THIS YEAR THE STUDENT COUNCIL has again confirmed the advantages of student government. Under the leadership of President Don Armento, Vice-president Evelyn Inman, and Secretary Martha Stewart, many worthy achievements have been effected.

THOUGH LACKING THE PROPER playing facilities, Stan Griffin nevertheless coached the East Orange baseball squad to a fairly good season. Led by the hitting of All-State star John Della Sala and the pitching of Rudy Gerhard and Tom Foster, the Panthers compiled a record of five wins and eight losses.

On April 23 the E.O. nine raised the curtain on a fine note when Rudy Gerhard pitched a one-hit shutout to down Orange, 6-0. Jim Harrington got the only hit in the fourth inning as Gerhard struck out nine men. Ed Van Brunt, sophomore pitching find, then hurled the Panthers to a 4-2 victory over West Side; Carl DeFilippis led the hitting attack with two singles.

Irvington, one of the finest teams in the State, came up with four runs off Gerhard in the first inning and then went on to rout the Red and Blue, 10-2. Although E.O. scored seven runs in the top of the first inning, it wasn't quite enough, for Columbia came back to score a stirring 11-8 victory. John Farese's triple with the bases loaded was the big blow in the first inning uprising.

Going into the last inning of the following game, the Panthers were leading West Orange, but the Cowboys, helped by several infield errors, scored three runs off Van Brunt to walk off with the contest, 5-3. A strong Columbia nine then shut out the Griffin men, 2-0.

Gus Kerizakos, considered the finest pitcher in the State, struck out ten men and gave up but two hits as Montclair trounced the Panthers, 9-1. Returning to the victory column East Orange hitters had a field day as Orange was beaten 10-6. Les Auch starred at bat, going three for three. Bloomfield then gave the Panthers a little of their own medicine by coming up with an 11-3 triumph.

Two more losses followed as St. Benedict's baffled E.O. to the tune of a 12-2 shellacking, and Nutley outwitted the Red and Blue in a hard fought 4-1 game. The season ended on a brighter note when Tom Foster struck out eight men to lead the E.O. nine to a 3-1 win over West Orange.

Della Sala led the squad in batting with .414 average and John Farese was RBI champ with eleven to his credit.

Coach Ernest Benatre and Assistant Coach Ed Lewis rounded their boys into a plugging group whose job it was to get across that finish line first, and that they did in many instances.

The '48 team placed most emphasis on the hurdles and jumps, which they dominated. The sprinters and muscle men, however, did their part also. The main cog in the wheel was Bob Cottingham, who stepped into the shoes of All-Stater Leroy St. Thomas. Cottingham led the squad in points earned and was always good for two first places, his specialties being the high and low hurdles and the high jump. George Moore, another hurdler, was constantly pressing Cottingham.



The 100-yard dash starred Bill Trower and Ted Whittle and Dick Reynolds, all of whom also ran the 220. Donald Ghee, Ralph Milteer, and Earl Washington shared the honors in the 440, while Prince Williams and Robert Parvin were entered in the 880. Cross-Country runners dominated the mile in the forms of Dick Bowker, Tom Ritner, and Stan Glushik.

Tossing around the weights, such as the shot put, the discus, and the javelin, were Dave Perrin, Jack MacKeown, Emile Kirbas, and Milton Reich.

With such a lineup, the team beat Irvington, West Orange, Weequahic, South Side, and West Side, while faltering only to Barringer. The closest meet was with West Orange, which E.O. won 58 2/3–58 1/3.

Running in not too pleasant weather, the Orange Relays found East Orange fifth in the 440, third in the 880, third in the mile, fifth in the two mile, second in the medley, and first in the shuttle. The team as a whole placed third in the Montclair Invitation Meet and twelfth in the State Meet.

Robert Millspaugh, Jack Wills, and Donald Bacher combined to star in the singles matches, while Joe McCormick, Don Polk, Don Armento, and George Fredrick held down the doubles positions. The always dependable Millspaugh was the mainstay for the Panther netsters with Wills close behind.

With easy wins over West Side and Bloom-field, East Orange got off to a flying start, but found the going a little tougher after that. Montclair won a hard fought match 3-2 as Bacher turned in the only singles win.

Over-confident Columbia then fell by the wayside, a simple 4-1 victim, while Bloomfield was trimmed 5-0. West Orange caused a mild


scare when they copped the first two singles matches, but the Panthers recovered and came out on top by a 3-2 margin.

The second loss of the year came at the hands of a powerful Westfield team, 3-2. The Panthers again faltered against Montclair, as the Mounties got their man to the tune of a 4-1 victory. Thomas Jefferson of Elizabeth proved a formidable foe, but they were defeated, 3-2.

In the return match with Westfield, it was the same story again. Westfield won 3-2 as the Red and Blue tried in vain to avenge its earlier defeat. The E.O. netsters then put five straight triumphs together to end the season on a fine note. Columbia was downed 3-2; and West Orange was whitewashed, 5-0.

An overrated Nutley squad was the Panthers' next victim by a 4-1 count. Two 5-0 shutouts over Thomas Jefferson and West Side brought the 1948 campaign to a successful conclusion.

COACH ED LEWIS, in his sophomore year as Red and Blue mentor, piloted East Orange High School through its third consecutive highly successful campaign, winning seven games and losing two. Except for a new ruling which removes from state title consideration any team which has lost two games, the Panthers undoubtedly would have been rated among the top powerhouses in the state.

The 1948 campaign got underway on September 25 at Belleville. Ted Whittle, E.O.'s leading scorer, paced the Panthers to a convincing 20-0 win over a scrappy Belleville eleven. A stubborn West Side aggregation put up quite a fight the following week, but the Red and Blue eked out a 7-0 win.

East Orange remained undefeated and unscored upon through the next two encounters. A weak but enthusiastic West Orange team fell a 20-0 victim to Panther superiority. A reportedly powerful Irvington squad was crushed 38-0 as East Orange unleased a dazzling display of offensive power.

Montclair was then the big obstacle standing in the way of Panther title hopes, but the defending champs proved a little too much for the Red and Blue, which sustained its first loss by a 14-9 count. Although East Orange led at halftime, the Mounties came right back to even up matters. A bad center gav E.O. a 9-7 lead, through a safety, but

Montclair followed with another TD to walk off with the game.

Bouncing back from this defeat, the Red and Blue warriors triumphed over Nutley, 20-6, in preparation for their battle with Orange. There was still an exceptionally good chance of gaining state championship, if the Tornadoes could be bypassed.

But two fast Orange backs, Nat Stevens and Bob Robinson, combined to blast all Panther title dreams with a 19-13 victory. On the ground East Orange was completely overwhelmed, but taking to the air, they almost came up with the victory, falling short by the slim margin of a clipping penalty.

Weakened by innumerable injuries, the Panthers found Columbia a tough opponent, but they managed to score an unimpressive 12-7 last-period win.

Thanksgiving Day—and 12,000 fans saw East Orange even the 52-game series at 23 victories apiece; six games have ended in ties. The reportedly strong Barringer eleven was completely overwhelmed to the tune of a 27-7 Red and Blue victory.

East Orange this season boasted one of the most highly rated lines in the state, with such stalwarts as Dave Perrin (team captain), Don Tarantino, Richard Gardner, and John Della Sala. The Panther backfield agents were paced by All-Stater Ted Whittle, John Farese, Bill Trower, and Charlie Carter.

HAVING ONE OF THE BEST SEASONS in the history of the school, the East Orange Cross-Country team overcame eight opposing teams while bowing to only two. Seven veteran runners, Dick Bowker, Anthony Cortese, Stan Glushik, Ted Rayment, Tom Ritner, Bob Stabler, and Harold Vaughn, led the squad to recognition as one of the outstanding harrier teams of the State.

Coach Paul Bowden's call for team members early in the school season brought thirty strong-winded boys, fifteen of whom remained to finish the season.

For the past two years the E.O. Cross-Country teams have had trouble winning meets. When they had the men to place behind the first man, they didn't have the men to place first. This year they had both. Bob Stabler became the first man, and he established during the season the amazing record of eight first places in ten dual meets, a second place in the County meet, and a tenth place in the State meet.

With Stabler first and six E.O. men right behind him, the team went on to four straight victories over South Side, West Side, Central and Montclair. The Kearny meet was next. Kearny, as compared with East Orange, which had been defeated for two years before this season, had been undefeated for two years. But at the time of the meet, both teams had won four while losing none, and hopes of beating Kearny rose high. On the day of the meet, two of the first six East Orange runners were stricken with colds. Kearny won 31-24. However, the outcome might have been different as in the State meet when the harriers proved their worthiness by beating Kearny.

Three more teams were then left in the wake of the East Orange hurricane. Irvington and Nutley placed only four men in the first ten to cross the finish line, while Bloomfield was almost shut out with only two men in the first ten. Bob Stabler, Tom Ritner, Ted Rayment, Dick Bowker, Harold Vaughn, Anthony Cortese, Stan Glushik, and Gaedy Roma accounted for the eight East Orange runners.

Orange proved to be the toughest of all the teams, as it defeated E.O. 24-31. Barringer, however, was the last to feel the E.O. sting, as the team ended the season with a 33-22 victory.

Not doing so well as was expected of them in the Essex County Meet, the Hill-and-dalers finished fifth amongst the thirteen schools competing. However, the State meet found the East Orange team sixth amongst the schools of the entire state, an achievement which not only brought honor to the team itself, but also to the school it represented, East Orange High School.

Although not quite up to the exceptionally high standards of Coach Stan Griffin's many championship squads, his 1948 version still caused plenty of trouble for some of the best teams in the section. Paced by the fine allaround play of Rudy Gerhard, East Orange's soccer contingent came up with a mediocre season, scoring four wins, five losses, and two ties. Gerhard, who made the second team of the All-State soccer squad, was high scorer with eight goals. Receiving All-State honorable mention, Fred Del Guercio, along with Carl Hauschild, starred on defense, repeatedly stopping opposing scoring threats.

The initial game was at home with Verona, and Gerhard's two goals won a 2-0 shutout for the Red and Blue. In a very sloppily played contest with very little teamwork on either side, the Panthers lost to Montclair, 2-1. It marked the first time in several years that the Mounties have come out on top against East Orange. On October 5, in one of the best played games of the year, the Griffin men held Chatham to a 1-1 deadlock, Gerhard accounting for the lone E.O. score.

Three days later the Panthers locked with the usually fine Kearny aggregation, which was later picked as the Group IV champions. During the first half, Panther goalie Chuck McCusker made innumerable saves until Dave Mathewson, high scorer in the State, scored the lone tally of the game as the Kards won, 1-0

Recovering from this tough loss, the Red and Blue evened scores by removing Montclair from the ranks of the unbeaten by a 2-1 count. The game was marked by a sensational goal, kicked by Carl Hauschild, from thirty-five yards out. Outclassed by a stubborn E.O. attack, Summit battled to a scoreless tie as many shots were attempted but all were wide of their mark.

The season came to a climax when the Panthers upset the highly favored Edison Vocational Tech of Elizabeth, which hadn't lost a soccer game since the sport was adopted several years ago. The score was 2-1. Chatham then scored a 2-0 win as the Panthers were handed their second shutout of the year.

After spotting the visitors a two-goal lead, Verona plugged back to win 3-2, the next week. On October 28, E.O. played host to Summit, downing the visitors, 3-1, as Rocco Orlando scored twice. A very strong Seton Hall Frosh team then closed the season on a sour note, handing East Orange its fifth loss.

COACH FRANK MILNER in his first year as East Orange basketball mentor, put new life into the Panther squad and showed fine prospects for future seasons. The Red and Blue compiled a mediocre record by triumphing seven times during the fifteen-game schedule of the regular season and reached the second round of the Essex County Tournament at Seton Hall.

Scoring for the season was fairly well divided among the starting lineup of Frank Capasso, Chuck Cronham, Stan Manning, Jack Villani, and Lou Tunnera. Tunnera came out on top of the scoring derby, with Villani and Manning giving him close competition all season. Cronham's superb playmaking also merited much praise.

Opening the season with the traditional alumni game, the Panthers gained a hard fought 39-35 victory over the former Red and Blue stars. A 34-32 loss to a weak Orange squad followed. East Orange then got on the right side of the ledger by routing an unpredictable Irvington squad by a 43-22 count.

The Panthers then travelled to Nutley and

came home with a 60-44 loss for their effort. Manning's twelve points highlighted a 50-32 triumph over Montclair. In the next game Barringer put on a last-quarter rally and downed East Orange, 44-42.

Three straight victories followed, as Weequahic, Orange, and Montclair bit the dust. The latter was by far the most formidable opponent; the Panthers were forced to come from behind in the second half to win in overtime on Capasso's free throw.

The season drew to a close on a sour note, as the Red and Blue dropped five straight contests, two each to West Orange and Columbia and one to Bloomfield. Consequently, they finished in a tie with Orange for last place in the Inter-Oranges League. The season's finale was a 37-30 decision over Barringer.

In the post season Essex County tourney, the Panthers upset the favored West Side contingent to the tune of a 39-37 win. Cronham and Villani were the big guns this time, scoring 23 points between them. The second round was the Panthers' downfall as Belleville

downed East Orange, 47-34.
