- Born in Limestone, Maine, on July 25, 1893, Mr. Knight was graduated from his hometown high school before continuing his education at Bates College. Having received his A.B. degree, he studied further at the University of Grenoble in France and at Columbia University, thus earning his A.M. degree. He also carried courses in guidance and school administration in 1926 at Columbia University and at Montclair State Teachers College.

Mr. Knight's career was interrupted by war service in the United States and in France, until at last he came in 1920 to East Orange High School where, for twenty-five years, he served as a teacher of social studies and as an associate principal in charge of guidance and placement.

After serving as acting principal from December, 1945, until March, 1946, Mr. Knight then took the reins as principal, the capacity in which we shall remember him.

Not only as a person sitting, working in the Main Office, addressing assemblies, or happily presenting awards shall we remember Mr. Knight, but also as a friendly person marching through the halls as the bell rang, greeting everyone with a friendly smile; being sincerely pleased with honors won by "his" students in outside activities; working with the Student Council to improve school conditions; enjoying himself at all concerts, plays, and other student presentations; standing in numerous receiving lines at Junior Proms and at Grad Dances; sitting through bitter-cold football games cheering "his"


Panthers on to victory; listening to qualms of parents; and needless to say, competently directing the work of his faculty.

Busy? Yes, our principal is a very busy man, for not only is he active here in school but in many outside professional organizations, including the National Education Association, the New Jersey Education Association, New Jersey Secondary School Principals Association, College Entrance Examination Board, and the Headmasters Association. Being president of the New Jersey Secondary School Teachers Association and a member of the Executive Committee of the Middle States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools consumes much of his time.

Contributing time to his community as well, Mr. Knight is second Vice-President of the Board of Trustees of the Bureau of Family Service as well as a member of the Board of Trustees of the Veterans Service Bureau.

As we seniors leave East Orange High School, we happily regard Mr. Knight as a member of our graduating class, for although he is leaving in a different capacity, he too is traveling toward new horizons.

Thus, as fellow East Orange High School graduates, we should like to express our profound gratitude to Mr. Knight. To him and Mrs. Knight, who as a dutiful wife has "lived" the role of principal with her husband, we extend sincere best wishes for a life of continued happiness.

## football

Under the Fine Coaching of Mr. Robert Redman, the Panther gridders can look back on another fine season which saw them take six out of eight games, finishing with four successive victories.

After dropping their opening fray to Belleville, for the first time in ten years, the Big Cats went on to wallop West Orange and Irvington by scores of $34-0$ and 41-19 respectively.
Dominating play for the opening kickoff, East Orange tallied once in the first half on Charley Brown's nine-yard run and added four touchdowns in the second half to ice the fray.

The Camptowner tussle saw the Cats score all their points in the first half with Chucky Munford, Seldon Chiles, Tom Tullio, Jim Ross, and Charley Brown all breaking into the scoring column.

Clashing with the traditional foes from Montclair, the Red and Blue suffered their second loss of the campaign, losing a 14-7 thriller before 12,000 fans at Martens Stadium.
East Orange, recovering a first-period fumble, scored four plays later, Munford plunging from the six. With time running out in the half, Mountie fullback Warren Rouhofer bolted his way into the end zone, knotting the count at 7-7.

On the first play of the third period, Munford galloped 57 yards to the Blue and White seven. The Panthers, however, lost the ball on downs, the Mounties gaining possession and marching to their second touchdown to round out the scoring.
From here, East Orange's gridders proceeded to slaughter West Side, 35-6; to topple Orange's Tornadoes, $20-0$; to edge the Cougars from Columbia, 21-13; and to beat Barringer by the same count.
Thanksgiving brought the fifty-ninth Turkey Day Classic between the two schools, making it the oldest high school rivalry in the country. The Panthers, by virtue of their win, moved one up in the long series with twenty-seven victories, to the Big Blue's twenty-six, six matches having resulted in ties.
The Red and Blue, with 193 points, ranked first in the county in scoring. Leading the pointgetters was All-State fullback Chucky Munford, stalwart of the Panther backfield, with sixty points. Runner-up to Munford was Brown, with nine touchdowns. Tullio, a second string fullback, scored four key touchdowns and plunged for one extra point, ranking third among the Cat scorers.
Aside from the scoring threats, two assets to Coach Redman's contingent were the plaving of quarterback Bob Roma and the place kicking of Joe Huguenin. Roma's spirit and drive helped keep the squad together offensively and defensivelv while Huguenin's educated toe enabled the E. O. gridders to breathe more easily in many of their closer encounters.

## BASKETBALL

With Their Only Losses coming at the hands of Montclair and Nutley in regular season play, and Seton Hall in Essex County Tournament action, East Orange's high-flying cagers rolled up an impressive 17-3 record, one of the finest records in recent Panther history.

After the perennial opener with the Alumni, which resulted in a $85-61$ Red and Blue victory, the Cats knocked off West Side and Orange in two double overtime thrillers.

The see-saw West Side contest went into its first overtime period when, with thirty seconds to go and the Rough Riders leading 49-47, Leroy Curry hit on a driving shot, knotting the count. The Riders' George Johnson opened the first extra stanza by dunking two free throws, but Lee Sager's charity tosses seconds later tied it again at 51 all, setting the stage for the second, and sudden death, overtime.

The Panthers grabbed the tap but lost the ball after nineteen seconds had elapsed. The Newarkers then froze the ball until seconds remained, when Wendell Williams missed a jump and Sager took the rebound and threw a full court pass to Bruce Callen, who, with one second left, sank a jump shot to win it. The bedlam that followed will be remembered for a long time.

Victories over Kearny and Irvington gave the Panthers a 200 record in the Big Ten Conference, the newly formed league operating in basketball for the first time.

The sting of the Nutley loss was completely forgotten after the Big Cats' $48-46$ triumph over Montclair, a non-conference clash played at the latter's court.

Paced by Curry and Sager, East Orange jumped off to a 13-6 lead at the quarter, only to trail 23-19 at the half. The Cats gained a 36-31 lead in the third period which they held until two minutes remained, when Al Pond sank a jump shot, sending the game into overtime tied at 44-44. Each squad sank a basket in the first overtime, once again making way for the crucial second extra frame. The Mounties' Bob Haines snagged the tap but missed his lay-up, fouling Bob Paris after the shot. The Cats' steady guard proceeded to sink both foul shots, the needed margin for the victory.

From here the Panthers went on to smother West Orange and Nutley by scores of 69-52 and 63-50 respectively.

In one of the Red and Blue's famous "up-hill" battles, the Cats again came from behind to whip Orange for the second time, 65-61, before dropping a $62-61$ heart breaker to Montclair, their only loss in Conference play.

The Panthers, following with a six-game winning streak, breezed into the Essex County Tournament seeded third.

With Sager, Curry, and Hatcher controlling the back-boards, the Cats rolled to a $65-53$ win over Belleville.

The quarter-final fray with Bloomfield found the Cats trailing 32-22 at the half. A second-half drive, with all five of the boys weighing in with key playing, gave the Panthers the $51-48$ win.

The semi-final round saw the Cats drop a hard fought 54-46 decision to top seeded Seton Hall, eventual tournament victors. The game, which was much closer than the score indicates, exemplified the tremendous improvement in Coach Frank Milner's boys over previous years and also gave a glimpse of equally fine future aggregations.

One of the many successful committees in the G.O. this year has been the Leadership Committee, previously known as the Investigations Committee.
