TO *Ralph E. Files*

His twenty-nine years as principal of East Orange High School have been busy and purposeful ones. His unswerving loyalty to the school and his strict adherence to his high ideals have endeared him to the students and teachers. During his years of faithful service, he has been a kindly adviser and a good friend to everyone.

Upon his retirement this year, the school will lose one of its finest members. We shall always cherish a fond memory of him, and we wish him all happiness in years to come.





RALPH E. FILES received in good measure Maine's "goodly heritage," for her worthy sons and daughters, a legacy including good health, a good education, common sense, good judgment, a Yankee sense of humor, and a practical, livable philosophy. His characteristic poise began to develop very early in life, one may conclude from a home story of him as a small boy. Suffering from toothache, he said to his mother, "It aches so it seems as though I couldn't stand it." Then in his next breath he said, "But I've got to, haven't I?"

His parents were Thomas and Sarah Cates Files, whose home was in Bangor. In the Bangor schools he prepared for Bates College, which granted him a bachelor's degree in 1895, and an honorary A.M., in 1935, for his services to education.

For nearly seventy years, Mr. Files has been connected with school work and school life. Before graduation from college, he taught three winters in Maine schools—in Pittsfield, Union, and Wells Beach. This practice teaching apparently helped in his choice of a vocation, for he became a high school principal in 1896. He held that position in Mechanics Falls, Maine, from 1896 to 1899; in East Bridgewater, Massachusetts, from 1899 to 1903; and in Haverhill, Massachusetts, from 1903 to 1912, when he began his thirty years of able service in the East Orange High School.

Various county, state, and national educational organizations have recognized his ability and efficiency by electing him to important offices. He was president of the Essex County Secondary Teachers' Association in Massachusetts, and has held the same county office here in New Jersey. He has been an active member of the New Jersey Schoolmasters' Club, and a member of the executive committee and treasurer of the New Jersey Headmasters' Association. He has held the vice-presidency of the New Jersey Council of Education, the presidency of the Middle States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, and the vice-

presidency of the American Council of Education.

His broad range of community interests has been shown by his activity in and support of various fraternal, social, civic, and religious associations. He is a member of Masonic orders, A. F. and A. M., and R. A. M.; of the East Orange Kiwanis Club, and of Trinity Congregational Church. For more than twenty-five years he has sponsored the work of the Boy Scouts, and was awarded the Silver Beaver as a token of his helpful interest. His life-time interest in out-of-door sports is now shown in his memberships in Deer Lake Club and in the country club of Lucerne-in-Maine.

Since 1912, high schools have gone through many important changes, and made various adjustments to new ways of democratic thinking. East Orange High School has been fortunate in Mr. Files' guidance, for he has kept consistently to the "golden mean" between old-fashioned and ultra-progressive educational plans and policies. His clear vision of the ideal high school student, an "integrated personality," well-adjusted intellectually, socially, emotionally, and ethically, has made him eager to have his teachers do all in their power to develop the right appreciations, attitudes, behavior patterns, and ideals in every individual student.

More important still, his sincere, enthusiastic, purposeful work with our students has revealed the deep understanding and affectionate sympathy one expects from an educator and the father of a daughter and three sons. All his teachers know what he has meant by saying so often, "We must teach boys and girls, not merely subjects." His greatest happiness and real gratification as principal of E. O. H. S. have come from knowing that its graduates usually take their places as healthy, normal, happy, well-adjusted, responsible, loyal American citizens. They, like all the teachers who have worked with Mr. Files, have enjoyed "a goodly fellowship," and share gratefully "a goodly heritage."

Dear Diary—September

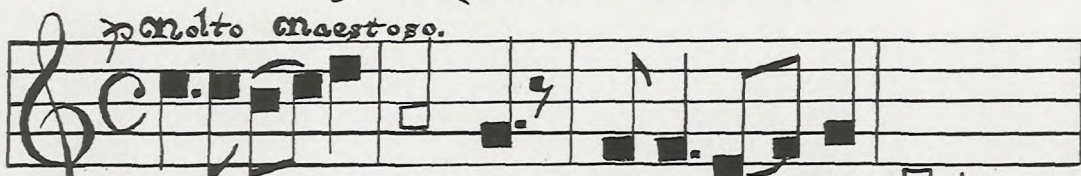

Dear Diary—December

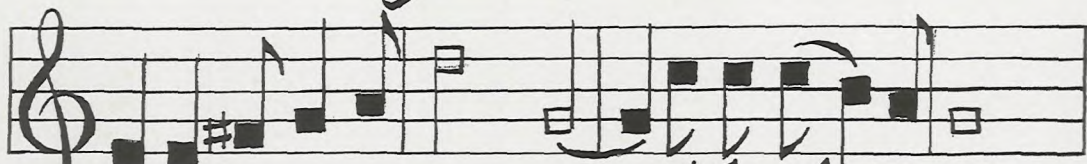

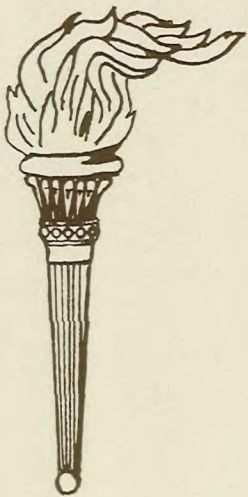








STUDENT GOVERNMENT

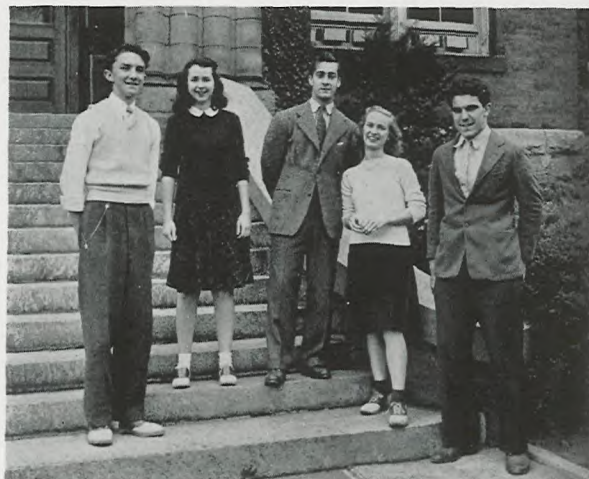

THE STUDENT COUNCIL

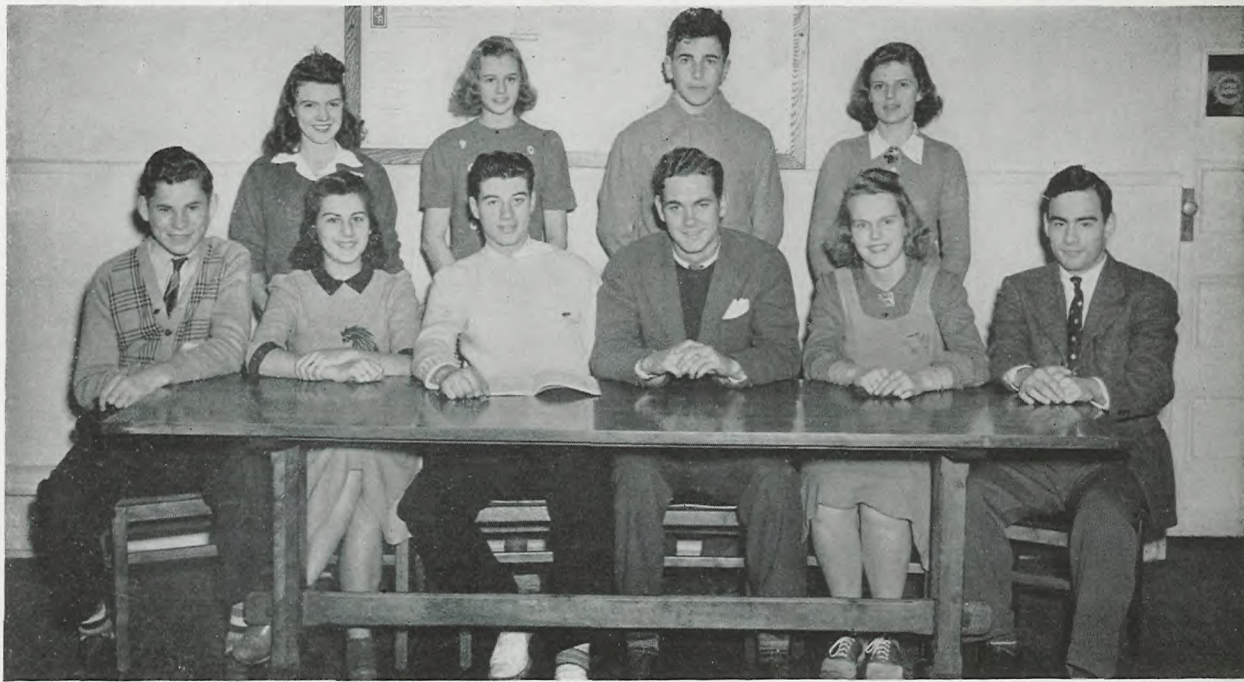

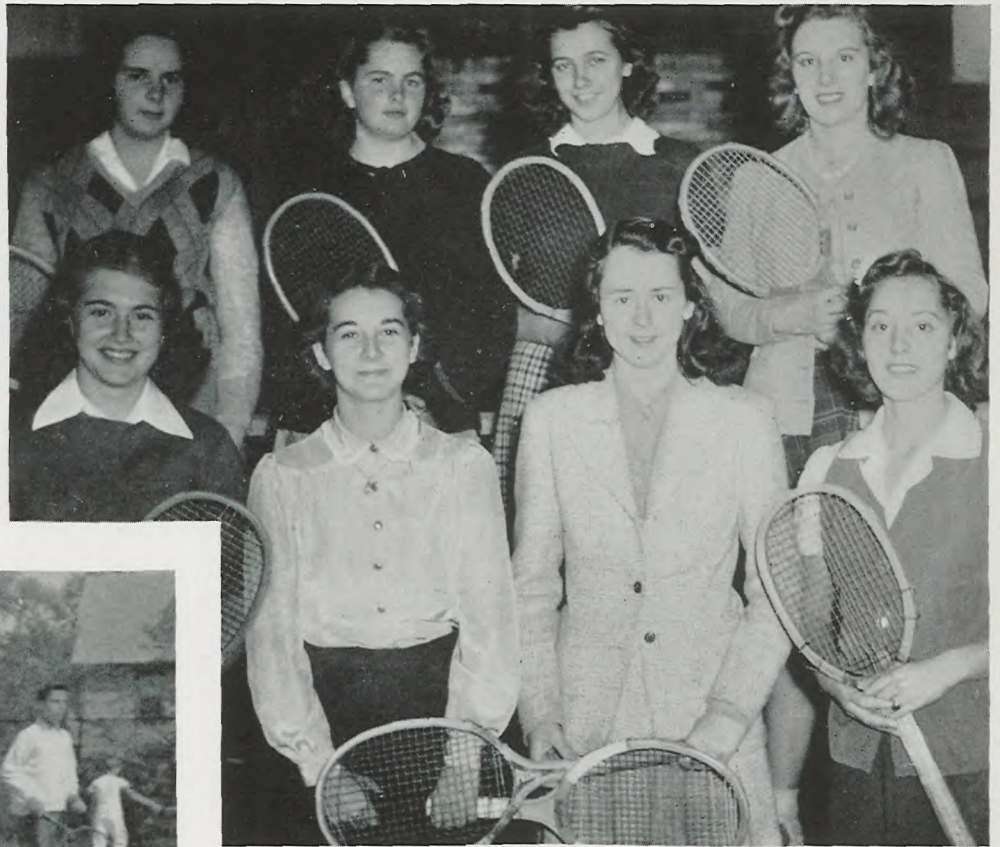
S P O R T S

THIS year, because of the able planning of our physical education instructors, the East Orange High School program is the most varied of any offered in the New Jersey public schools. Besides their skillfully varied class program, the instructors advise the G. A. A., which during the year sponsors a very full program of after-school activities: swimming, tennis, hockey, bowling, and riding in the fall; basketball, badminton, bowling, volley ball, and riding in the winter; and swimming, baseball, and tennis in the spring.

O. monogram; when she has ten, she is entitled to a star.

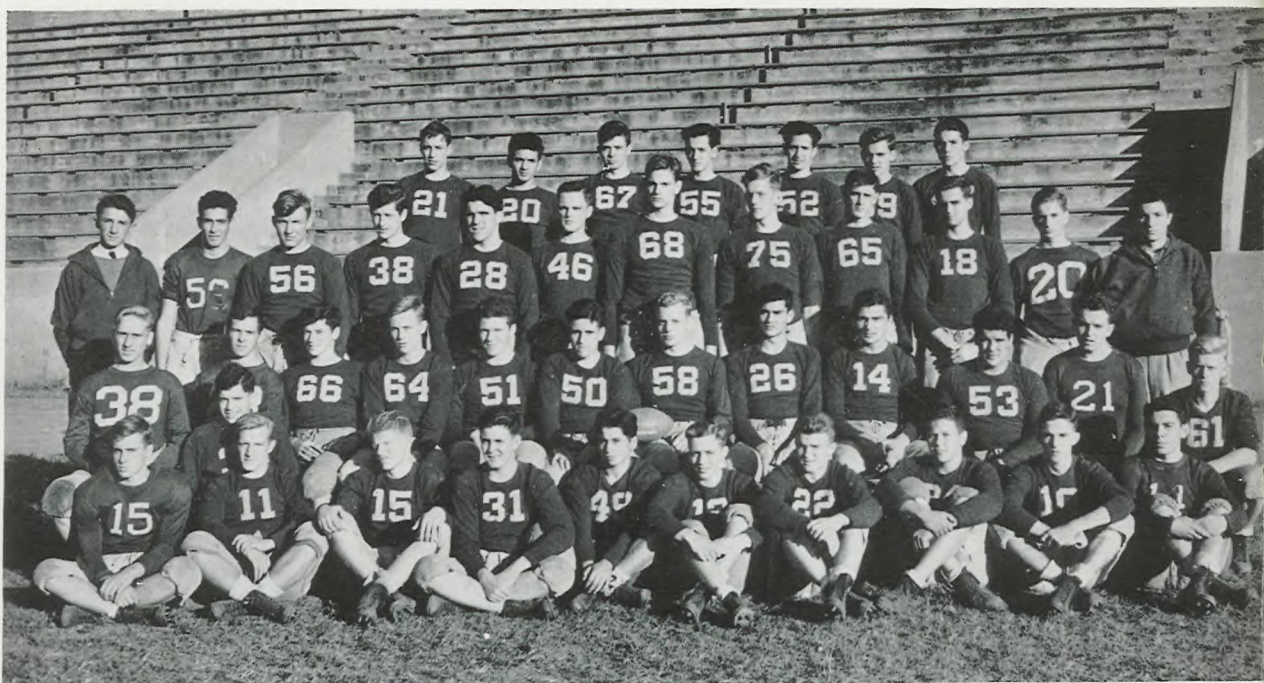
