AFTER A 1-0 TRiUMPH over Orange behind the masterful hurling of Ed Van Brunt in the season's inaugural, the East Orange diamond squad went through a torrid season, just managing to squeeze through with a $6-6$ record.

In their second tussle the Red and Blue men downed West Side by a 6-2 score. They were then defeated by the Columbia nine, 6-5. Taking over the pitching chores, Don Reynolds was the outstanding man for the Columbia charges. The following battle resulted in an 11-2 setback at the hands of West Orange. The Cowboy attack just didn't relent as Panther moundsmen Dick Garrabrant, Frank Capasso, and Hugh Mendez handled the pitching for East Orange.

Irvington downed East Orange by a resounding 15-3 score. The Columbia nine then handed Stan Griffin's aggregation their fourth consecutive defeat, $7-0$.

Led by the slugging of left-handed first sacker, Ronnie Francisco, the Red and Blue then bounced back with a $10-9$ triumph over Montclair. They continued their winning ways by handing the diamond men from Orange a $7-6$ setback.

Barringer fell victims to the Panther attack in the next fray as they came out on the short end of a 10-7 score. Ray Borelli did some fine relief pitching in this fray, while Francisco, Tony De Santis, and Frank Capasso came through with the timely hits.

Joe Kasberger's powerful Gray Bee outfit from St. Benedict's had too much for the Panthers, as they won, 6-0. The Maroon from Nutley also felled East Orange, 4-3.

In the season's finale, East Orange gained revenge on West Orange with an $8-5$ victory. George De Grace of the Panthers was the outstanding player in this fray, collecting three important base hits.

Harassed by lack of experience and faced by formidable opposition, the East Orange cross country team was able to triumph in only one meet during the 1950 season while dropping a deplorable total of ten.

Coach W. Paul Bowden's harriers got their only taste of victory in their first encounter of the campaign. With Joe Brea, Bill Everett, and Lou Metza taking the first three spots, in that order, the Panthers earned a $32-23$ victory over Belleville.

East Orange then began its long losing streak by dropping a match to Central, 15-40. The Mounties from Montclair then forced the Panthers into submission by a 34-31 score. Marvin Mack,
of Coach Bowden's forces, capped the second slot in this encounter.

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The thing of most value and joy that takes place here is the flow of human interest. It is the spirit of the institution to be human in all its activities, and not a soulless mechanism.

The student body is composed of human beings; a human being is in each room, as teacher; in the boiler room, as fireman; in the janitor's shop, as caretaker; and in the principal's office, as director. All have their interests, likes and dislikes, ambitions, dreams, and disappointments. Whatever rules and regulations there are, were made for the purpose of protecting the interests and welfare of all. The rule that perhaps would best include all of them is the Golden Rule.
