









#### "100 Years of Memories . . . '

It was only 100 years ago that four square miles of the Eastern part of the City of Orange was separated to form the City of East Orange. It is hard to imagine, when we look around our city today, that it was once a small farm town of only 3,000 people. Since that time in 1863 the face of East Orange has certainly changed. Buses now travel the routes where Indian corn once grew. Our City's first newspaper, The East Orange Gazette, reported one of the first uses of the telephone, a convenience which has always been a part of our lives. This year, as we celebrate the East Orange Centennial, we cannot help but feel proud of the changes and improvements made in these 100 years. Modern structures such as the Garden State Parkway, the new addition to East Orange High School, and the many luxury apartments which line East Orange streets are just a few of our City's recent improvements. We've also to be proud of East Orange's reputation for being the cleanest city in the country. But in the next 100 years there should be even more changes in East Orange, for the City has many plans for the future. There are several urban renewal programs now in progress, and many private and public buildings are under construction. And, perhaps, the greatest project for the future is the East-West Freeway, which will make East Orange the cross-roads of New Jersey.



#### "Forever in Our Memories . . . "



"Mr. Robinson was a gentle, friendly teacher and an honest, sincere man. Our school is less for his loss." These words from Mr. Loesch eloquently sum up the feelings of all of us who knew Mr. George B. Robinson, late head of the history department, during his nineteen years at East Orange High School. The student body wishes to pay tribute to this man whose patience and sympathy, dedication to teaching, and desire to help others will long be remembered. Students knew him as an understanding teacher possessed of the rare ability to make his subject come alive. He was always an experimenter, constantly using novel, vivid ways of making history interesting. Born August 3, 1900, in Moorestown, New Jersey, Mr. Robinson attended Rutgers University and graduated in 1923, where he earned his Litt. B. He received his M.A. from Columbia University in 1938. As a person, Mr. Robinson was a direct, reliable man with a rich sense of humor. As Mr. Loesch remembered "his humor was so subtle you always had to watch closely to see if he was serious or not." Though gentle with everyone around him, this man was a quiet crusader for what he believed in; his kindness by no means prevented him from being frank. Mr. Robinson has always stood high in the esteem of his students and colleagues. Like history, he was a part of our past, and in that sense, as well as in a personal sense, he will continue to influence our futures.



#### "The minds that guide us . . . "

A body—the shape and structure of anything—a pattern—a manner or method—the ideal or intrinsic value of anything—conduct regulated by custom—orderly arrangement—physical and mental condition! Each is a definition of form, one of the two key words in the theme Forms of the Future.





#### "the tools of mathematics . . .

The Mathematics Department's objective is to enable each student to use competently the tools of mathematics in his everyday life and career. Specifically, its goals are: (1) to provide every student with facility in the basic skills of arithmetic, algebra and geometry, (2) to develop facility in the conversion of a practical situation into a form suitable for mathematical treatment, (3) to provide a firm foundation for further study of mathematics, and (4) to dispel the general fear of quantitative thinking framed in mathematical language. The department offers twelve courses to achieve these aims. To keep pace with the advancing Space Age, the mathematics department is in its second year of offering an Advanced Placement program. Allowed to enter only by invitation, the student studies calculus and related analytical geometry, the equivalents of a college freshman course. In May, those students who choose to do so, take an examination which, if passed, qualifies them to take sophomore year college mathematics upon entering college. Another new and stimulating addition to the curriculum this year is Math V and VI covering matrix algebra and probability.

To fulfill this objective, the Social Studies Department is continually modifying its teaching methods and expanding its established courses. New programs, such as the Problems of American Democracy, instituted this year, are periodically added to further enlighten the student. Under a modified team-teaching approach, students are rotated among several teachers, each of whom teaches a particular field. Other new programs include a series of lectures by visiting experts, an Americanization course for foreign students, and a Labor-Management Forum. 

## "to develop poise, self confidence,



The reason for the varied courses of study in the Speech Department is a basic one: "to develop poise, self confidence, and a sense of security in front of people in and out of class, thereby putting the student more at ease in his school, home, and social experiences." Out of this objective stem the many areas of study which must be explored in order to allow the individual student to gain the experience necessary in expressing himself freely and without hesitation. Topics which pertain to, or are equal to, actual situations in life are especially useful. They are practical as well as stimulating and serve the students as a guide for situations which may one day confront them. For example, a job interview, a career talk, taking notes during an interview, and a lecture forum are a few of the many interesting assignments planned. In the more advanced stages of speech, a course in play production is introduced. This is a "study of the more important aspects of the theater." It includes everything and everyone from the actors down to the stage crew. The phases of the theater are explored even further by Buskin and Brush, the Speech Department-sponsored dramatics club, which this year presented a thought-provoking interpretation of Thornton Wilder's "Our Town". As a final task, the speech student is presented with an extremely soul-searching question, which is "what do I want out of life?" Certain achievements are always dreamed of. These accomplishments may be judged only by what they yield. The accomplishments of the speech department were well expressed by Mr. Mohn, head of the department, who said, "those accomplishments were the unseen harvests."

#### "from clay to paints, from wood to textiles . . .



Our Department of Driver Education is very busy educating our teenagers for a lifetime of safe and enjoyable automobile driving. By 1970 there will be more than 100 million drivers in this country. By 1970 there will be three cars on the road for every two now in use. Despite vast highway building programs, the future will bring extremely heavy traffic concentrations, especially in and around East Orange which is a corridor city in a corridor state. Our teenagers will find themselves exposed to dangerous situations more frequently than ever before in the history of the automobile. During the next ten years there will be greater need for orderly, disciplined, careful, and safe driving. In fact, in order to survive in the complex traffic situations of the future, our students here at East Orange High must develop a pride in high standards of performance and conduct in the use of the automobile, and our complete course of 30 hours classroom instruction and 6 hours Behind-the-Wheel instruction is our greatest hope of avoiding or at least coping with the traffic chaos that appears to be destined for the future.





#### "applying intelligence to practical problems . .

Plato wrote: "A sound mind in a sound body." We of the Industrial Arts Department believe that this wise principle is too often disregarded. One of our major aims is to bring about a fusion of these two qualities—we feel that we are following the trend in modern education towards training in practical as well as academic skills. Building a table or making a radio requires not only manual technique but also training in applying intelligence to practical problems. Neither of these factors should be overemphasized: both are essential to modern living. In order to achieve these aims we are constantly revamping our program. Tentative new courses for next year include an automotives major and a course in electronics. Both of these are in response to requests from students who have displayed increasing interest in industrial arts. Last year our limited facilities caused us to reject over 100 potential students. We hope that by presenting an interesting and varied program we can keep pupils in school who might otherwise become dropouts as well as help all our students lead full and satisfying lives.



The teachers in the Home Economics Department believe that homemaking is a profession which requires careful preparation and consistent training if it is to be carried on effectively. Each of the teachers in the Department is dedicated to train girls in becoming well-adjusted in their future homes. The homemaking experiences offered in school should develop constructive attitudes toward personal, home, and community living. An informal, homelike atmosphere is maintained within the department as a setting for the various learnings; this setting contributes toward a more satisfying view of home and family living. This year the modern living classes are being taught from a new study guide written for the State Department of Education by one of our own Home Economics teachers-Miss Rudes. Another experiment new to the Home Economics classes is the application of the Concept Method, which is a new way to teach Home Economics. An old but popular attraction is the annual May fashion show, in which many students demonstrate their sewing ability by modeling clothing which they had made in class.


For the first time in its history, East Orange High School produced a football team which fought its way to an undisputed state championship. The 1963 squad swept to nine consecutive victories against the best competition New Jersey had to offer. Head Coach Tom Dean brought his four-year record at E.O. to a very impressive 30-4-2. The coach was proud of the fact that enough boys were interested in the game this year to field five full teams. The varsity season began with a hard fought 13-6 victory over Belleville. Next came three successive wins over Nutley, St. Benedict's, and Irvington, by scores of 20-0, 33-14, and 33-7 respectively. These triumphs set the stage for New Jersey's "Game of the Year." Undefeated Montclair travelled to Martens Stadium to challenge undefeated East Orange. In a gruelling defensive battle, the Cats scored two touchdowns in the second half to down their old nemesis, 13-7. The Panthers had little time to rest on their laurels, however, for the next week highly-rated Phillipsburg paid a call on East Orange. The Cats made two first quarter scores stand up for a 12-6 win, and thus won their second "must" game in a row. Finishing the campaign on the road, the Red and Blue made short work of Orange, Columbia, and Barringer. The season was capped by the 33-6 romp over the Big Blue. At the year's end, the squad was chosen State Champions by the Saylor ratings, Newark News, and Newark Star Ledger. Coach Dean was selected "Coach of the Year" in the Star Ledger, and Jim Oliver, Quincey Yarborough, George Coppola, and Gaylord George were picked as All-Staters in both newspapers.





Senior Reggie Henry was the best crosscountry runner produced in the history of East Orange High School. During this season, Reggie established four new records: West Park Record—12:09; Branch Brook Park (Big Ten) -12:50; Essex County-12:42; and East Orange High School Record - 12:09. This year's team was an all-senior one, and was expected to go all the way, but due to certain circumstances, it was denied the opportunity of the state championship title. The Big Ten standing at the end of the season was fourteen wins and four losses. The team was seeded second with West Orange in the Big Ten Conference. The team was upset by Bloomfield in the first round of the Essex County Tournament. In the first round of the State Tournament, Livingston fell to the Panthers. In the second round, though, Central came out on top—45 to 39. Many teams feared Bill Lovett and set up their defenses accordingly, to deal with his deadly break away lay-ups. When this occurred, Mr. Milner would set up the offense around Tim Lewis who would put in jump-shots from the outside. Tim started out slow, averaging only six to eight points per game in the beginning of the season. Then he began to hit, averaging twelve to sixteen points a game. 



The outcome of the Long Branch relays afforded Coach Charles Brennan a great satisfaction. The relays took place on a bitter cold day, with a biting wind whipping across the field. The relay team, composed of John Freeman, Tom Jackson, Fred Hoggard, and Berkley Brown, came in first in both the 440 and the 880 that afternoon. 

For the fourth successive year the Panthers turned in a winning season. In a bid for two straight State Sectional Championships, the charges of Coach Wayne Von Stetten lost in the semi-finals of the State Tournament to Bloomfield by a 3-1 count. Led by Captain Jim Greene, East Orange turned in ten wins in eighteen contests during the regular season. Over all, the final season's tally was eleven wins and ten losses. 
