# DEDICATION

# EDUCATION IN EAST ORANGE

•Since the close of the eighteenth century, when the first school was constructed, East Orange has made great strides in free education, from one crude schoolhouse to a public school system consisting of ten grammar schools, two senior high schools, and one junior high school.

The first schoolhouse in what is now East Orange was a stone building at the corner of Washington and Main Streets. Used during the latter part of the eighteenth century, it was replaced in 1804 by a two-story, two-room, frame schoolhouse which was erected beside the original one, on the corner of Prospect Street. The first floor of the building was used as a school and the second for religious services on Sundays. The seats, arranged around the room instead of in rows, are said to have been logs split in two, with the flat side up and with four legs. Although it had been officially named Ashland School, it was widely known as

In 1825 a second two-story school building was constructed on Dodd Street at a cost of \$233.93. Ten years later an even larger structure was built on the south side of Main Street near Maple Avenue. In 1855 the old "white schoolhouse" was replaced by another of similar design. In 1891 East Orange High School, the first high school building, opened its doors to students seeking higher education.



Mid-year exams are over, and I can breathe again. What a chore they were! I'm surprised I lived through them. There are better things to think of now. In sports, the soccer team did it again, won The North Jersey Section 2 Championship. Our basketball season wasn't so good this year. I just came home from the Junior Prom. It was wonderful—the gym was decorated like a snow scene, and Bud Laird and his orchestra supplied the music.

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

# Football

WITH COACH ED LEWIS at the helm for the first time, East Orange High School's football team completed another successful season in winning six, losing two, and tieing one. The two defeats came at the hands of Montclair, state champions, and West Side, second to the Mounties. The Panthers had four outstanding players in Ted Whittle, Dave Perrin, Dave Schake, and Lou Araneo. Whittle received All-State recognition while the other three received All-County honors.

The Panthers opened the season by defeating a stubborn Belleville eleven, 14-6. Whittle and little Bob Hickson tallied for the Red and Blue. Hickson scored from the seven-yard line on an end sweep. West Side was next, and the favored Panthers were upset by the Rough Riders, 6-0. The lone tally came in the third quarter on a pass from Lou Ciarrocco to Sam Gambacorta. The Panther stars in that game were Joe Greene and John Farese.

In the team's first inter-Oranges tilt, the Lewismen jolted the Cowboys from West Orange by an 18-0 score. Ted Whittle and Johnny Farese were the Panther heroes. Farese tallied twice, once on a 93-yard run and the other time on a plunge. Whittle tallied the other Red and Blue score on an

end around. Perrin and Schake were the line stars in this fray, along with Whittle and Farese. Irvington was next for the Panthers, and the big cats triumphed 19-12 in a closely fought contest. Bob McCray was the Panther star in this victory. Ken Kett, John Farese, and Ted Whittle tallied for the Panthers. It was the line play of Bob Geddis that was outstanding. Lou Araneo's brilliant pass receiving also was a main factor in the East Orange victory.

On October 25, 1947, 14,000 people jammed Ashland Stadium, East Orange, to see Montclair and East Orange play the most thrilling contest of the year. From the opening kickoff to the final whistle, the people in the packed stands saw a clean, hard-fought game. The Mounties drew first blood in the first guarter on a plunge by George Gilruth from the one-yard line. The Panthers deadlocked the score in the third guarter on a pass from Ray Dankowski to Lou Araneo. Bill Hemmer's place kick deadlocked the score at 7-7. Dick King tallied the final and winning touchdown in the last quarter on a center buck from the 24-yard line. He also converted to end the game by a 14-7 count. The Panther defense and offense outplayed the Blue and White eleven by a considerable margin, but it was the score that counted.

Nutley was next in line for the Panthers, falling to defeat, 14-7. Hardly had the E.O. patrons had time to find their seats before the dashing Maroon careened over for their first and what proved to be their last tally. The Maroon and White capitalized on a Red and Blue fumble and drove to pay dirt with John Bow and Maurice Mantz doing the bulkwork. Mantz dove over for the tally and Bow converted. The Panthers, dazed by this previously unheard of Nutley scoring punch, stumbled through the first half and barely halted another Maroon drive which ended on the East Orange six-yard line at half time. The second half painted an entirely different picture, with the Big Cats dominating the play. Whittle tallied the Panther's first touchdown on a 37-yard run. He tore through a gaping hole in right tackle and raced the distance without a hostile finger touching his body. The other six-pointer was scored by McCray on a plunge from the two-yard line.

The team's second inter-Orange tilt proved to be a good one, as the Panthers tipped the Tornadoes, 7-0. Whittle again was the East Orange hero as he dashed 58 yards for the lone tally. The deepest the Orange and Black penetrated into East Orange territory was to the 25-yard line. Don Tarrantino did some terrific kicking for the Red and Blue when their backs were against the goal line. Twice he got off 60-yard kicks to keep Orange

from scoring. His line play and that of John Della Sala was outstanding. This was played before 8,000 rain-soaked students on the miry grounds of Orange Stadium.

In a thrill-packed contest at Underhill Field, 7,000 spectators watched Columbia and East Orange fight to a scoreless deadlock and a tie for the mythical inter-Oranges championship. Stu Merz and Bob Reaves were the offensive power for the Cougars, while Kett and McCray were the Red and Blue offensive stars. Chuck Roemer and Jack Scott stopped many a Panther drive, while Dave Perrin and Lou Araneo were the Panther defensive stars. The Panthers reached the Columbia two-yard line in the second auarter, but they failed to score as Scott knocked down Dankowski's fourth down pass. The farthest the Cougars penetrated was to the East Orange 11 via a blocked kick.

In the fifty-first meeting between Barringer and East Orange, 14,000 fans saw the Big Cats come out on top, 12-0. The Panthers scored both touchdowns in the first half. Whittle tallied on an end run from the 28-yard line and passed to McCray for the other, the pass play covering 56 yards. McCray ran 35. The defensive stars for the Lewismen were Joe Greene, Rich Gardner, and Bob Geddis. For the Big Blue, they were Frank Peloso and Vinnie Caprio, who led the Barringer eleven in their two goal line stands against the Red and Blue offensive power. Thus ended the season of 1947.

Burkhardt had five, Vinnie Odell three, and Rocco Orlando two.

The Panthers opened the 1947 season by tying Verona, 1-1. Otto Burkhardt's goal within the last three minutes of play tied the game for the booters. Montclair was next in line for the Red and Blue, and the Mounties fell to defeat, 1-0. Ryam's goal midway in the final half was the Panthers' lone tally.

The Panthers then lost to Harrison and Chatham by the scores of 2-0 and 1-0. Against the Blue Tide the Panther defensive play was outstanding. Les Auch led the Panther defense throughout the contest. The Panthers then trounced the Seton Hall J.V., 4-1. Ryan, O. Burkhardt, and Odell tallied for the booters, with Odell tallying twice.

The Red and Blue then vanquished the Mounties on their home grounds at Woodman Field, 4-1. The Panthers rolled up a

2-0 halftime score. Both goals were made by Ryan on passes from George Andresakes and Walt Burkhardt. Ryan scored the third goal with O. Burkhardt converting the final goal.

Kearny gave the Panthers their final defeat in a rough and tough fray, 1-0, the only tally coming late in the final period: Summit was next in line for the Panthers. The booters waited until the second half to unleash their attack. In the opening minutes O. Burkhardt booted a penalty kick between the posts for the first tally. Ryan and Orlando teamed up together for the final two goals, Ryan scoring one and Orlando the other.

The Panthers then fought to a 1-1 tie with Chatham, Ryan scoring the only East Orange marker. The Red and Blue got revenge for an earlier tie and defeated Verona 2-0. Orlando set up one goal on a corner kick which Odell headed in and Walt Burkhardt crossed to Orlando for the second goal. The Panthers ended the season by tying Summit 1-1 in the rain at Memorial Field, Summit, with coach Stan Griffin completing his 24th year as soccer coach at East Orange High.

East Orange High School's Cross Country Team finished its 1947 season with a record of no wins and nine losses. Even though the Bowdenmen had a rough season, they had an outstanding runner. Bob Stabler, who received a gold track shoe, annexed five first places in nine starts to be the squad's best runner. He never finished beyond fourth place in any of the dual meets, and ended up sixth in the county meet, tenth in the state meet, and twenty-seventh in the Seton Hall meet.

The Panther Hill and Dalers started the season by being defeated by Central, 17-38. Stabler notched fourth place; Anthony Cortese and Stan Glushik ran eighth and ninth respectively. Against the Rough Riders from West Side, the Red and Blue harriers went down to defeat, 19-36. Stabler, Alfred Slocum, Cortese, and Glushik all placed. Stabler ran second.

Bob Stabler annexed the first of his five wins in the St. Benedict's Meet at Branch Brook Park. He ran the 2½-mile course in 14:45. Tom Ritner ran third, with Ted Rayment and Harry Vaughn taking ninth and tenth places.

Even though the Montclair harriers defeated the Red and Blue, again it was Stabler in the number one spot. This time he did it

in 14:00. Rither ran seventh. Rayment and Stabler were the only runners from E. O. to place in the Kearny meet. They ran eighth and fourth respectively.

Irvington was next to defeat the Panthers by a 20-35 count. Stabler ran first with Paul Downey, Irvington ace, running a close second. The time was 14:04. Ritner and Don Bowker annexed eighth and ninth for East Orange. The Panthers were then nosed out by the Bengals from Bloomfield by a 27-28 score. Stabler ran the lake course in 13:58. Bowker, Cortese, Vaughn, and Rayment ran fourth, seventh, eighth, and ninth respectively.

Orange was next for Stabler and Co. Bill Kimons, who won the Essex County Meet, captured first place for the Orange and Black. Stabler ran a close second, with Bowker annexing tenth place. 

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
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
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
