




#### MR. RONALD BRISCOE



The primary goal of the mathematics department is to make every student a competent user of mathematics he can and will use in his life and career. Specifically, our objectives are: (1) to provide every student with facility in the basic skills of arithmetic, algebra and geometry, (2) to develop facility in the conversion of a practical situation into a form suitable for mathematical treatment, (3) to provide a firm foundation for further study of mathematics, and (4) to dispel the general fear of quantitative thinking framed in mathematical language. The twelve courses offered by the department are designed to fulfill these aims.

In the present international scientific marathon it is imperative that extra effort be extended toward providing earlier and better training for those students who have possibilities of making original contributions in their chosen fields. It is for these students that the Advanced Placement Program in Mathematics was instituted this year. The program consists of a full year course in the Calculus and related Analytic Geometry which parallels the course now given in many colleges. It is achievement in this course for which advanced placement and credit is given by the colleges.

During the freshman year the business student is introduced to a basic course called Business Training. This course gives an understanding of how businesses operate and an appreciation of the relationship between business and the community. In the sophomore, junior, and senior years more emphasis is placed upon special interests of the student. In the senior year the students have an opportunity to develop skills studied earlier. It is equally important for business students to know how to act properly in a business office; therefore, our Office Training course includes lessons on how to apply for a job, what to wear at an interview, how to get along with fellow workers, and how to behave in an office.

The city of East Orange is rapidly becoming the home of many business concerns and along with our neighboring community, Newark, affords employment to scores of people who are trained in accounting, typewriting, and stenography. The Department of Business Education provides the necessary courses for students preparing for business careers. Students who seriously apply themselves can step into office positions after graduation without studying additional subjects at business school or college.


Appreciation of musical masterpieces through participation is the main objective of the Vocal Music Department.

Driver Education is composed of the classroom phase and the Behind-the-Wheel phase. Classroom instruction deals with driver attitudes and physical characteristics: the motor vehicle in modern life, rules of the road, laws of physics related to driving, the automobile and its maintenance, good pedestrian practices, and the development of driving skills.

Behind-the-Wheel instruction includes teacher demonstrations and pupil practice in starting, steering, shifting gears, making turns, stopping, backing, and parking. Beginning under simple conditions, instruction progresses until the student acquires reasonable skill in driving on (1) urban streets and open highways with efficiency, poise, and confidence, (2) in accord with rules of the road and with the laws of physics related to driving, and (3) in a manner that indicates a desire on the student's part to show courteous consideration for pedestrians and other drivers and for the occupants of his vehicle.



For the second time in three years, the Panthers captured the State Sectional Group IV Championship by defeating a strong Nutley High School in the finals of the State-sponsored Tournament.

The Panthers were paired against powerful Montclair High in the quarter-finals of the State Tournament, and won by an 8-4 tally. In the semi-finals, East Side of Newark fell by the same score. The coveted State Title came to East Orange as a result of the come-from-behind victory over Nutley.

The team also was the third EO baseball squad in succession to turn in a winning record.

Led by captains George Pearce and Richard Carsillo, the team began the season by losing four of the first five games, but then proceeded to capture the next nine contests in succession.


It must be said that the 1962 Panthers will go down as one of the outstanding baseball teams in the history of the school.





Baseball coach Von Stetten presents the Group IV Sectional Championship Trophy to Principal Mr. Loesch.



### Essex County Champions

The Panthers, led by a nucleus of underclassmen, highlighted a successful season by winning the coveted Essex County Group III and IV Championship in a meet sparkled with record-breaking performances.


John Freeman, later to become the State Champion in the 180 yard low hurdles, tied in the low and high hurdles with marks of 19.1 and 14.1 seconds respectively. Quincy Yarborough shattered a 14-year-old school record in the shot-put by rocketing the iron sphere 55'6½". Combined with superb performances by senior captain John Johnson, Juniors Paul Carey, Tom Jackson, and Berkely Brown, and Sophomore sensation Reggie Henry, the Panthers supressed powerful Montclair, Millburn, and twelve other schools for the crown of track supremacy in Essex County. As Coach Charles Brennan remarked, "It was gratifying to see a team that has worked so diligently throughout the year co-ordinate its strength and power and gain for the team the recognition it so well deserves."

For the first time in the schools history a mile relay was sent to the Penn Relay Carnival in Philadelphia. This team, paced by captain John Johnson, placed second in its class and received individual awards. This same team later set a mile relay record of 3 min. 31 sec. in the Orange Relays held at Colombia High School.

The season record showed the Panthers were victorious in five duals and three triangular meets and suffered defeat in one dual meet.





### Big Ten Champs


