# Senior Class History

 $T^{\rm O}$  all of us, I think, entering high school was an adventure. We were breaking away from old ties, old interests. That junior year year was certainly a most eventful one, not alone from the personal standpoint because some of us were made C. P.'s or became Class Council members, but from a broader standpoint because it marked improvement and growth in East Orange High.

And for the first time also, because the "News" had not been clearing its expenses, it appeared not as a separate publication but as a page in the "East Orange Record." At the beginning of our senior year, however, the demand for a separate school paper again was so great that the "News" Board, relying on student support, printed one. Their confidence was justified by unusually large sales.

The G. O. officers for this year were Jack Quinn, president; William Hedden, vice-president; and Helen Dill, secretary. The senior class elected for its officers, Robert E. Lee, president; Harry Stoddart, vice-president; and Gula Moench, secretary.

The students achieved great success with "Stuff 'n' Nonsense," a dramatic production which was written and produced by themselves.

Our fencing team won a leg on the famous Biddle Trophy among twenty-eight teams at the New York University Prep. tournament.

Our football team had its best season in years.

Altogether we had a very happy year—and, now, graduating, we're starting out once more on a new life—breaking old ties to form new.


We have helped this year both in producing the musical comedy, "Stuff 'n' Nonsense" and in giving a very successful Junior-Senior prom.

# Student Council

THE Student Council for 1935-1936 came into office to find itself confronted with the task of putting a revised constitution into operation. A committee the previous year had overhauled the constitution, and made an excellent piece of work from the material. The many changes in the constitution have made this year largely one of experiment.

The main purposes in revising the constitution were to enable the student government to serve the student body by drawing into governmental activities a greater number of persons, to allow those people who have been successful as officers to continue on in the council for the following year, and in general to make ability and work the chief qualifications for office holding. The change in the laws abolished the former petition system and the provision for holding the G. O. and class elections on the same day. Now that elections are held on different days, able candidates defeated in the first election can run again in the later elections. This is felt to be important because all of the capable candidates can not be elected, and those eliminated were formerly lost to the student government; now they have an opportunity to obtain a class office. The Student Council has stressed the importance of getting the Freshman Class interested in student activities, and has met with a good reaction from the Class of 1939. Under the revised constitution the Freshmen were organized in their own class council at midyear.

Other activities undertaken by the Student Council as a body were the Princeton conference, the finishing of a school handbook, a drive for more G. O. members, the usual Thanksgiving and Christmas baskets, the pin and ring for graduation, a Freshman party, a Safety drive, and the customary dances.

The general movement and aim of this year's Student Council was to strive for and encourage "school spirit," or a growing interest in student government and activities in order to build up a strong school system in every line.


The Spiritual Choir presented concerts at the Clinton Avenue Baptist Church and the Calvary Baptist Church, and sang for another Masonic Lodge.

The plot centers around a bishop, who, with a flair for detective work, undertakes to solve a robbery that has occurred in a country pub. An extremely wealthy couple are relieved of their jewelry and money by a handsome and gentlemanly crook. The suspicious actions of the bartender are noticed by the bishop, who finds the swag and steals it, leaving his visiting card instead. The second act, in which the bishop and his sister trap the crooks, was hilarious, and the third act disclosed Mr. Waller, the gentleman

who has been robbed, as the real villain of the piece.

J. Louis Reeder, cast as Red Eagan, the bartender, gave an excellent performance. Every time he appeared on the stage the audience roared in anticipation, and never once did he fail them. Mrs. Waller, played by Phylis L. Bourne, came in for her share of laughs as the domineering, socially ambitious wife of Guy Waller. Probably the most finished performance of the evening was enacted by Mary E. Browne as Lady Emily Lyons, sister of the bishop. With only a little powder to whiten her hair, and a bit of greasepaint to age her face, this seventeen-year-old girl was able to convince the audience that she was in her early sixties. Gesture, walk, facial expression, voice, all were those of an elderly lady. Philip W. Mattoon was excellent in the difficult role of the Bishop of Broadminster.



## The News

NE of the very successful years in the thirty-seven-year existence of "The News" of East Orange High School was the term of 1935-36. After a year-and-a-half departure from the regular four-page individual newspaper to a page in the "East Orange Record," "The News" returned to the fold as a genuine periodical in June of 1935, through the ambitious efforts of its newly elected editors, who could not bear having the East Orange High School without a paper of its own.

In June, the editorial staff of the paper was selected by the graduating editors, and the following were chosen to hold the important posts: Dick Henschel, Editor-in-Chief; Frances Chernofsky and Betty Hinman, News Editors; Elsie McDonald, Feature Editor; Robert E. Lee, Sports Editor; Martin Post, Make-up Editor; Grace Shoub, Club Editor; and Phylis Bourne, Alumni and Personals Editor. Marshall Levy and Hal K. Lipset each held the post of advertising manager for one semester, while the other business positions were held as follows: Ted Bomeisler, circulation manager; John B. Higgins, assistant circulation manager; and David Myers, business manager. Mr. H. Franklin Ford of the faculty was the adviser to the business department, while Mr. Theron E. Coffin, assisted by Mr. Leon Hood, took charge of the editorial advising.

Great success in circulation during the past year was forthcoming from the excellent journalism presented in "The News." The average number of sales of each fortnightly issue of "The News" has been very high, often reaching 1,500 copies.

"The News" received honors in the Columbia Scholastic Press Association's twelfth annual high school periodical competition, held last March at Columbia University. Among the 150 schools entered from New Jersey, the East Orange paper ranked sixth in high standing among the journals in the class of schools with enrollment of 1,500 to 2,500. Prominent features of the paper included "Salmagundi," a witty column of remarks pertaining to students and of interest to both teachers and students; an excellently written sports page; well-proportioned articles on club activities; and good features and news articles throughout the paper. On the whole, it may be said for "The News," that it never has enjoyed such a banner year of outstanding interest among the student body as it has during the year 1935 and 1936.

In the next game they put on a tremendous fight with the powerful West Orange team (how good the Mountaineers were we know only too well now: they went through an undefeated season, East Orange being the only team to score upon them even) and more than earned a 12-12 tie in a big upset. Stevenson's passes were well-nigh perfect all afternoon; two of them, one to Lonergan on the two-yard line, and the other into the arms of Hank Wyman, standing alone in the far corner, brought the East Orange touchdowns. Following up this moral victory, the team turned back a stubborn Plainfield eleven, 6-0. This game looked like a scoreless tie until the final quarter, when Don Luster paved the way for the lone tally by making a pretty catch of Stevenson's pass on the ten-yard line.

All these victories, however, were eclipsed by the Red and Blue's astounding triumph over Montclair. The undefeated, unscored-upon eleven were supposed to hand out a bad beating, but every member of the East Orange eleven turned in a beautiful game and defeated them, 13-14, in one of the biggest upsets and most thrilling games of the season. It looked like another 38-0 victory for Montclair when they scored in the first period, but East Orange came back with its usual second-half rally and swept Montclair off her feet. "Horsey" Lonergan made the first touchdown on an end-around play, and little Louis Reeder tied it up 7-7 on a quarterback sneak for the extra point. In the fourth period Lonergan scored on the same end-around play, and Stevenson converted for the first time in the season. East Orange received a bad scare just before the game ended when Fortunato, running beautifully, returned a punt for a touchdown, but the Red and Blue was saved when Fortunato's teammate missed the try for the extra point, leaving the score 14-13.


The East Orange eleven continued along its merry way by marching through Nutley without much trouble. It allowed Nutley six points in the first half, then proceeded to take the lead in the second half by scoring a touchdown and adding the point. Sadler definitely settled the outcome by blocking a punt and thus giving East Orange another chance to tally, making the final score 14-6.

The winning streak was broken in the next game, with Orange, the Red and Blue losing by the heart-breaking score of 7-6. Orange, after being completely outplayed in the first half and having six points scored against them on Reeder's plunge over in the second period, retaliated in the second half with a good passing attack that paved the way for their touchdown, and then made good their rush for the extra point.

Not to be disheartened by this loss, the team came back the next week, and, checking the touchdown twins, Rainwater and Hildebrand, tied Columbia 0-0. Sadler's yeoman defense work at backing up the line and the line's beautiful goal-line stand, mark the features of this bitterly waged contest.

The traditional Thanksgiving Day game with Barringer definitely made the season a success. East Orange, functioning with the precision and teamwork of a college outfit, unleashed all its fighting powers and tricks to trounce a fighting Barringer eleven, 19-12. The Red and Blue got under way in the very first period when, with the ball on Barringer's forty-yard line as a result of a surprise pass from Sadler to Stevenson, Sheridan Towle crashed through guard and fought his way to the four-yard line, where Wyman took it over on an end run. Shortly after this, none other than Captain Fred Schrader, receiving a lateral from Lonergan, side-stepped his way through the Barringer backfield and raced for a touchdown. Not content with twelve points, East Orange continued its baffling football exhibition with seven more points, the touchdown coming on a pass from Sadler to Stevenson, and then another pass from Sadler to Lonergan bringing the extra point, making the score nineteen. From this point the Red and Blue, using most of its squad, settled back and let Barringer do what it would. The Big Blue fought valiantly, scoring twelve points, but the game was already won.

East Orange then went on to a three-game winning streak by defeating Nutley by the one-sided score of 28-17 and Caldwell in a tight one, 21-19. In its first "Fruit Loop" game the Red and Blue was defeated by Orange, 22-15, after a hard tussle. East Orange then vented its writh on a weak Millburn team and ran up a 36-11 score. This was the largest score the Red and Blue made all season. The next game was another in the Inter-Orange League. 
# Tennis, 1935
