


There is nothing more important to young people today than preparation for a career, and guiding that preparation is what Mr. Philip I. Towle does for many students at East Orange High School in his capacity as Chairman of the Department of Business Education. Mr. Towle himself studied at several colleges including Bowdoin College, Boston University, where he received his B.A. degree, and New Jersey Law School.

During his forty-five years in education Mr. Towle has taught widely in the Northeast in public and private schools. He came to East Orange thirty-six years ago; besides his teaching

As chairman, Mr. Towle has had a difficult position requiring him to keep his department modern in a business world that is constantly changing in techniques and equipment. His careful choice of teachers and planning of work has made it possible for graduates to fit easily into busy office work.

Mr. Towle has proved himself to be a goodnatured and understanding teacher, one who is well liked by his students. He has made his classes as interesting as they are informative, and this is certainly the mark of a superior teacher. In addition to having learned in his classes many marketable skills, students will retain the sense of pleasure that comes from doing in an orderly and superior way all the tasks that face them. Mr. Donald E. Hosmer, Chairman of the Department of Foreign Languages, received his A.B. from Dartmouth, his A.M. from Brown, and has done graduate work there and at several other colleges, including the Sorbonne in Paris. He also spent some time in the Navy and in teaching before he came to East Orange High School in 1922.

Learning a new language is for most students a new and exciting experience. It can also be a difficult task, but under Mr. Hosmer's guidance as chairman of the Department of Foreign Languages, the students at this school are assured of the best teachers and books to make this task as clear and understandable as possible while keeping it still a challenge to the best in a scholar. This is true whether a student chooses Latin, French, Spanish, or Italian.

Mr. Hosmer is himself an excellent teacher who enjoys languages and helps his students to appreciate them as he does, both in conversational use and in their literature. He has great patience with the true student, helping him over rough spots and guiding him to a better understanding of his own language while he learns the new one. Mr. Hosmer's pupils should recall in later years their glow of success when at last they enjoyed a story in French without first translating it.

To Mr. Bauer, to Mr. Towle, and to Mr. Hosmer, the Class of 1957 extends its deep appreciation for their many years of service and understanding guidance and expresses the wish that all three will have many happy years of retirement with their families.




MARJORIE E. PEEL



Under the capable leadership of President Bruce Callen, Vice-President Flora Conte, Secretary Barbara Quinn, and Treasurer Don Gfroerer, the General Organization of East Orange High School has compiled an impressive and commendable record of events for the past year.

Proving to be one of the most successful groups, the Cafeteria Committee, under the direction of Marlene DeRosa, established a milk bar, thereby decreasing the number of students in the lunch line. The Assembly Committee also put forth great effort in promoting exchange assemblies with the schools in the Oranges and Newark.

Through the efforts of the General Organization and the officers of the Student Council of Columbia High School, a combined jazz concert

was presented.

Numerous committees were formed during the past year to look into pressing matters. The Student Dress Committee sent out a questionaire to observe the students' reaction to proper school attire. Another committee was formed to investigate the problem of the crowded No. 96 bus. Many students felt that this bus was inadequate to carry East Orange students and that another bus should be added to the route between eight and eight-fifteen a.m.

East Orange High School was the scene of the first meeting of the Inter-Oranges Congress for the year 1957. Our president, Bruce Callen, presided over the meeting, the members of which discussed controversial issues brought up

during student council meetings.

Also undertaken by the General Organization was a Clean-Up campaign. Students were urged to do their part in maintaining the appearance of the school.

One of the newly appointed committees, the Parking Lot Committee, headed by Richard Corlin, contributed a great deal to the establishment of a student parking lot. All the student's cars were registered, signs were erected in the parking lot, and adequate space was provided for each car.

Carmela Silvestri introduced a bill which provided for a banking system in the school. By this plan students opened bank accounts with the Howard Savings Institution and deposited their money with the home room teachers

once a week.

Another new group, the Music Committee, which is a branch of the Cafeteria Committee, secured the records played during the lunch periods.

The Elections Committee conducted the elections of class officers and home room representatives to student council in October and took charge of the election of General Organization officers in April.

After a fruitful year of many accomplishments, the last meeting of the General Organization was adjourned by the newly-elected student council

officers.



With the meeting of the editors, the process of composing the NEWS begins. Here possible story material is discussed and decisions concerning make-up are made. Assignment day soon follows, and within hours busy reporters are seen racing from place to place, culling the information that will enable them to write their stories.

When most Pantherities are doing homework or just relaxing, the lights in 213 are still burning. Typewriters glow white-hot, red pencils quickly become mere stubs, and reams of paper are consumed in the actual writing of the NEWS. After being proofread, the paper is finally ready for the printers; then four days later, on Galley Day, the NEWS returns to the school for last-minute corrections. Once again it is sent to the printers, though the work of turning out a first-rate paper is not yet complete. There is still the job of counting the papers after delivery to the school and distributing them to the homerooms. Once the NEWS reaches the students, the cycle begins again. Local merchants are canvassed for advertising, and the subscription campaign is intensified.

Under the direction of Editor-in-Chief Steven Rosen, Advisor Mr. Loesch, Business Advisor Dr. Risinger, and through the efforts of all the tyros, reporters, cartoonists, and star reporters, the NEWS is issued twelve times during the school year. An example of ability and industriousness, our school newspaper is heartily approved of and faithfully read by more than 1300 students

and teachers.

COMMUNITY SERVICE ORGANIZATIONS

At both East Orange General Hospital and Orange Memorial Hospital, the Candystripers since their founding in 1944 have achieved a total service record of 53,000 hours of actual duty. This year's group of 45 junior aides has served after school and on Saturdays, giving an average of 120 hours per girl. Their duties include feeding patients, assisting in the laboratory, working in the Admitting Office and the Pediatrics Ward, and wherever they may be needed. Receiving invaluable training and experience at the hospitals, the Candystripers offer their services in return.

Originated in East Orange by their sponsor, Miss Lindsay, the Candystriper organization has spread to 45 states, to Puerto Rico, Hawaii, Israel, and Australia.

A second service club has been assisting the staff at the Valley Community Center in Orange for more than ten years. Volunteering their services to the Center, the club members aid in activities ranging from the education of preschool children to the sponsoring of programs directed toward preventing juvenile delinquency. An awareness of social problems and the development of leadership qualities are compensations for the time spent at the Center.

Both the Candystripers and the volunteers at the Valley Community Center have during the year carried out the East Orange High School's ideals of community service.

FOOTBALL

Orange has the ball now, but not for long.



Although the East Orange football team had lost all of its 1955 starting backs and a part of the line, the 1956 Panthers finished the season with an impressive 5-1-2 record and were second to Montclair in Essex County competition. This season also marked the debut of a new head coach, Dr. Donald E. Fuoss.

The opening game was a victory for the Red and Blue over Belleville. John Amos and Bob Paris each provided a touchdown, and the extra point conversion by Joe Huguenin made the difference in the 13-12 score. Against West Orange the Cats could do no more than tie, 7-7. Against Irvington, East Orange picked up seven points in each quarter for a final score of 28-7.

Although the heavily favored Montclair squad was leading only 7-0 at the end of the first half, they broke through for 21 more points in the third and fourth quarters to hand the Panthers their first and only defeat. Bob Haines scored the first two touchdowns for the Mounties in off-tackle dives from 3 and 2 yards out. He provided for another six points in the

fourth quarter with a 31-yard scoring pass to his brother Richie. Tony Carnevale scored the final touchdown on a 75-yard jaunt to paydirt, for a score of 28-0 in favor of Montclair.

Alert defensive play allowed the Red and Blue to turn four West Side fumbles into four touchdowns for their own team. In the 32-6 fracas Warren Simpson led the scoring with 24 points while Paris scored the only other touchdown. It was much the same story in the 27-0 defeat of Orange, with Amos, Hatcher, and Paris the scoring players. Joe Huguenin was the star of the 7-7 tie with Columbia, making the score for East Orange in the final minute of

The Barringer encounter was a suitable climax to the impressive season. The Newark City Champions lost the ball on a fumble during their first scrimmage play, and three plays later Paris tallied on a 15-yard off-tackle run. The Big Blue went out in front in the second quarter, 7-6, as Bruce Humphrey went over on an 8-yard sweep, but the Panthers retaliated in the last quarter. After Paris had intercepted a Barringer pass in their own territory and run it back to 16, Huguenin carried the ball to within a few inches of the goal line. Simpson then carried it over the line to give East Orange a 12-7 victory. The sixty-year-old rivalry between the schools now stands at 28-26-6 in favor of the Red and Blue.







BASKETBALL





No one in East Orange High School was disappointed with the impressive 17-5 record turned in by Coach Frank Milner's powerful basketball contingent through the 1956-57 season.

With four of last year's starters forming the backbone of the team, there was only one loss due to graduation. It was flashy Leroy Curry, who last year set a new Panther high for scoring in a single game by tallying 36 points against Barringer. However, with Lee Sager, John Hatcher, Bruce Callen, and Bob Paris returning and Graham Lamond filling the vacant post, the Panthers were ranked among the best in the state.

The first encounter of the season was a disappointing setback at the hands of West Side. The underrated Newark squad hit from all over the court to take an insurmountable lead of 23-14 at half-time. They went on to upset the Red and Blue 53-45.

The Cats soon lost their opening day jitters, however, and proceeded to eleven straight frays. With crushing victories over Orange, Kearny, Irvington, Nutley, and Montclair the Panthers proved that they were not overrated. The next close contest was with West Orange. The Cowboys never took the lead, but they came close, as the score was 12-8 at the end of the first quarter, 25-22 at the half, and 40-38 at the end of the third quarter. The Red and Blue came through once again to win the game, 50-45.

Nutley, Orange, and Montclair were the next to fall, each for the second time, before Coach Milner's smooth-working power-house. The Panthers almost blew their third quarter lead over Columbia as the Cougars' Lynn Fader, Bob Scheu, and Art Bartner tallied two points apiece in the last minute of play to cut their deficit to two. East Orange held the Cougars, however, and took the game, 47-45. Lee Sager became the first hoopster in Panther history to tally 1000 points during his high school career

in this game. By the end of the season he had

built up his career total to 1259.

Belleville's Coach Wische pulled a slick piece of strategy on the Panthers, bringing his team to within five points of a victory. Early in the second quarter, while the Red and Blue held a 17-13 edge, the Bellboys froze the ball completely. For six minutes of play the East Orange squad waited idly for their opponents to make their move. The half ended with the Panthers still holding a 17-15 lead although they had gone scoreless throughout the entire period. The Cats added another victory to their record as they went on to take the game, 36-32.

The battle with Bloomfield, top ranked in the Big Ten Conference, was the biggest game of the season. A crowd of 1200 packed the Bloomfield gym to witness the Bengals' thrilling double overtime victory over the Panthers. Bloomfield jumped off to an easy 18-8 first quarter lead, but the Cats came back with a strong second quarter to cut their deficit to three points, 22-19. Sparked by John Hatcher's three straight field goals in the third quarter, East Orange went into the final session trailing 31-29. Midway in the final period the Cats broke through to take a 39-35 lead, only to be deadlocked at 41 all by the end of regulation time. Both teams went scoreless in the first overtime, but in the "sudden death" overtime that followed, Bloomfield ace Stan Kaminski tallied the winning lay-up.

West Orange benefited from the letdown after the Bloomfield encounter and handed the Cats their third setback of the season. In another overtime game the Cowboys tallied five points in the extra period as the Cats went

scoreless to win 49-44.

After downing Columbia in the last Conference game of the season, the Panthers crushed Barringer 85-46. Lee Sager, by tallying 40 points, broke Leroy Curry's record for points

scored in a single game.


In the opening round of the Essex County Tournament the third-seeded Panthers were faced by Our Lady of the Valley. After trailing by 10 points early in the fourth quarter, the Red and Blue cut their deficit to one with twenty seconds to go. After a set shot by Sager bounced off the rim, Bob Paris grabbed the rebound and sank a 20-foot jump shot in the last second of play to give East Orange a 49-48 win.


East Orange rolled past West Orange in the quarter finals and found themselves faced once more by Bloomfield. In the fray the Cats took an early lead, but the Bengals caught up early in the second quarter. Despite Sager's tourney-record-tying effort of 38 points, the Bengals

edged by East Orange, 61-59.

In the State Tournament the Red and Blue got to the Group 4 finals before being stopped once more by their nemesis, Bloomfield. After downing Barringer 66-40 and South Side 63-50, the Panthers faced the Bengals. As in the last encounter with their arch-rivals, the Cats took an early lead but lost it in the second quarter. They never regained it as Bloomfield took the game 54-41.
