It was a well balanced and hard fought encounter.
The basketball season our first year proved to be a good one with ten wins and seven defeats.
Before we knew it, we were Sophomores and another football season was rolling around. Our light but fast Red and Blue team were frequent victors under the coaching of Mr. George Shotwell. Montclair was the first team of the season to roll up a score, but it was ultimately defeated, before a crowd of 10,000 . Later the previously undefeated Columbia team offered stiff resistance, but the Panthers triumphed.
The forty-sixth Turkey Day Tournament was staged
against our old rival Barringer High. This game developed into the third consecutive tie with the Blue, but East Orange came through as Co-champions for the state title.
This was also a wonderful year for Griff's basketball team inasmuch as it participated in the State Tournament. However, we were subdued by Belleville after an overtime game in the tournoment.

The following year when we were Juniors, we ended our football season with six losses, two ties, and one victory. It was, in general, a discouraging season for the Panthers, but we vindicated ourselves by triumphing thirty-two to two over Barringer in the year's classic event. This netted us a bronze trophy in memory of Royal A. Grosenbaugh of East Orange and "Pop" Stearns of Barringer. This trophy was donated by the Barringer-East Orange "Old-Timers." In our Senior year, although our team fought well, Barringer won the trophy with a score of 3-7.

## FOOTBALL



UNDER THE ABLE COACHING of Mr. Samuel Sezak, who brought to East Orange the $T$ formation, the Panthers presented a record of three wins, five losses, and one tie. In the opening tilt against Cranford High, the Red and Blue gridders, behind the running and passing of Al Normon, Alex Lowe, and Sam Griggs, came through with a $13-0$ victory. This contest marked the eighth straight year that Cranford has been shut out.
The second game of the season at Ashland Stadium pitted E. O. against the West Side Rough Riders. Led by Ed Kenefick and Ken Stewart, the Newark team eked out a $19-12$ victory. The following Saturday, the Red and Blue men journeyed to West Orange to win their second game,

7-0. Neither team played a sparkling game, and both fumbled constantly, thus losing several opportunities to score. Both Lowe and Griggs made long runs.
Irvington, almost state title material, swamped East Orange 21-0, with Tom Rinaldi doing the heavy ground running, and Heinie Benkert the passing. The Irvington line, about as brawny a forward wall as the Panthers encountered, held them at bay all afternoon, and the Camptowner backs ran ragged over E. O.
At Woodman Field, Montclair, some ten thousand people gathered on October 27 to see the two arch rivals battle it out another year. The end of the first half saw the underdog Panthers ahead by the amazing figure of 7-0. The Mounties, however, came to life as Carl Lombardi's passes started clicking, and the home team garnered thirteen points in the third period to win by a score of 13-7.

Bouncing back from their two-game losing streak, the Panthers met the Nutley team and battled to a $0-0$ stalemate on November 4. A very sloppy field at Park Oval, Nutley, held up the attacks of both teams; and though both ran up and down the field and threatened many times, neither was able to capitalize on the opportunities presented. On one occasion the East Orange boys were on the one-yard line with four downs coming to them; but the Maroon forward wall, led by Brud Davis, the big center, rose up and held them and prevented a score.
Armistice Day at Ashlond Stadium the two neighbors, Orange and East Orange, met in football combat. The Tornadoes, led by the field generalship of Pete Mangino and his educated toe, emerged the victors, 14-13. Though the Ponthers led till the closing minutes, the Orange boys were able to score onother touchdown, and Man. gino booted the extra point that spelled victory for the visitors.

The Cougars of Columbia High School met the Panthers at Ashland Stadium and lost to them, 13-7. Although Columbia led at the half, 7-0, the Panthers came back roaring, and on touchdowns by Sam Griggs and Cliff Frazier won the game.

In the Turkeyday game, Barringer and East Orange met in their 48th annual tussle. Barringer came out on top by a score of $13-6$. The first Barringer score was made by George Russomano as he cracked the Panther line from about the five-yard line. The one Ponther tally came as Sam Griggs skirted left end to hit pay dirt. Barringer came back with a long pass from Paul Schneidenback to Jim Nelson that put the Big Blue in scoring position. On a quarterback sneak, Schneidenback made the score.

Although the ' 44 season was not so fruitful as in some years past, it was felt by all that the acquisition of Mr. Sezak was a definite gain, and better seasons are looked for in the future.

The Panthers handed in an impressive record, winning two games, tying five, and losing three, which merited for them a soccer championship trophy from the New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association.
The eight lettermen were Peter "Chick" Araneo (captain), Bill Kirbas, Ambrose Donahue, Fred Cardillo (who led the team in scoring), Sam Simpson, Paul Tondo, Bob Nichols, and Jimmy Baxter. Rounding out the squad were Sam Lackaye (goalie), John Kirbas, and Tony Giliberti.
The five tied contests present on interesting sidelight, as all of them were deadlocked at 1-1. This series of deadlocks started with Verona in the opening game and ended also with Verona in the next to the last affair. Verona, always a tough nut to crack when it comes to soccer, almost captured the opener, but Donahue headed the ball through the uprights to goin the tie.
The game at Montclair, the second for the Red and Blue Booters, saw frequent scoring, with East Orange coming out on the long end of a 5-2 count. Cardillo, playing center forward, drew the first blood, scoring in the early minutes of the game. He was followed by Donahue, who tallied on a

## BASKETBALL



ONCE AGAIN the high-flying East Orange basketball quintet has turned out an impressive record, this year winning twelve games and losing but three. Sam Lackaye, Dick Honeker, Sam Griggs, Ed Banta, and Graham Skea made up the formidable squad which led Essex County throughout the first twelve contests of the season.
The first game pitted the Maroon of Nutley against the Ponthers, and East Orange opened the season with an easy win, 41-20. Columbia, played later the same week, gave E. O. a bit of a scare, but the club pulled together in time to eke out a $39-36$ victory. Ralph Corvino and Sam Lackaye matched their skills in an evenly played affair at Orange High School, but E. O., with Lackaye well supported by his mates, emerged the victors, 37-34. A more uneven contest followed with Irvington, and the Camptowners were outclassed by a score of 36-27. A second game with Nutley followed, and once again the Red and Blue came through to the tune of 41-26.

The sixth game of the season was with Montclair, and the sports jinx held by the Mounties over East Orange was broken as the visitors fell to a 57-40 defeat. A Group 2 Harrison team filled on open
date, and Coach Stan Griffin's charges romped to a $60-20$ win. Harry Donn's Weequahic Indians invaded the East Orange court in the eighth game and stubbornly resisted until the last quarter, when they fell apart; and baskets by Banta, Lackaye, Honeker, and Griggs put the game on ice, 42-30. Up to this point both East Orange and Central of Newark were the two undefeated quintets in Essex County. The Newark Star Ledger arranged an Infantile Paralysis Benefit game at Seton Hall on January 27, and there the mighty Panthers knocked off a favored Central team, 34-29.

Orange, Montclair, and West Orange fell in order before the $E$. O. juggernaut, and to that point the Panthers had won twelve straight games. Then Columbia High School met E. O. in a return match in number thirteen, and the Panthers dropped their first, 34-36. A hot and cold Bloomfield team was hot when they met East Orange and again turned the tide, $37-40$. In the final game of the regular season, West Orange also kept the Panthers from attaining their thirteenth triumph. Although the Panthers led with about two minutes to play, the Cowboys turned on the heat and came through to win, 32-33.

Practice, however, developed such notables as Dick Honeker, short stop; Bill Kirbas, second base; Clarence Allen, left field; Sam Lackaye, right field; Dick Schake, first base; Pat Digiore, third base; and Mike West, Fred Kroog, Ray Ward, and Ed Downey, who handled the pitching chores.
The Panthers opened the season with a bang, swamping Orange under a $12-7$ rout. Meeting Clifford Scott in the second contest, the E. O. Nine was upset by the Scotties, 4-1. West hurled for the Panthers and did a creditable job until the seventh inning, when he lost control; and helped along by Ponther errors, Scott pushed the winning runs across. The game proved to be the start of a four-game losing streak for the East Orange lads.

BASEBALL
Irvington, on its way to a state crown, smeared the hopless Ponthers by imposing a 12-2 count. Still on the wrong side of the fence, the Red and Blue nine proceeded to Columbia and Central. Phil Marvel's Gems played host to the Ponthers, but were none too polite, for they beat Griff's boys by a 6-4 tally. Central eked out a 3-2 win, and Mike West on the mound really lost a heartbreaker. Getting back into the win column, the Panthers had sweet revenge on Columbia, and beat the Gems by a $4-0$ score. Ray Ward on the mound did a nice job and allowed the visitors but two measly hits, while his mates, behind Acocella and Tortoriello, collected four runs on heavy hitting.
A big inning at Montclair was not enough to stop a hard hitting Mountie nine and the Panthers dropped another game, 8-4. Honeker and Tortoriello both banged out triples in the big first frame.
Meeting Orange again, the Panthers knocked the Tornadoes down to a fainting breeze by beating them a second time, 2-1. A game scheduled with Bloomfield was to follow, but had to be postponed because of the Bengals' entry in the Newark tourney.
In the next contest, Scott again triumphed over the Ponthers, this time by a 4-2 score. Some exceptional pitching marked East Orange's last win of the season, as West held favored Nutley to five hits. The Ponthers collected eleven safe hits for themselves and went on to win 8-3. West fanned eight Maroon players and stopped Ralph Russo's consecutive hitting streak at fifteen games. Completing the season, the Panthers were clipped by West Orange to the tune of 4-1.

UNDER THE ABLE COACHING of Mr. Ernest Benatre, East Orange High School Track Team completed a successful season in 1944, winning three of its four dual meets. Besides these victories, the Panthers finished fourth in the Montclair Invitation Meet, while they placed last in the Newark Board of Education Meet, the season's opener.
Four lettermen returned to bolster the chances of victory: Ken Boedecker, George Williges, Sam Griggs, and Art Palumbo. The squad was also studded with a host of new stars like Jim Baxter, Wayne Lally, Len Daum, and Bob Martin. Williges, successful student of the pole vault, mile run, and low hurdles, co-captained the team with Boedecker, middle-distance speedster. William Ferry and Roy Hitchens, now both in service, were the managers.
The season opened at the Newark Meet, and the squad placed but one man, George Williges, with a jump of ten feet, third in the pole vault. The Panthers tallied two points for his efforts and tied West Side for last place.
In the following two meets, the Panthers enjoyed a taste of victory, with West Side their first victim.

Led by Sam Griggs and Wayne Lally, the Red and Blue won this meet, 64-52. Griggs took first place in the 100-yard dash, while both he and Lally tied for first in the high jump.
East Orange was quick to follow this up with a $70-38$ rout of Irvington. In this runaway over the Campers, the Panthers garnered eight first places, with Williges, Palumbo, and Griggs each capturing two. Frank O'Toole and Bob Martin won in the other two events. Finishing second in many places were Dick Saraydar, Jim Baxter, Dick Forsythe, Len Daum, Allen Parvin, and Ken Boedecker.
Meeting Weequahic in their third dual meet, the Panthers were handed their firsts, with Griggs taking honors with three. The Indians took all of the other events except the broad jump, which went entirely to the Ponthers.
Before the season's final meet with South Side, the Panthers journeyed to Montclair for participation in the Montclair Invitation Meet, in which they placed fourth. East Orange gained two places in the meet.
Winding up the season with its third win, the Red and Blue trounced South Side by a 60-48 count. George Williges led the Panthers, scoring with two first places. The rest of East Orange's six places were won by Palumbo, Pennstrom, Boedecker, and Griggs.

## TENNIS



WITH A RECORD of eleven wins and one defeat, the East Orange High School Tennis Team won the sectional state championship. Behind Lyn Abbott, Bill Childs, Joe Clark, and John Crispano, the Panthers mowed down twelve opponents before meeting a single setback. The season opened on May 1 against Bloomfield.
East Orange, winning three singles and one of the doubles matches, came out ahead 4-1. West Orange lost by the same score, and then Montclair dropped a very tough match, 3-2.
Then the Ponthers journeyed to Glen Ridge, and the Ridgers joined the vanquished column after a 4-1 setback. Lyn Abbott lost his first match in two years against Paul Gilbert of Bloomfield, 1-6,

4-6; but the Red and Blue emerged victorious, 3-2, in the second encounter with the Bengals. West Orange was defeated a second time 4-1, and then the Camptowners of Irvington lost by the same tally.
On May 19, a second close match with Montclair was held at their courts, but the Panthers copped two singles and a doubles to win 3-2. The season's first and only shutout came against Millburn. Playing the inexperienced visitors, the East Orange boys had little trouble and won 5-0. The next week, the Panthers traveled to Millburn and won a second time, 4-1.
Then came the season's only defeat. Pitted against Clinton Packard, one of the East's best junior players, Bill Childs lost narrowly, 4-6, 6-8; and George Braun fell before Stanley Vitt, 3-6, 1-6. Columbia went on to win the match by winning the number two doubles, 0-6, 1-6.
After one more match in which they defeated Irvington 4-1, the Panthers closed this very fine season.
