Inexperienced personnel, minor injuries to key players, the Asian Flu, and the inconsistency in scoring the point after touchdown may best sum up the Panthers' $3-6$ record. Nine players were lost to the squad, including two lettermen, for sundry reasons before the first game. With eight underclassmen in the starting line-up, and playing most of the time, the Panthers scored a total of 20 touchdowns to 22 for the opposition. The Panthers were able to convert only seven points after touchdowns to 16 for the opposition. Two games were lost by the margin of one point, keeping the Panthers from enjoying a winning season after a fast start of three straight wins.

The Belleville game, slated as East Orange's opener, was postponed because of the Asian Flu epidemic to the Saturday before Thanksgiving. The first game, played with Nutley, was won by the Panthers with a score of 13 to 7. Sophomore quarterback Cliff Baskerville scored the first touchdown of the year for East Orange. Nutley scored and converted, leading 7 to 6 until the third quarter when Bernico Boyce on an off-tackle run went 58 yards for East Orange's deciding touchdown. Amos carried for the conversion.

The Panthers struck on the ground and through the air for a stunning 40-14 victory over West Orange. Two touchdowns were made by Amos; one by Baskerville to Jenkins on a pass-run play; and one each by Baskerville and Robert Lee on a 52 -yard run, and Lloyd Johnson on a four-yard plunge.

The Irvington game turned into a defensive battle after Wally Florence's touchdown on an intercep-
tion in the opening minutes of the game. The Panthers held on to their 6-point margin for the rest of the game, making the final score 6-0, although the Panthers had to hold off two Irvington drives on the one and two-yard stripes to win.

The Panthers held Montclair 7-6 for the first half, but in the second half the high-rated Mounties exploded for four touchdowns. Led by the twin halfbacks Richie and Bob Haines, the final score was 34-6.

West side scored an upset in defeating the Panthers 14-13 in a heartbreaking one-point win. Baskerville and Lee made the touchdowns.

A fired-up Orange squad handed the Panthers their second one-point loss, 19-18, in a scoring contest which saw each team score two touchdowns in the first quarter.
East Orange received Columbia's kick-off and marched 48 yards for a touchdown with Baskerville going over from the one-yard line. The attempted point after kick was wide. Two touchdowns by Columbia sewed up their $13-6$ win.

East Orange lost to Belleville by a score of 21-13. East Orange's touchdowns were made by Baskerville and Lee.

The high point of the season, the annual Barringer game, was lost to the highly favored Newark eleven by the slim score of 20-12.

The last touchdown of the season was made by Senior Bill Peer on his 46 -yard pass interception.

Twenty-five players lettered for the Panthers this year with eleven seniors playing their last game.

The outlook is bright for next year's team as fourteen lettermen are expected to return.
