Senior Class History

IKE other freshmen in other high schools all over the country, we entered the spacious halls of East Orange High School with eager eyes and high hopes. It was difficult, at first, to get into the swing of things, but we soon became active members of the student body.

These representatives worked hard and proved to be able officers in upholding the standards of the school.

The social committee performed very well, sponsoring a number of committee dances and two grand and successful proms.

Seniors formed the backbone of our varsity football and basketball teams, both of which were quite successful. Seniors appeared in some of the matinees and composed the greater part of the annual play *Big-Hearted Herbert*.

We were truly sorry to lose Doris Pierce; we shall always like to feel that she graduated with us.

Years from now, we shall open the covers of our Syllabus. We shall gaze fondly upon pictures of old friends and classmates, and feel in our hearts the sharp stirrings of pride in this, our class of 1935.

I did not have time to see them, as I was invited to spend the remaining two days of my stay at Paula Murphy's lovely mountain home, next door to Virginia LeMassena's log cabin.

Two weeks later I was saddling my pony in the corral of Jane Munro's Montana ranch, when the telegram came. It was short and very much to the point. "If you're still taking pictures, stop stop. Firm bankrupt stop Salary must be stopped." I stopped.

And so, today I am a weary, disillusioned old woman, writing reminiscences of the pleasantest summer of my life—with Mr. Average American Citizen.



Student Council

HE two outstanding projects which the 1934-1935 Student Council undertook and carried through were an eight-point plan for the improvement of school government and a revision of the constitution of the General Organization.

The eight-point plan was formulated by a committee of representatives who attended the Student Government Conference at Trenton. The plan provided for a meeting of all students participating in school government at which reports from the conference were given, an open meeting of all students interested fostering a school improvement project, a discussion in the home rooms concerning student government, the formation of a permanent improvement committee, the formation of a correspondence committee to keep in touch with Student activity in other schools, the preparation of an instructive handbook, regular auditorium periods, publicity in the *High School News*, and entertainment during lunch periods. This plan was carried out by a number of committees chosen from the Student Council.

The constitution of the General Organization was revised by a committee of four. The changes which were made were numerous. The more radical changes were a new method of electing officers which would offer better officer material, and the addition of students to the membership of the Student Council, so as to increase committee material and afford a more representative and democratic governing body.

HE Band and Orchestra had a very successful season this year under the able guidance of C. Paul Herfurth, director of instrumental music in the East Orange Public Schools.

The annual fall and spring concerts were presented on the evenings of November 8, 1934, and May 9, 1935. These concerts were, as they have always been, outstanding successes, demonstrating the excellent musical talent of the school. The performances rendered both organizations self-supporting and the first concert also made possible the participation of sixteen members of the orchestra in the All-State Orchestra concert at Atlantic City on November 11, 1934.

Other East Orange students who were members of this 275 piece orchestra were Roberta Hogan, solo trumpet; Robert Gitzendanner, second chair trumpet; Livingston Gearhart, solo oboe; Arthur Kubey, solo bassoon; Allison Schleicher, second chair clarinet; Page Grosenbaugh, second chair flute; Scott Schleicher, trombone; Irving Smith, saxophone; Wilbur Hirsch, saxophone; Marie Meriam, first violin; Josephine Guariglia, first violin; Betsy Bissell, 'cello; Ruth Ormiston, 'cello; Sherwood Bayne, 'cello; John Friery, drums.

East Orange also feels proud that its own Mr. Herfurth was one of the conductors. He directed the All-State Orchestra in two of the most outstanding numbers of the concert: the famous Mississippi Suite by Grofe, and the Adagio Pathetique. Many of the members of the Orchestra and Band are of the Class of 1935 and here wish to thank Mr. Herfurth for his excellent guidance of their musical talents.



Football-1934

HE East Orange 1934 football team experienced a rather mediocre season. The whole season was marked by numerous injuries which kept many first-string players out of the line-up. The team won two games, tied one, and lost six. George Plain, '35, was elected captain, and the program started with a tilt with West Side.

The team from West Side traveled to Ashland Stadium to administer the first defeat. The day was damp and foggy, a bad one for football, and only a small crowd turned out. The score was West Side, 18; East Orange, 0.

On the next Saturday, East Orange went to Kearny and upset that strong team, 13-0, on a muddy field. Although victory was sweet, its good effects were dampened because of the loss of "Rex" Marfuggi, star linesman, who broke his leg in the contest. He was a definite loss to the line and the team felt it immediately.

The Kearny game raised the school's enthusiasm, and quite a number traveled to West Orange to back the team there. The students loyally supported the team, but the game went to the Mountaineers by the close score of 6-0. Johnny Clark, East Orange's best ground gainer, suffered injuries and was kept from playing again for three and a half weeks.

Two more defeats followed; Plainfield came here and triumphed over us 12-0, and then Montclair routed us by the score of 38 to 0 on their grounds. The latter game was all Montclair's from the opening whistle. The home team scored in the first minute of play before the Red and Blue had started. Substitutions failed to buck up the team, and Montclair scored at will.

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The boys got a rest on the following Saturday. They didn't play until Election Day, the following Tuesday. This was a red letter day in the season. Because of a finely developed and totally unexpected passing attack, the Red and Blue triumphed over Nutley 7 to 6 at Ashland Stadium. A large crowd was on hand and it was a beautiful day for football. In the last quarter, with the score 6-0 against them, East Orange marched 60 yards, mostly through the air, to upset the strong visitors. Stevenson as passer and Evans and Captain Plain as receivers were the stars of the attack. This game marked the return of Johnny Clark to the team after a long absence. His presence did much to pep up the team and make it fight for victory.

Victory was short-lived, however, Orange came over on the following Saturday, bringing a certain "Bunky" Hill, who did much to blast our hopes of triumph. On the opening kick-off, Hill ran 95 yards for a touchdown. This typefied his work all afternoon and with his team-mates' co-operation East Orange was placed on the small end of a 24-7 score.

Nov. 17 was the first of the two most important games. Columbia came to East Orange and surprised everyone by not being able to score against the team, leaving the game a scoreless tie. Both teams were several times in position to score, but neither was able to make the grade. East Orange was not disappointed by the result, though, as everyone had predicted Columbia would win.

Finally the annual Barringer game arrived. It was a fine Thanksgiving morning when the season ended. The lop-sided score of 26 to 7 left the Red and Blue with nothing much to be thankful for. This defeat was the bitterest of them all because of the traditional rivalry. Barringer played a smashing game, hitting the line on every play. The first touchdown was in the first quarter and came as a result of a pass, Kee to Rizzolo. The latter stepped over the goal and allowed the ball to settle in his arms. The kick was low, and Barringer had started things by scoring the first points. The East Orange team came back, fighting hard when it got the ball. Stevenson intercepted a Barringer pass and ran 10 yards to Barringer's 35-yard stripe. There the team executed a wonderful exhibition of passing. Stevenson faded back and tossed the ball 25 yards to Joe Evans, who was racing down the side-lines. Evans caught it over his shoulder while he was going at full speed and then ran the remaining 15 yards for the touchdown. It was a beautiful play and the accuracy of its timing brought yells of delight from the stands. The kick was good, putting East Orange ahead 7 to 6. After the kick-off Barringer began its machine-like pounding at the line. A drive of 63 yards, aided by a 25-yard end run, terminated in another Barringer touchdown. The try for point was good, and the half ended 13 to 7 in favor of Barringer. In the third period, the opponents buried all East Orange hopes by scoring twice more. These scores were achieved by ripping holes in our line, the method used before. This period saw the last of the scoring, and the game ended 26-7, despite desperate East Orange efforts in the last quarter.

This sums up a rather poor season, but we can all say, "Better luck in '35."

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Basketball

HE East Orange High School Basketball Quintet experienced a banner year compared to previous seasons, winning six games and losing seven under the new tutelage of Coach Stanley Griffin and Paul F. Poehler as Assistant Coach. What is more, the team broke a long losing streak of seventeen games when they defeated Linden in their fourth game, 33-25. The regulars were Charles Kydd, Bob Keary, Bob Frieberger, Martin Cohen, Curtis Condit, Ted Fitch, and Gilbert Fehn. The Junior Varsity, coached by Mr. Poehler, came through in fine style, winning ten games and losing but three. Their first team consisted of Leonard DeHaven, Bob Pearsall, Bob Herder, Ernest Fellows, and Charles Gordon. The Red and Blue visited Nutley on Tuesday, January 15, to start off the season with a 17-4 defeat, in which game Bob Frieberger was high scorer with two points. The Jayvees lost by a slight margin to the Nutley Junior Varsity, 19-17. The following Friday Caldwell defeated the Walnut Streeters at Caldwell, 11-9. On Tuesday, January 22, East Orange journeyed to Verona to lose again, 30-25, and the Jayvees went on to win their second game of the season, 20-16. On January 29 East Orange broke their losing streak when they defeated Linden, 33-25, on the Red and Blue's home court.

The Junior Varsity made it unanimous when they triumphed over the Linden Jayvees, 22-11. On Friday, February 1, a highly favored Weequahic contingent fell victim on the Panther court, 21-19, but the Red and Blue Jayvees were defeated, 18-15. On Tuesday, February 5, Columbia came to East Orange to be defeated, 22-18, and the Jayvees beat Columbia Junior Varsity, 23-15. Friday, February 8, Millburn visited the Walnut Street court and was defeated, 31-27, to give the Red and Blue their fourth straight victory of the season, and the Panther Jayvees swamped the boys from Millburn, 16-2.

The Red and Blue was snowed under by the Orange quintet on February 11 on the Panther court with a score 35-19, but the Jayvees won, 14-8. East Orange visited Montclair and lost, 30-16, as did the Junior Varsity, 10-15, on Friday, February 15. East Orange was host to the West Orange five and were badly beaten 23-11, but the Jayvees won, 17-13. Montclair Academy lost to the Walnut Streeters, 28-26, and Irvington triumphed over the Red and Blue, 18-13. The Jayvees defeated the boys from Montclair Academy, 19-10, and eked out a 15-14 win over Irvington's Junior Varsity. It was a gala night for East Orange on March 1 when the Alumni came to Walnut Street. The Varsity defeated a collection of stars of former years, 36-25, and the Junior Varsity won another over the Alumni team, 28-19.

After the long losing streak was broken, the stands began to fill and soon they were packed game after game. The Jayvees won the Inter-Oranges championship with three wins and no losses in a mythical league. Much credit is due Mr. Griffin and Mr. Poehler, the able coaches of the squad.

Tennis-1934

HE East Orange netsters experienced a fairly successful season last year, winning eight of the ten matches played and winding up the season with a percentage of .800. Three matches, those with Caldwell, Belleville, and a return match against Bloomfield, did not get in the schedule because of bad weather. Slingerland, Beals, Cashen, and Dooley played consistently throughout. The first three were used interchangeably by Coach Henckel in the singles berths. Beals and Dooley paired to make one doubles team, while Slingerland and Cashen comprised the other.

Adverse weather conditions having cancelled the first match on the schedule, that against Caldwell, the Red and Blue opened their season on May 7 against Newark Academy, winning by a 5-0 count. 
