

FOREWORD





Through those years during which we had the pleasure and privilege of being with him at East Orange High School, we came to know him and respect him. He was always enthusiastic about his work and did everything in his power to help us; for his deep concern for the students of the school we shall always be most grateful.

May we then express on these pages our heartfelt appreciation for Mr. Redman's long work for and with his students, and may we also express our regret that he was taken from us at such a high point in his career, just as he was about to become superintendent. MRS. GEORGE ROSS STARR from the Students of East Orange High School

East Orange has lost a faithful, dedicated, and hardworking member of the Board of Education in the person of Mrs. George Ross Starr. It will be very hard to replace Mrs. Starr, whose contributions of heart and mind have helped to secure the best in education for every boy and girl in East Orange. Over the years, Mrs. Starr has come to stand for and represent the highest ideals and traditions of the East Orange school system. By her perseverance and heart-warming sincerity, she has helped establish many of the unusual features of education that we enjoy today.

Mrs. Starr's association with the Board of Education started when she was appointed a member on March 7, 1938. From here, she rose to the position of vice-president on December 20, 1948. When Mr. Duke left the Board in 1953, Mrs. Starr was elected to the presidency and capably assumed his responsibilities. She also was appointed to the Board of School Estimate in 1954

after sixteen years as a Board member.


More important than Mrs. Starr's position is her genuine interest in the well-being of the pupil and the teacher. Her tireless service for the education and welfare of East Orange pupils has earned her the respect of all the citizens of this community as well as of those throughout the state. 


We regret to announce Mrs. Mazzola's death, which occurred on February 16, 1961, after the dedication had gone to press.

The Coach looks back . . .

Looking back on a hard-fought season can sometimes be painful, especially when you remember the close plays. But, on the other hand, it can also be satisfying when you recall all those outstanding moments that took a long time to realize. The 1960 campaign recalls a lot of pain as well as much joy.


This season was especially difficult since I was new to the players and they were new to me. We had to feel our way first, before the tough practice got underway. Once we came to an understanding, I tried to stress my fundamental system: that is, the basic plays, the defensive concept, and important blocking and tackling techniques. Above all, the other coaches and I tred to develop the real self-confidence necessary in any phase of life.

Recalling some of the games, the Orange encounter stands out in my mind. It was a key game in the cam-

paign, since we had already lost to Montclair and Nutley, while Orange had stung Nutley with a defeat. In the Orange game, the boys worked under pressure, but managed to pull through for us. Another key moment in 1960 was the Irvington skirmish. In that one, the younger boys got their first real test and came through with flying colors. Finally, I can't help remembering that annual Turkey Day contest with our perennial foe, Barringer. Both teams had a 6-2 record before going into the game. Harold Johnson's running, however, was just too much for the Barringer eleven. This game was a wrap-up to an interesting season.

If we can continue to build and grow on lessons learned, we can hope for an even more interesting season in 1961.

The starting five, Lenny Williams (not silhouetted on opposite page), James Clark, George Pearce, Richie Carsillo, and Charles Jackson, paced the '61 Panthers to a hard finish, capping the season by meeting Weequahic in the State Tournament. Under the able direction of Mr. Frank Milner and Mr. Malcolm Simpson, this year's Panther Five was predominately comprised of newcomers with not too much varsity experience.

Coach Milner emphasized that, despite the novices, four starters scored in double figures. Running down the starting five, he put Lenny Williams as the top scorer and key pivot man; James Clark as our key defensive player; George Pearce as the good clutch shooter; Richie Carsillo as the playmaker and outside set man; and Charles Jackson as the key rebounder.

Looking back over the tough competition, Mr. Milner recalled the Immaculate contest as a coach's dream. Our goal and foul shooting were above par while the defensive game was exceptional. In addition, the Panthers were one of the few teams to beat Immaculate, who in turn beat undefeated Scott. Another interesting skirmish which came to memory was the South Side encounter for the semi-finals of the Essex County Tournament. Although the boys lost the very tight game, they should feel proud knowing South Side went on to collect all the marbles. Finally Coach Milner recalled the second Montclair battle in which one point spelled defeat. We out-rebounded and out-shot them but a few careless mistakes were costly.







The student body showed its discernment when, in the spring of 1960, it elected for its officers Tom Geisler as president, Laura Fitzpatrick as vice-president, Rosalind Bjornson as secretary, and Annette Custode as treasurer. With such able and willing workers, the G.O. was able to expand its achievements noticeably. The more spacious meeting area in the new building also made for much more pleasant and efficient work.



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

The News, in the ranks of the top three school journals in the state, published its ten editions for the 61st successful year. With such a backlog of school history behind it, The News looks proudly to the years ahead, hoping to extend its coverage of articles reflecting the life of both school and students from classroom to athletic field.

The life of the school reporter is not an easy one. Ruth Bittner, editor-in-chief, can attest to that. Under Mr. Harold L. Krueger's direction, she and the staff put in close to thirty hours of school time between editions of the paper. Once again, The News operated on a very tight schedule which allowed only a week for the mapping of each issue.

The News operates on a staff system. The editor-inchief conducts staff meetings and aids others on copy days. The editors, Sheila Flower, Helen Kasinow, and Bill Leidemann, find and assign stories, as well as plan and proof the pages. Other staff members work under this system, contributing the scouting and typing assistance.

Copy days, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday of copy week, are the most hectic of the month. These are the days when the paper is readied for the printer. Editors and writers type stories, write captions for sections, write headlines, and drink cokes till 9:00 o'clock in the evening. On Thursday evening the wheels come to a halt, and the paper is sent to the printer. On the following Tuesday, the printer returns the proofs for lastminute corrections. Students receive their copies on Friday of that week.

In addition to the editorial staff, The News operates a business organization to distribute the paper. This group is sponsored by Dr. Risinger, and run by Dennis Smith, the student leader. All together, The News, a Columbia Scholastic Press Association member, is a credit to East

Orange High School.

New Opportunities in New Surroundings . . .

Science, in 1961, took on a new dimension at East Orange High School. With modern equipment in modern laboratories, the Department of Science has been able to make the study of science much more interesting and meaningful. Thus the science clubs have had unusual advantages in their after-school activities.

The Chemistry Club, reorganized after a period of inactivity, wrote its new constitution under the guidance of Mr. Briscoe and Mr. DeSantis. Its main purpose is to extend to students the opportunity of doing research work in the field of chemistry.

The Astronomy Club had an unusually active year. With Fred Bittel as president and Mr. Hahn as sponsor, the club members attended scientific lectures at Upsala College, Hayden Planetarium, and the Bell Telephone Laboratory, Also, individual student projects were stressed.

The Biology Club, led by Mrs. Colby, toured a pharmaceutical center and explored the Waksman Institute of Microbiology. In addition, many projects were developed.

The Science Department also offered the annual Science Fair to give the young scientists a chance for creative work. In the basic science category, Eric Curry won first prize with a study of protozoa; and Audrey Cross and Shirley Smith won the second prize with an analysis of duck bones. In the biology division the first prize went to John Young for his study of rats and mice under the influence of hormones. Second place went to Louis Hayes for his models of protozoa.

Carol Bertsch won first in the chemistry competition with the growth of crystals, while Alex Goodman and Barbara Lawrence won second with the conversion of saline water.

In the physics category Tom Geisler and Ross Lambert captured first place with electronic currents; and William Sweeney and James Pendorf took second with their project about light beams.
