Best wishes and continued success to you in whatever you may do.



ENGLISH DEPARTMENT



Under Mr. Blodgett's able guidance, the English Department is ready to help students properly use and understand the English language.






The aims and objectives of the Mathematics Department are to produce logical thinking, to give a fundamental understanding of numbers and numerical systems, and to promote a general knowledge of the fundamental algebraic and geometric processes. The courses offered by the department are algebra, plane geometry, general mathematics, trigonometry, and solid geometry.

This year preparations are being made for a new mathematics major, calculus with analytical geometry, which will be taught by Mr. LePori, the head of the Mathematics Department. This will be a college level course, good for 8 credits and meeting 10 times a week. This course will offer one year of college credit for all who complete it satisfactorily.





SOCIAL STUDIES DEPARTMENT





















During Thomas Dean's second year as coach, the Panthers once again had a winning season. It did not take Mr. Dean long to show East Orange how to play his kind of football. A two-year record of 14-3-1 bears out the virtues of his system.

Mr. Dean thinks that this is one of the most cohesive squads he has ever coached. Facts that confirm this opinion are that there were many times when the team made goal line stands and that in a total of five games they came from behind to overcome the opposing forces. There seemed to be more respect among the players on this year's team than among those on past teams.

Acknowledging the fact that East Orange had the toughest schedule in the entire state, Mr. Dean says the players did a very commendable job in compiling a 7-1-1 record. He feels that this was a team of direction, contributing quite a lot in moments when it mattered most.

The system of football which Mr. Dean brought to E. O. two years ago follows a systematic pattern. On the Freshman team, which plays an independent schedule and is coached by Mr. Patton and Mr. Tighe, the incoming frosh are taught the basic fundamentals of football. On the reserve squad, coached by Mr. Wilson, the boys are taught more complicated skills and prepared for varsity duty. This reserve squad is composed mostly of sophomores. During the season it is possible for a junior to advance to the varsity, but the chances for a sophomore are slim unless he is very outstanding. When a player reaches the final stage, varsity, he is coached by Mr. Dean himself. Since the player now has a very good background in fundamentals, it is easier for him to adjust to varsity competition.

Certainly we will remember the leadership of our captains, George Pearce and Richard Carsillo, as well as the playing of Bob Stohrer and the like. Though we are losing 12 players this year, there are 44 juniors and seniors coming back next year to form the nucleous of another great team.






Another of the co-captains, Leonard Kolm, earned


ICE HOCKEY



This year's baseball team, led by Co-Captains Richard Bender and Harold Johnson, though stripped of starters from last year's outstanding nine, still came through with a splendid season of 11 wins and 10 losses. This was the third winning season in a row for the Panthers, who have now won 29 of the last 47 contests. In this they were aided by George Pearce, Harold Johnson, and Richard Carsillo, the only returning lettermen from the 1960 State Championship Team.

George Pearce was the leading hitter with a .333 batting average. He was followed by Charles Turner, .295, and Harold Johnson, .287. Pearce also led in R.B.I.'s with 21. Johnson, the No. 1 pitcher, pitched 90 innings, compiling a 7 and 4 record with a 2.34

earned run average. Johnson's career mark shows 14 wins and 6 losses.

Though the team was inexperienced, it developed in time to be considered one of the county's best. For example, George Pearce was commended for his playing by being chosen for the first team All-County and third team All-State. For the first time in 21 years East Orange was selected to play in the Greater Newark Tournament, losing to Linden, the finalists, in the opening round.

With this year's experience behind them, the Red and Blue should have a strong team next season although pitching may be a question mark. All in all, 1962 should prove interesting for the East Orange Nine and for Coaches Von Stetten and Cummens.


NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY


