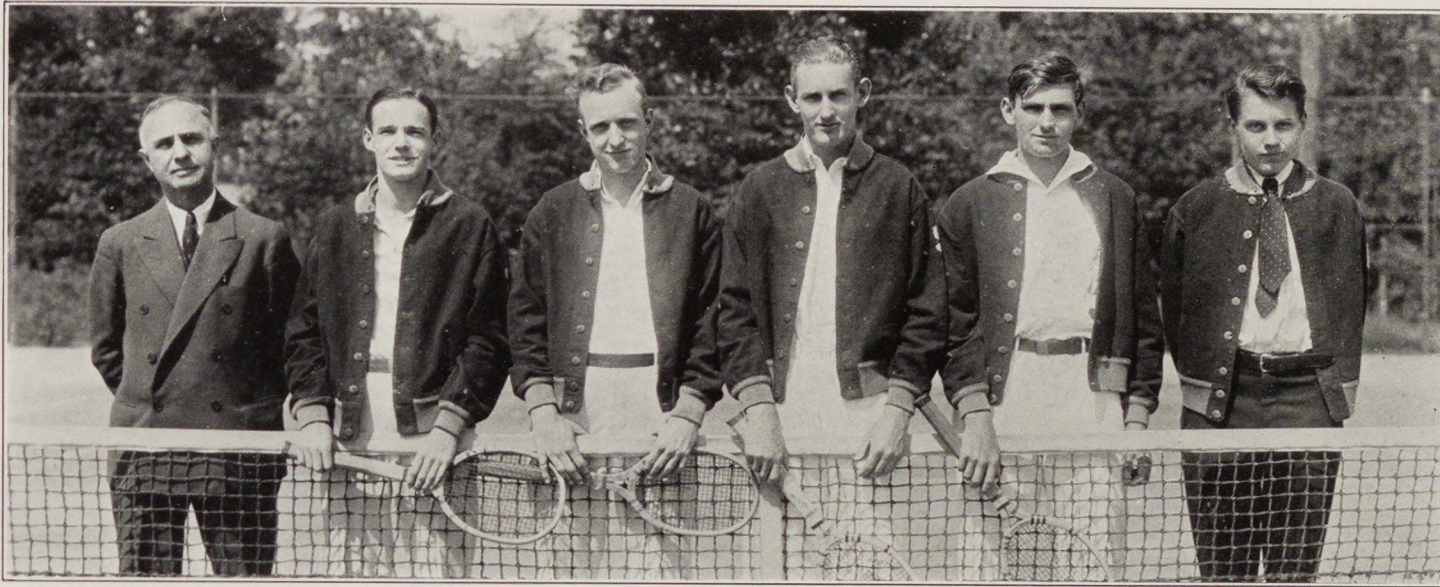
