
# Dedication







# Class History

#### 1949-50

Do you remember with what curiosity, eagerness, and high hope we entered East Orange High that bright September morning four short years ago? How we were taken on a Cook's Tour of the whole building after the welcoming address of our principal, Mr. Knight? The student's handbook for a guide and our own explorations soon made us familiar with the building. Personalities among the faculty and student body began to emerge, and we soon felt at home in the place where, for the next four years, we would spend the greater part of our waking hours. The first social event, the New Student Party, was a big success, followed by more success on Thanksgiving Day when the Panthers beat Barringer, 24-13, to the delight of the "Old Grads" in the reserved seats. The Pigskin Hop, honoring the football team, was our first regular high school dance. Mention must be made also of the school play that year. Will you ever forget Mr. Bodenchatz' portrayal of The Man Who Came to Dinner or the excellent Christmas Concert with the audience joining in the carol singing! What memories! Our first midyear exams—the Winter Wonderland setting of the Junior Prom—the P.T.A. excursion to Rye Beach-Backstage at the Opera at the Grad Dance! Before we realized it, June had arrived and vacation was at hand.

#### 1950-51

THEN WE WERE SOPHOMORES welcoming from V.L.D. new friends who soon were in the swing of things. "Jeans" and "jumpers" were de rigueur at the Hobo Hop, but our sense of joy at the dance was soon offset by our dejection when the Old Guard Trophy went to Barringer for the first time in four years. If that was murder, what about the cold-blooded murder that hypnotized the audience watching that year's play, Night Must Fall? Relief was provided by the Christmas Concert with its beautiful candlelight procession. Again mid-year exams were behind us, and how welcome the Junior Prom, better remembered as the Sweethearts' Ball. Little need be said about the sail down the East River from Rye that year. Came and went the Senior Prom—half our course was run.

#### 1951-52

A JUNIOR CLASS IS NOT simply a number of students returning to school for the third year. It is a living thing well worked upon by the environment within which it has developed, and in turn giving out to its surroundings something of its own strength, thought, and spirit. Our class confirmed this truth. We really felt a part of the Red and Blue as we knew it was already part of us. *Kartoon Kapers* opened the social season, a joy and a success. Things looked promising, especially in the cafeteria where the

promise was for Musak with our meals. But before the promise was performed, let us never forget (as if we ever could) the Amateur Show by various teachers and students and the can-can by the Flora Dora Sisters that finally brought the conga to the cafeteria. We took in stride another defeat by Barringer, cheered for our still gallant Panthers, and pitched in to cover the Syllabus deficit with an extra fall dance, The Syllabus Swing. It was a social and financial success, quickly followed by another when Charlie's Aunt, the school play, put a feather in Mr. Mohn's hat and gave our principal a chance to display that hidden dramatic talent. The usual fine concert and club parties ushered in the holiday recess. Afterwards we buckled down for the recurring mid-year exams and blossomed out again at the Junior Prom that memorable, enchanting Evening in Paris. Something new was added to the East Orange-Scott Band Concert when for the first time the twirling squad joined in with a fine mixture of pulchritude and scintillating dexterity. The political kettles were boiling everywhere by Spring, and within the school the G.O. election campaigns were spirited and exciting. Bill Abrams, George Casterlin, Ruth Moran, and Jim Weeks were elected president, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer respectively. At the Junior-Senior Assembly the class stood in tribute to the Seniors as they filed out, each of us thinking how very soon we would be Juniors no more. It seemed no time before we were attending the Senior Prom, that beautiful Neptune's Nocturne. The reins of leadership were soon ours to hold.

#### 1952-53

ON OUR RETURN IN SEPTEMBER perhaps we were just another class to the faculty, but we considered ourselves something special—the Senior Class! With the reins gripped firmly, we settled down, in our opinion, "to run the school." A familiar face soon was missing. Mr. Woolson of 228 fame had been appointed principal of V.L.D., and he left to take up his new position. Bob Redman, our new coach, did a great job this year with the "golden eleven"; and although we lost to Barringer on Thanksgiving, we beat Columbia for the first time in several years. Early in the fall we became aware that this was a special year. The school was going to be evaluated. Every organization in the school resolved to make a good showing. The Hayseed Hobble, the first dance of the year, gave us a chance to "grab our pardners and dos-a-dos" as well as fox trot. Our last Christmas season in E.O.H.S. was marked by the presentation of the opera, Amabl and the Night Visitors. How fleeting was our Senior year! The Junior Prom, Oriental Dream, danced to the music of Mike Castoro's Band, highlighted the month of March. The year was no longer flying, it was jet-propelled. The class officers, Dennis Hagerty, Jim Weeks, Lois Sherman, and Doreen Johnson deserve a salute for their fine performance this year. The Grad Dance, Star Dust, will always be one of the fine memories of our high school career. If life is but a play, four of the best years of our lives were enacted in this theatre called East Orange High. We bid her farewell and "pledge devotion true."
