After many years of hard work and planning, a goal was finally realized when early this last year, ground was broken for an extensive, modern addition for East Orange High School. A large portion of this achievement can be credited to the Board of Education.

The Board often burned the midnight oil, working with the PTA, the faculty, and the architects to draw up plans for the addition, and after many different plans were submitted, the City Council accepted one of them and appropriated the necessary funds.

Besides crusading for new facilities, the Board also makes all teacher appointments and approves curriculum changes before sending them to the New Jersey State Board of Education. In this way the East Orange Board of Education helps maintain the high academic rating of all East Orange schools.







## We Remember

"Grab your partner and circle left" was the cry as we were off to the "Rooster Romp", our All-School Dance, followed closely by our first Christmas Concert, highlighted by the opera, "Amahl and the Night Visitors".

Emerging from vacation to meet our first mid-year exams, we heard frightening reports from "experienced" upper-classmen. We soon realized that the reports were grossly exaggerated, and shortly turned our thought to The Junior Prom, "Snowflake Swirl", which was a huge success. Our basketball team enjoyed what proved to be its best record of our four years, winning 17 and losing only 3. The faculty, as usual, won its game over Alpha Hi-Y by a score of 45 to 42.

Broadway came to East Orange with the student-faculty production, "My Sister Eileen", followed by the Spring Concert, including the opera "Down in the Valley". Then the whirl of General Organization elections, the Grad Dance, and the final exams made us realize that soon we should no longer be "low man on the Totem Pole".

Sophomores—we were proud of that! We came back to school to greet our new principal, Mr. Robert Redman, who took over after Mr. Knight's retirement. The position of football coach was now open, and Dr. Donald Fuoss came from West Virginia to lead the Panthers to a successful season climaxed with a Thanksgiving Day victory over Barringer, which allowed us to keep the Old Guard Trophy.

At Christmas time we were aware of another change. Mr. George Gilbert was our new music director, and he added his new ideas to the music program, making it even more delightful.

After vacation came those mid-years; and after them came the Junior Prom with its theme, "Winter Wonderland", and its queen, Barbara Larsen. Our basketball squad enjoyed another victorious year, again reaching the semi-finals in the Essex County Tournament.

Spring brought more than hay-fever to East Orange. The student-faculty production was the hilarious Broadway comedy, "The Man Who Came To Dinner". Soon the campaign wagons started to roll for the G.O. election, and when the results were in, Nick DeSantis emerged as president, with Joe DeCapua, Barbara Larsen, and Barbara Jacobitti as vice-president, secretary, and treasurer respectively.

The end of the year brought the Grad Dance, and we realized that the day was coming when we would be upper-classmen. At last we had reached that long-awaited moment—we were upperclassmen. We looked down benevolently as the Freshmen and Sophomores held their "Howdy Hop", but we really were proud when one of our number, Shirley Hendricks, was chosen as the first "Football Queen" at the All-School Dance.

Thanksgiving came before we had fully adjusted to our role as second-in-command, and we found ourselves facing Barringer with a 3-won, 5-lost record. Although the score was close, we mourned as the Old Guard Trophy went to Barringer for a year, but we could still look forward to regaining it as seniors.

The Christmas Concert was as beautiful as ever and led us into a whirl of holiday festivities from which we emerged to greet those grueling mid-year exams. In the midst of a blizzard, we found ourselves trudging to a "Hawaiian Paradise," the Junior Prom, but seeing our own lovely queen, Shirley Hendricks, surrounded by her stunning princesses, Lena Potuto, Constance Catania, Marlene Belgioso, Diane Arthur, Sheila Martin, and Frances Badalamenti, made it all worthwhile.

"Trunk Crime", the student-faculty production, was a smashing success, and another success, the Spring Concert, followed close on its heels. Since our class was taking over the Student Council, the General Organization elections were more important than ever. Nick Spiezio took the helm in the final ballot, while Marie Sellitto, Judy Quinn, and Lenny Barbato secured the posts of vice-president, secretary, and treasurer respectively. Now we realized that after the formality of the 1958 graduation we would be in control. The Senior Prom, held for the first time outside of school, climaxed the year and filled our heads with visions of the year to come.

Class elections began the year, and we sailed ahead with Carl Vasta as president, John Gonnella as vice-president, and Louise Yannuzzi and John Martin as secretary and treasurer respectively. At Thanksgiving the Old Guard Trophy was regained in the climactic game of our first undefeated-untied season in 60 years. With this victory, we were assured of State Championship honors, while two of our classmates were chosen as part of the All-State Football Squad.

The All-School Dance started the holiday season with its theme of "Happy Holly Daze", and we suddenly realized that the "Lasts" had begun. We saw our last Christmas concert, took our last long exams, and enjoyed "John Loves Mary", our last school play. The Junior Prom raced by, and the Junior-Senior Assembly came before we realized it.

As tears of nostalgia filled our eyes, only two "lasts" remained: one, our own Senior Prom climaxing our high school social life; and two, that long-to-be-remembered day—Graduation. To each of us that moment on the platform carried its own special significance and memories—memories which will serve as the building blocks for our futures and as measures of our successes.



## FIRST UNDEFEATED, UNTIED SEASON

The 1958 football season will be long remembered by East Orangeites as one which made history and brought great honor and prestige to the school and community. By attaining the first undefeated-untied season since 1899, the Panthers won themselves a berth as co-state champions along with a powerful Plainfield eleven. Trophies and awards rolled in from many newspapers and athletic associations. In the Saylor and Cotillon ratings, East Orange was at the top along with Plainfield; and the Newark News named the two teams as co-state champions. Two members, Al Volpe and Ed Roberts, made first string on the All-State team, while Tony Moschella and Cliff Baskerville made the third team. All four were named to the All-Essex team.

Opening the season with an impressive victory over Belleville by a score of 32-2, the Panther gridmen demonstrated the strong scoring power that characterized the squad during the entire season. Able quarterback Cliff Baskerville piloted the team with precision and accuracy, scoring twice on two short plunges from the two-yard line and passing for two others. He passed to right-end Thurman Davis for a 15-yard play and left half-back Bob Hooper for a 55-yard pass-run play for 12 more points. Andy Allen scored the last townchdown on a blocked pass. Egidio Caruso converted 2 out of 5 points after touchdowns. Belleville's only scoring came late in the fourth quarter with an intentional safety giving them 2 points.

Things looked rough for the still young champs as Nutley scored early in the game when they recovered a fumble and went 5 yards for a TD. East Orange retaliated when Baskerville completed a pass to Davis for 15 yards. The junior quarterback scored twice with two short plunges into the line. Caruso converted 2 for 3 for a final score of 20-6.

West Orange fell prey to the ground gaining offensive and hard hitting defensive of East Orange by a score of 28-6. Right halfback Earl West let loose, scoring three times on short plunges climaxing sustained drives. Baskerville went through the center for another Panther score. Caruso converted 4 for 4. West Orange was the only team to score on the impregnable defensive unit. They recovered their own fumble in the end zone. East Orange lost an excellent ball

player when linesman Andy Allen received a

broken leg in that clash.



Irvington followed the tide of East Orange's other foes. They were unable to score while E.O.'s Earl West scored three times. On two pass-run plays he covered 60 yards. The sophomore half-back electrified the crowd when he broke loose for a 96-yard run TD. Substitute quarterback Harold Johnson crashed through the line for 6 points. Caruso converted 4 for 4 extra points for a score of 28-0.

With torrents of rain pouring down on an already drenched field, the Panthers went on to beat their formidable foe in their next contest with the Mounties, 14-6. Lightning Bob Hooper scored both times for the big Red and Blue, on two 50-yard off-tackle plays. In this weather Caruso was still able to kick 2 for 2. Montclair scored when a wet ball slithered through the hand of Felix Del Mauro as he was attempting to punt from deep in our end zone. East Orange played a strictly defensive game in the second half, kicking eight times to the Mounties.

Mounting in strength and in experience, the Panthers shut out West Side 25-0. Baskerville copped two touchdowns as he burst into their line. He also passed to Thurman Davis on the run with a pass play that covered 50 yards for a touchdown. Left-end Ed Roberts advanced a fumble for a 15-yard TD. Caruso converted 1 out

of 4.

In a field day against Orange, Cliff Baskerville led the Panthers to victory. He scored two touchdowns in that fray on short plunges. End Joe Jenkins also scored twice on a blocked punt and a fumble, and Hooper and West scored on runs of 25 yards and 43 yards respectively. Johnson scored on a quarterback sneak from the one yard line. Egidio Caruso converted 4 out of 5 and Hooper ran for 1 point. Final score, 47-0.

Columbia fell under the pressure of the well-knit East Orange squad. Quarterback Baskerville scored twice on a plunge and an 8-yard run. He also hit Davis for 16 yards to add to the score. Rellah ran 14 yards to score again, bringing the

total to 25-0.


Thanksgiving Day brought a surprising twist as the powerful Big Blue fell to the undefeated-untied Panthers by a 27-7 margin. Drives ended in scoring plays with Baskerville crashing the line for 2 TD's and Hooper scoring with a 4-yard run. Rellah plunged 6 yards to score the final TD of the season. Caruso kicked 3 out of 4 in front of a capacity crowd. Barringer scored by blocking a punt in the end zone deep in their own territory.

Twenty-three players lettered for the Panthers this year with twelve seniors playing their last high school game. The outlook is bright for next year's team as 11 lettermen are expected to return.

# Coach of The Year

In September of 1956 Dr. Donald E. Fuoss became head football coach of East Orange High School. This year, only three years later, he has brought honor to the school, to the community, and to himself by leading the Panthers to their first undefeated-untied season since 1899 and by being named the Essex-Union Counties "Coach of the Year" by the New York Sunday News.

Born in Altoona, Pennsylvania, Dr. Fuoss attended Altoona High School, where he participated in football, boxing, and wrestling, and as a senior he

was captain of the football squad.

After serving in the Army in Europe he attended Catawba College, in North Carolina, where he was an All-State center. While there, he was also president of the student government and an honor student. He was awarded his M.A. in 1948 and his Ed.D. in 1952 from Columbia University Teachers College.

From 1948 to 1952 Dr. Fuoss was coach at Bethany College, West Virginia; from 1953 to 1955 he was head coach at Shepherd College in West Virginia, where he was named "College Coach of the Year" by the West Virginia Sports Writers Association after leading his team to its first undefeated-untied season.

A modest man of many talents, Dr. Fuoss also has written a successful book, Quarterback Generalship and Strategy, and has another to be published this year. He has contributed to many professional journals and magazines. Despite his busy schedule, he still finds time to be a family man and to belong to many civic, fraternal, and professional organizations.

The student body expresses appreciation for the honor brought to the

school by its "Coach of the Year."





Suffering from a lack of height and offensive strength, the Red and Blue Five started slowly, and even a stronger finish was not sufficient to improve the final six won, ten lost record. High scorer for the season was senior Mel Brown, who rolled up 200 points in the seventeen games for an 11.8 average, followed by John Murza with 129 points, Allan Hamilton with 98, and Ronald Clark with 96 points.

Opening the season at West Side, the Pantherite squad fought a tough uphill battle, falling to the West Siders by a score of 62-44. Ronald Clark shot 16 points on East Orange's behalf, but West Side's Randy Trawick sparked his team with 30 points.

In the team's debut in our own gym, Kearny came from behind and gained 22 points in the second half to win 52-37. The Panthers' first taste of victory came in the next clash when they downed Irvington by a docket of 52-48.

Orange's Bob Melvin provided the difference in the first of the three frays with that team. Melvin scored 24 points to lead his team to a 44-34 victory.

Mel Brown capped the victorious efforts of the Panthers with 20 points in a 57-47 victory over West Orange, but the next three games saw defeat from the strong offensives of Nutley, Orange, and Montclair.

Sparked by the possibility of gaining a berth in the Essex County Tournament, the squad won three of its next four clashes, rolling over Columbia and Belleville, losing a close game to Bloomfield, and winning once more over West Orange.

In the second game with Columbia, Columbia revenged its earlier loss with a 48-39 win over the Red and Blue. In the only overtime game of the season, the Panthers eked out a 52-51 victory over the Big Blue of Barringer, but fell to Montclair once again in the regular season finale.

In the opening round of the Essex County Tournament, the Panthers drew Orange as their opponent. Orange had defeated them twice before in regular season play, and once again Bob Melvin, who led his team to the Tournament Championship, was the Panthers' nemesis as he scored 21 points to help his team eliminate East Orange from the Tournament by a score of 47-39.

With three of five starters expected to return next year, the outlook is for a more experienced team with a stronger offensive than this season.



At all times during the year, there is badminton, ping-pong, tumbling, and softball. Also, one day a week, there is bowling at the Palladium for all interested girls.


In June the G.A.A. awards, based on participation, are given at a program that takes the form of a recreation day, and new officers are installed. This brings the busy G.A.A. season to a close.





### THE SYLLABUS
















The addition to East Orange High School as the architect envisions it in 1960.
