



## **DEDICATION**

• To Mrs. Elsie Pearson Davis, in gratitude for her great contribution to our education, the members of the Class of 1955 dedicate this Syllabus.

Mrs. Davis was born in West Orange; and, after attending school there, she entered the Institute of Musical Art on a Juilliard Scholarship. After a year's study at the Institute, she married and turned her attentions toward family life. She became active in the First Baptist Church of East Orange, where she found an opportunity to collaborate with her brother-in-law in producing annual operettas. Here also she directed a Scout troop for many years, further displaying her interest in others. She is currently the Music Committee Chairman of the church and is involved in organizing and directing its choirs.

This year marks a significant anniversary for our wonderful accompanist, for just ten years ago last January Mrs. Davis joined Mr. Jones in "324". The deciding factor in her coming to East Orange High is an interesting and significant one: while substitute teaching at Eastern School, she happened to hear the singing of the high schools' music students who were on the annual caroling trip. Upon hearing these several hundred voices, she thought that it would be wonderful to play for such groups. She therefore offered her services at Mr. Jones's Steinway, and she has never regretted it in the decade since then. There are hundreds of students, past

and present, who are grateful for her decision, for she can do marvelous things with music and would-be musicians. She and Mr. Jones have been producing, every year, concerts that are splendidly unique and traditionally beautiful. In 1950 they carried over their talents into the production of the All-State High School Chorus Concert. Almost exclusively to Mrs. Davis, however, falls the perennial task of rehearsing all the soloists in our own concerts, as well as our school's All-State Chorus members. In addition to this, where could one find a more efficient bookkeeper, or one with a more prodigious amount of bookkeeping to do?

These are but a few excerpts from a life that is a great unfinished symphony promising many more movements in the future, all with tempos and rhythms as varied as the ones already played. Mrs. Davis's plans for the future include more composing and perhaps serious study of the organ, in addition to continuing right where she is for some time to come.

We who are leaving East Orange High School shall always remember her pleasant smile and calm manner and shall be ever grateful to her for adding so much to our education and enjoyment.






























## IN MEMORIAM

## Harold O. Akeson, B. S.

Member of the Faculty of East Orange High School, 1919-1955




•With sincere regret we have learned of the passing of Mr. Harold O. Akeson on April 20, 1955, after almost thirty-six years of service on our faculty.

Mr. Akeson came to teach at East Orange High School in 1919 upon his graduation from Fitchburg State Normal School in Massachusetts. He taught mechanical drawing and related shop subjects during the years since that time. He received his Bachelor of Science degree from New York University in 1937.

In addition to his interest in his field of work, he enjoyed as pastimes both etching and designing. He had also undertaken the compiling of a volume describing useful articles to be built in the home workshop.

Mr. Akeson will be long remembered by all those people, both faculty and students, who knew him, for his friendly manner and personal interest in each individual won him many friends. Whether in study hall, classroom, or elsewhere, he was continually concerned in the personal welfare of each of his students and was always willing to assist in any manner that he could.

We shall always remember Mr. Akeson as a respected friend and we shall recall with sorrow his going from us.
