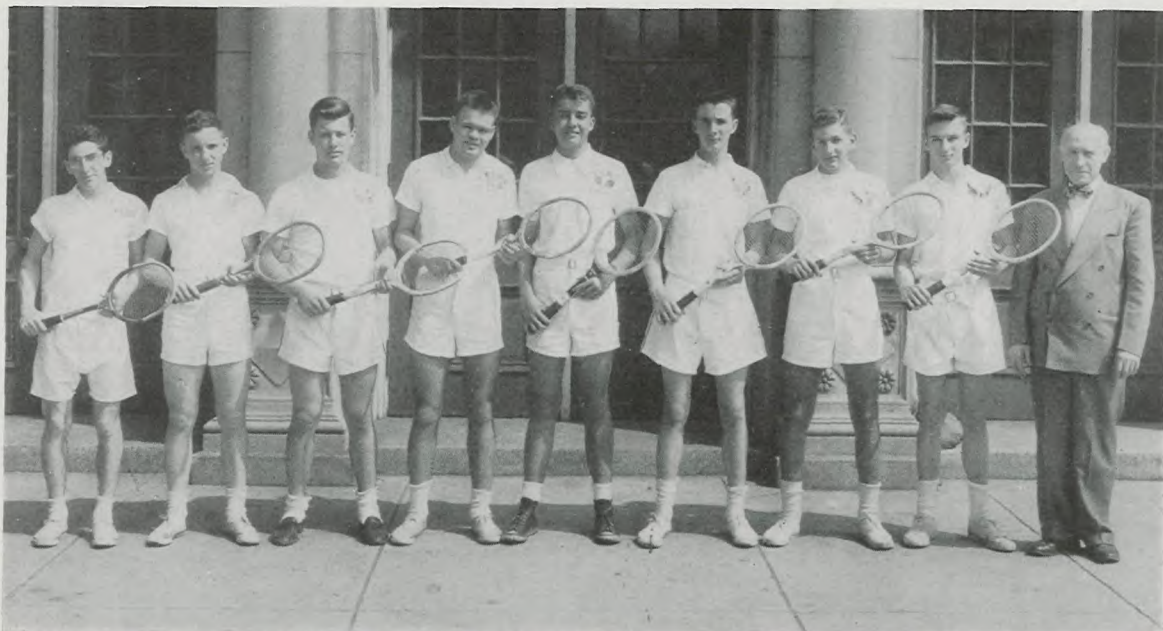

This year the Girls' Athletic Association proved again that after-school participation in athletics is an important part of school life.



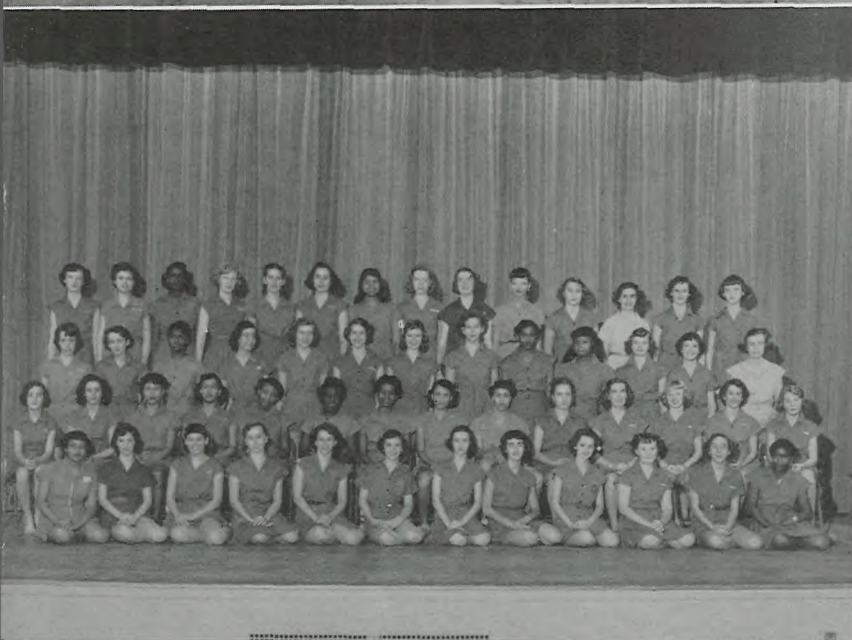

TERMINATING ANOTHER YEAR of publication, *THE NEWS*, rated as a first class paper by the Columbia Scholastic Press Association, continued to be a valuable and necessary part of East Orange High School life.

To achieve its purpose in publishing only the finest type of paper for the student body, *THE NEWS* was compelled to increase its subscription rate because of the high printing costs. Nevertheless, over eighty percent of the school supported the paper and paid one dollar and fifty cents, either at once or in two installments, to members of the active business staff.

Only through the hard and conscientious work of the editorial staff was *THE NEWS* able to produce progressive ideas for bettering the school, creative photography with the accent on action shots, and accurate coverages of all school activi-

ties. Outstanding issues this year were the Thanksgiving, Christmas, and April Fools issues.

Employing the photo-offset system for the second successful year, *THE NEWS* added to the feature page two new attractions: the "Ol' EO Kid," a hilarious comic strip by Angie Schrader, and a timely debate on Universal Military Training; and to the sports page, The Benchwarmer, a regular column written by the sports editor.

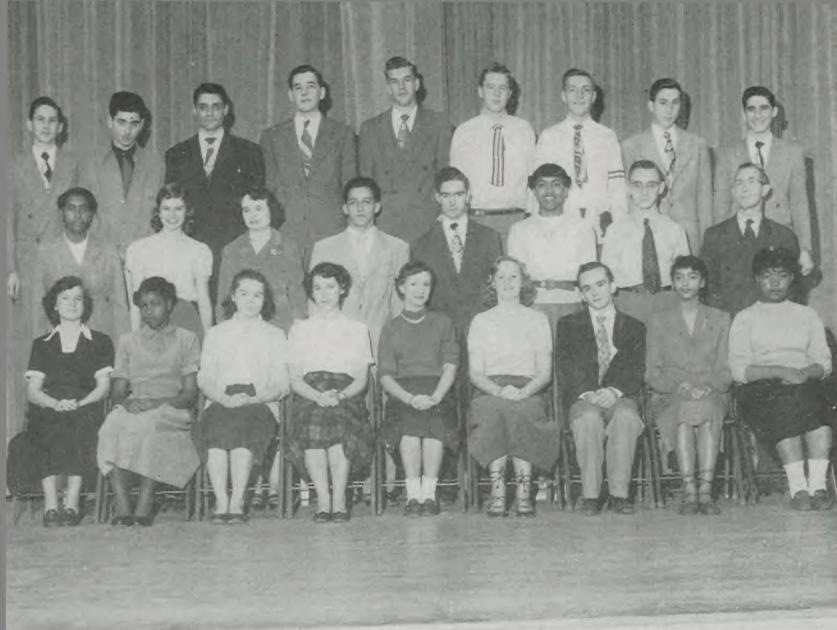
