When the Sound of the Last Whistle split the air to end the fiftieth consecutive gridiron struggle between East Orange and Barringer High Schools, it was a victorious Panther team which carried its coach off the field.

Coach George Shotwell is well on his way to establishing himself as one of East Orange High School's legendary football heroes. His name will rank with such an illustrious one as Royal A. Grosenbaugh. Mr. Shotwell personifies true sportsmanship at its best. He commands the respect and friendship of his team, of the students, and of the faculty. We have indeed been privileged to have a man such as Mr. Shotwell as our grid mentor. To Mr. Shotwell and his assistant, Edward Lewis, we owe a debt of gratitude.

After having been graduated from high school, Coach Shotwell entered Pittsburgh University on a baseball scholarship, where he immediately developed into a stellar football player. Playing the pivot slot with a gallant Pitt eleven which encountered a superior Trojan team in the Rose Bowl game of 1933, Mr. Shotwell performed magnificently. In 1934 he was a unanimous choice for the mythical All-American team, his name appearing on the selection of the famed Grantland Rice, whose selections are "law" to the sports world.

In 1938, after years of coaching football and teaching history at Hazelton, where he had secured a position upon graduation from Pittsburgh University, Mr. Shotwell came to East Orange. His name will long be revered at Hazelton, however, for there he developed such stars as Joe Andrejco and George

Cheverko, who later became Fordham's famous "touchdown twins".

In 1939 Mr. Shotwell produced his first championship team, while only three years later he repeated this feat. In 1943 Mr. Shotwell responded to his country's call to arms and entered the service as an officer in the Navy's physical fitness program. He was stationed in the Athens, Georgia, Preflight School until last year, when he returned to teach modern history and again develop a team of championship merit.


Mr. Shotwell's capable assistant, Edward Lewis, deserves much credit for the numerous victories chalked up by the football team. Going about his job in a completely unselfish and unheralded manner, he won the respect and admiration of all who served under him.

Upon graduation from high school, Mr. Lewis attended the University of Pennsylvania, where he participated in such sports as football and basketball. He received three letters for service to the football team, and finally was awarded a trophy for being the best blocking back to play for Pennsylvania up to that time. In addition to these awards, he also received the Chester Minds Scholarship for his superior scholarship, athletic ability, and cooperation.


Previous to his coming to East Orange, Mr. Lewis held the position of Director of Athletics at Scotch Plains, where he was in charge of the general athletic program and the football, basketball, and track teams.

In 1936 Mr. Lewis assumed his present position in the Department of Physical Education. Because of the valuable experience gained in the backfield of the football team of the University of Pennsylvania, he was in charge of this year's promising backfield, and, as was proved many times by his boys, he did a magnificent job.

To these two men we gratefully dedicate our SYLLABUS. We hope that East Orange High School will be graced with their presence for many years to come.



Fifty Years of Football Rivalry



Barringer was triumphant in the first encounter, 6-0, when the Blue was known as Newark High School. The East Orange team won the two following games in 1898, 11-0, and in 1899, 11-6. Newark won the game that was played in the MNEUSE new century to the tune of 23-0. In 1901, however, Captain

Munn's East Orange squad defeated Newark, which then became Barringer, 17-0, but in 1902 the Barringer eleven bounced back from defeat to top the Red and Blue gridders, 12-0.

A heavy Barringer squad downed the East Orange eleven, 21-0, in 1903. Captain Meeker led the East Orange gridders, while Van Zile played the entire second half of the contest with two sprained ankles. In 1904 East Orange bounced back to trounce the Barringer squad 34-0, as Morris scored two touchdowns and three conversions and Captain Reiter made some fine tackles. The game won the New Jersey Inter-Scholastic Championship for the Red and Blue gridders. In 1905 Barringer avenged its previous loss, 50-0. The enormous score was no reflection on our boys, as they were out-weighed by older and more experienced players. The East Orange 22-4 victory in 1906 gave the eleven another championship. Outstanding were Johnston, Loder, and Creede.

The first game played on Thanksgiving Day was won by East Orange, 4-0, and netted the squad its second successive championship in 1907. Captain Wilder's absence was ably filled by William "Butts" Underhill. Three thousand spectators witnessed the East Orange 5-0

triumph in 1908 on a rain-soaked field.

Captain Elmer K. Whiteman led the East Orange gridders in the fourth successive triumph over Barringer in 1909, 22-6. It was the first time the Newark team had crossed the

East Orange goal in four years.

Barringer was victorious in 1910, the first victory since 1905, 16-0. Captain Wells led the East Orange team. On Thanksgiving Day of 1911, a great crowd at Ashland Field saw a heavier Barringer squad held to a 0-0 tie. Switzer made a hundred-yard run, but it was nullified. Captain Switzer went on to lead the East Orange team to victory in 1912, 6-3. By winning the game the East Orange squad also gained the New Jersey and New York Inter-Scholastic Championships.

In 1913 the East Orange team came from behind to defeat the Blue 19-13, on two long runs by Bloss in the fourth period. The East Orange line was outstanding. East Orange then defeated Barringer, 3-0, in 1914 in a very close contest. Luany Lequin drop kicked the ball

over the posts in the last four minutes to win for East Orange.

Barringer earned the league championship by defeating East Orange, 16-3, in 1915 in a decisive contest. Captain Abbott's squad, although out-weighed, was decidedly faster than the Blue squad. Under the pouring rain in 1916 the Barringer squad defeated East Orange, 9-0. Again in 1917 Barringer was victorious, defeating East Orange, 17-9.

In 1918 the East Orange squad saw victory, 10-7, as Scriggins was the star for East Orange with his line plunging and kicking. Eleven thousand people saw Barringer down East Orange in 1919, 29-7. It was the first loss of the season for the East Orangers, and the first

time that an opponent had crossed the East Orange goal that year.

East Orange and Barringer played to a 7-7 tie in 1920, as the favored Blue squad was met by a stubborn E. O. team led by Bassett and Hershey; however, in 1921 the East Orangers crushed the Blue, 14-6. The supremacy of Coach Grosenbaugh's eleven was decidedly revealed.

East Orange vs. Barringer



The Barringer team won a close game in 1922, 7-3. The East Orange team was captained by Fueshel. In the following year Leigh Owen and Ed Tropp were outstanding for East Orange, although the East Orange team was beaten, 20-7. Again in 1924 Barringer copped a 14-13 victory over Captain Owen's previously undefeated eleven. Other E. O. stars were Odell, Clark, and Oswald. 1925 saw the Big Blue hand the East Orange squad a 19-18 defeat before 20,000 spectators at Newark Stadium. Blackmor, Powell, and Wolf played best for the losers. Captain Oswald of East Orange was outstanding in the 14-3 defeat handed his squad by the Blue team of 1926. Barringer won its sixth straight victory over East Orange, 20-7. Jones, Doedleman, Steffens, and Captain Weinzier were the East Orange stars on the muddy gridiron in 1927.

In 1928 East Orange won its first victory in six years, as Gil Jones's drop kick and Schroeder's safety gave the East Orange team a 5-0 victory. The Big Blue again bowed to East Orange, 13-7, in 1929 and Captain Moe Frankel's gridders were victorious before 15,000

spectators.

The following year Barringer came back to crush Captain David Burke's East Orange eleven and marred a successful Red and Blue season by trouncing the Panthers, 32-2. In the 1931 game East Orange ripped a Barringer squad, 32-7, as Captain Weisgerber's passing dominated the contest. Led by Captain Lloyd Foley in 1932 an outclassed East Orange eleven bowed to a stronger Barringer squad.

In 1933 Coach John A. Spear's East Orange squad lost a 7-6 squeaker to the Blue, while Barringer again trounced the Panthers, 26-7, in 1934, in spite of excellent playing by

Evans, Plain, and Schanck.

In 1935 the East Orange squad led by Captain Fred Schrade obtained the first victory in three years by defeating Barringer, 19-12. An East Orange squad led by Norm Hansen, Len DeHaven, and Captain Ted Fitch was defeated by Barringer, 6-0. Dargin recovered a bad East Orange center over the goal for the Blue's only score.

Captain Dave Healey's 1937 East Orange eleven held a favored Big Blue squad to a 0-0 tie. In 1938 the East Orange gridders, led by Coach George Shotwell and Captain Fred Brown, handed Barringer a 13-6 defeat, while co-captains Matt Mauriello and Bob Duffy led the East

Orange squad to a 14-0 win over the Blue in 1939.

East Orange and Barringer battled to a scoreless tie in 1940. The Red and Blue gridders were led by Captain Ed Eisenberg, Frank Greco, and Jack O'Donnell. The East Orange squad was tied for the second successive season, as Johnny Saylor, Carl Mosso, and Jack O'Donnell were outstanding for the Panthers. In 1942 the Panthers were again tied, this time 7-7, as Carl Mosso and Ed Lindstrom, co-captains, along with Jack Filan, played outstanding games. East Orange broke the series of ties by trouncing the Blue, 32-2, led by co-captains Tony LaFerrera and Len Daum in 1943.

Barringer scored her first victory in eight years, as the Blue downed East Orange, 13-6. The Panthers were led by co-captains Sam Griggs and Scotty Tortoriello. In 1945 the Blue triumphed again, trouncing the Panthers, 25-14. The stars for East Orange were co-captains Al

Norman and Doug Musler.

The final chapter to the first fifty years of rivalry came on Thanksgiving Day, 1946, when a power-laden East Orange squad romped over the unsuspecting Barringer eleven, 34-7. The teams were rated about even before the game, but an aggressive Panther line, coupled with a string of fast backs, gave the Red and Blue gridders a well-deserved win. Glenn Toner scored the first Panther touchdown, plunging over from the one-yard stripe. Bob Schneidenbach tied the score, going over from the two for the Blue. After that, however, it was a completely Red and Blue variety show. Cliff Kenlein scored twice on passes, Odell Rolling dashed sixty-two yards for another, while Ray Brueno plunged through center thirty yards for the fifth. Brueno and John Colella scored one point-after-touchdown apiece, while Red Hemmer kicked two through the uprights.

Now for the next fifty years!

COACH GEORGE SHOTWELL returned from three years of service in the United States Navy and guided East Orange High School through its most successful football season since his departure in 1942. The Panthers ended the season with a record of six wins, one tie, and two losses.

When the final ratings were compiled, the East Orange squad occupied the fifth rung in the state ladder according to the Colliton System, and was tied for third place with Phillipsburg in Group IV, Section 2.

The season opened with Belleville's initial invasion of Ashland stadium on September 28.

A crowd of over nine thousand turned out to see the Panthers score their first victory of the season, 7-0, as Leroy St. Thomas tallied the only East Orange touchdown on a lateral from Glen Toner. Leon Root converted the extra point.

West Side High of Newark was number two on the Panther victory list, as the East Orange Eleven overwhelmed the Roughriders, 19-6, before a crowd of over eight thousand on October 5. Glen Toner broke loose against the West Orange Cowboys at their home field on October 12. The game was played on a sea of mud, but Toner scored both the East Orange



touchdowns in the third quarter, the first on an eighty-yard jaunt, and the second on a onevard plunge through center.

The first of four "powerhouses" that faced the Panthers reared up on October 19. when Irvington invaded Ashland Stadium and held the East Orange squad to a hard-fought 6-6 tie. Bob McCrae scored for the Panthers early in the third period on a pass from Ray Dankowski, but the Campers knotted the score on a forty-yard lateral-pass play.

The battle of the Titans loomed when, on October 26, the Panthers journeyed to Woodman Field, Montclair. The Mounties were undefeated, and, sadly enough, remained so, as they handed the East Orange combine a 6-2 loss. It appeared as though the Mounties were set for another easy triumph when they scored minutes after the opening gun on a high East Orange pass from center recovered by a Montclair player. Russ Gustavson passed to Larry Coleman in the end zone for the score. But that was all the scoring the Mounties did, and in the closing minutes of the game they allowed an intentional safety to prevent a possible East Orange touchdown drive.

But this first loss was quickly overthrown by the Panthers as they bounded back to dump Nutley's Maroon, 19-0, at Park Oval on November 2. Long runbacks of pass interceptions set up all three Panther scores, as Odell Rolling, Glen Toner, and John Colella each scored once for the Red and Blue.

Next the Panthers walked over an inactive Columbia squad, 12-0, only to be squashed, 29-13 by a Tornado from Orange.

The coming of Thanksgiving Day saw East Orange play Barringer for the fiftieth consecutive time. The game was played at Schools Stadium in Newark and was attended by twenty thousand persons. In pre-game ceremonies members of the Old Guard paraded around the stadium, and those members of both squads that had played in 1897 game were awarded gold footballs.

The Red and Blue thrilled the crowd by taking the opening kickoff and driving eighty yards for the score. Glen Toner plunged over from the two-yard stripe for the score, and Ray Dankowski passed to John Colella for conversion. The Panthers led, 7-0.

Much to everyone's surprise, however, the Barringer squad bounced right back and scored in the same way, driving seventy yards for the score. Paul Schneidenbach plunged over from the one. Larry Caprio passed to brother Vinnie for the conversion and knotted the score, 7-7.

In the middle of the second period, Cliff Kenlein took a pass from Ray Dankowski and scored for East Orange. Glen Toner's plunge for the point was good and the Panthers led, 13-7. Captain Odell Rolling then startled the crowd by running sixty-two yards through the left side of the line to score another East Orange touchdown. Ray Brueno caught a pass and the Panthers took a 20-7 lead.

Ray Brueno scored for the Panthers, driving twenty-five yards through the center of the Blue line in the third quarter. Bill Hemmer's attempted placekick was good and the Red and Blue forged ahead, 27-7. The final score of the contest was made by Cliff Kenlein on a pass from Odell Rolling. Hemmer again kicked the point and gave the Panthers the winning 34-7 score.

For the second successive year East Orange placed a center on the All-Oranges, All-Essex County, and All-State teams. Chuck Pennino received recognition as one of the first centers in the state. Glen Toner, who paced the Red and Blue squad with his running and punting all season, occupied a second team berth on the All-County and All-State teams. Cliff Kenlein was placed on the third team All-State squad. Of the other linemen, Ray Dolan and Dave Perrin were truly outstanding. Among the backs, Ray Brueno, Leroy St. Thomas, Leon Root, and Captain Rolling definitely provided the margin of victory in many contests.

Coach Shotwell's job this season was exceedingly difficult for the squad had been using the "T" formation for two years. It successfully reverted back to the single-wing, however, under his excellent tutelage. Assistant Coach Ed Lewis should be given credit for his work with the backfield men, while the two new Junior Varsity coaches, Mr. George Swoyer and Mr. Harold Smith, guided their squad through an undefeated season.

HIGHLICHTING THE SUCCESSFUL 1946 East Orange soccer season was the selection of ace center forward, Jim "Wicky" Dalbo, on the All-State Soccer Squad. The squad completed the season with a record of four wins, two ties, and two losses. In addition to Dalbo's selection, Frank Matullo, fullback, and Les Auch, goalie, received honorable mention.

Coach Stanley Griffin's charges opened the season on a good note by dumping Verona, 1-0. Dalbo's goal midway in the second half spelled defeat for the Maroon and White. A weak Montclair aggregation met a 4-1 defeat at the hands of the Panthers on October 1. Dalbo was outstanding again, scoring three of the East Orange tallies. Jerry Frino added the other Panther point, and his field work was decidedly outstanding. Harrison gave the Panthers their first defeat in two years as they drubbed the Red and Blue squad, 2-0. The Brown brothers were outstanding in victory for the Blue Tide.

On October 8, Chatham High pulled a surprise by tieing the vaunted Panthers, 2-2, in a real nip-and-tuck battle. Dalbo scored both the Panther goals against the Chathamites, once on a pass from Jerry Frino, and the second time on a pass from Otto Burkhardt. Montclair again provided no resistance as the

Mounties fell before the victorious Red and Blue booters, 4-1, on October 15.

Perhaps the most outstanding triumph came on October 22, when the Red and Blue squad held the highly-touted Kearny Kards to a 0-0 tie. Paced by the fine playing of Frank Matullo, Otto Burkhardt, and "Wicky" Dalbo, the Panthers gave the Kards their first tie of the year. The fine playing of goalies Les Auch of East Orange, and Marty McCormick of Kearny, kept both teams from scoring. On October 24, however, Chatham avenged an earlier tie by upsetting the Red and Blue combine, 1-0. Joe McNany's second half goal gave the Blue and Gold the winning marker.

Al Ashley, Bill McInnes, and Art Walshied were the trio from Verona who stopped the Panthers and held them to a 0-0 deadlock on October 29. Matullo, Dalbo, and Burkhardt played their usual outstanding game. The season ended with a 2-2 tie with Summit on October 31. Paul Dietche scored both of the goals for Summit, the first on a pass from George Zimmerman, and the second on a pass from Tommy Bell. Jerry Frino scored the first Panther tally on a pass from Otto Burkhardt. The last East Orange goal of the '46 season was made by Rich Cignarella on a double pass, Frino to Daudelin to Cignarella.


Besides omitting Orange, Barringer, and Newark Central from the dual slate, the harriers did not compete in the state meet, the Seton Hall Invitational Meet, or the Manhattan College Annual Interscholastic Cross Country Run because of their negatively onesided seasonal record.

With a squad of twenty-five ready to run, the East Orange team engaged Newark West Side in their first encounter of the season, losing 39-16. The Roughriders captured the first four places. High man for the harriers was Tom Ritner, who placed fifth in 14:04. The Panthers' Billy Millering took sixth, and Robert Parvin seventh.

Montclair and Kearny handed the Red and Blue their second and third defeats, respectively, as the Panthers strove to find their stride. Montclair took the first three places, the winning time being fourteen minutes, forty-seven seconds. Tom Ritner was outstanding for East Orange by coming in fourth. Robert Parvin, Rudy Cecere, and Tom Clark followed close on Ritner's heels. Alex Perritt captured first for Kearny in 14:08. Behind five Kards came Tom Ritner in sixth place, followed by Robert Parvin.

A 16-39 loss to Irvington, a 23-32 loss to Bloomfield, another defeat at the hands of Central, and a final loss to Mountain Lakes rounded out the dual-meet schedule. After Irvington swept for the first four places, Tom Ritner, Robert Parvin, and Richard Wirth crossed the finish line for the Panthers. Because of an unfortunate injury to Tom Ritner, the harriers dropped the meet to Bloomfield. Robert Parvin and Richard Wirth copped fourth and fifth, respectively, for East Orange.

East Orange battled its way to seventh place in the Essex County Meet as Tom Ritner took twenty-third place. Tom Clark tied for thirtieth, and Robert Parvin trailed him in thirty-second place. Dave Bolden of Central thirty-second place. Credit for many of the close scores in the contests goes to this year's lettermen, Tom Ritner, Robert Parvin, Tom Clark, Rudy Cecere, Guy Morton, and Richard Wirth; Ritner was the front man for the Panthers in every meet in which he participated.

RECORDS TELL VERY LITTLE of the true story, and this was no exception for East Orange's basketball five. Although the record shows that the Panthers were victorious in only five of their sixteen game schedule, the squad was by no means so poor as the tally would indicate.

The quintet started off successfully, tripping the Alumni five, 36-35, in a close contest. Two of the Panther's Oranges neighbors, however, added a dismal note, as Columbia was a 32-28 victor, while Orange, coming from behind at halftime, won, 39-29.

Things looked better, as the Panthers dumped Irvington's Campers for the third successive season, 31-26. The Maroon of Nutley was victorious by one basket, winning, 39-37, while Montclair saw its successful squad in a 38-31 win over the East Orange five.

East Orange's old time rival, Barringer, defended its own court in a Panther invasion, as three points spelled victory for the Big Blue squad. The Weequahic Indians, however, showed no mercy, as Coach Henry Donn's boys pounded the Panthers to a 51-26 defeat.

Once again the Orange Tornadoes come from behind to draw a close 33-29 win over the Panthers. Glen Toner played an exceptionally fine game for the losing East Orange five. In a real thriller, the Montclair squad squeezed a last minute 29-27 triumph over

the Panthers. Glen Toner played an exceptionally good game in what would have been the season's major upset. The East Orange invasion of the West Orange court was fruitless, however, as the Cowboys let loose with everything to trim the Panthers, 49-34.

Columbia High's basketballers really pulled one out of the hat, as they were losing 18-6 at halftime to the Panthers, but managed to sneak a 26-25 win over the Red and Blue.

An East Orange invasion of the Bloomfield High court proved successful, for the Panthers scored their first triumph in eight games, tagging the Bengals, 42-29. This joy was short lived, as an invading Cowboy quintet erased the Panthers to the tune of 39-18.

After their disgraceful loss to the high-flying Cowboys, the Panthers bounded back and dumped Montclair Academy's formidable squad, 37-30. Big Bob Stafford led the victorious Panthers, scoring fifteen points.

Two more victories followed for the Panthers as they beat Bloomfield Tech's and St. Michael's quintets. 

The Maroon of Nutley shut out Stan Griffin's charges, 1-0, but the Panthers managed to bounce back and win the final game of the year, against West Orange, 5-2.

Trademark of the '46 contingent was a very strong infield led by John Kirbas at first base, Les Auch at second, Pat Digiore at third, and Ray DeGraffenreid behind the plate. Boh Nichols covered the short stop slot, while Fred Kroog, Julie Carocci, and Alvin Padalino shared the mound duties. In the outfield it was Frank Matullo, Wicky Dalbo, and Dave Bowen. Ted Monica, Toby D'Ambola, and Dave Nathan were dependable reserves.

COACH ERNEST BENATRE'S 1946 track team experienced a very successful year, paced by the fine high jumping of Leroy St. Thomas, and by the shot put and discus points garnered by Al Norman. The Panther squad triumphed in six of their seven scheduled dual meets.

In the Newark Board of Education Meet on May 4, the Panthers placed fifth, and were kept in the run by St. Thomas, who captured a first in the broad jump and second in the 120 high hurdles.

East Orange's first victory in a dual meet was made by downing West Side, 88 to 29, on May 10. The Panthers stayed undefeated by trouncing West Orange, 82 2/3 to 34 1/3 on May 14, and Irvington, 76 to 32.

The main event of midseason was the Montclair Invitation Meet, in which the Panther cindermen placed third, garnering 28 points. Joe Vasselli won both the broad jump and low hurdle events. Leroy St. Thomas might have raised the E. O. standing, but was out with a leg injury.

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
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
