## SOCIAL STUDIES

The Social Studies department brings the student closer to his own roots as an American and a citizen of the world. American History, World History, Civics-Geography, World Geography, and Modern Living offer a diversified program which covers, as nearly as possible every phase of history. New courses such as "Underdeveloped Areas of the NonWestern World" serve to bring this ideal even closer to reality.

## FOREIGN LANGUAGES

Our modern world is an ever growing place. New nations are emerging by the day, each bringing with it another language to be elevated to global importance. Communication is thus made even more difficult for those people who can speak but one language.

We, as Americans, are grossly unprepared to enter upon the world scene. Where approximately one-half of the Europeans speak two or more languages, less than one-twentieth of us do. The knowledge imparted to the student and the exercise in the use of abstract ideas prepare the individual for a fuller life, regardless of his plans.

## MATHEMATICS

The Mathematics Department offers a wide range of courses designed to meet the needs of all the students. The general courses allow the high school student to gain a solid basis in mathematics without going on to a four-year college course. Although familiarity with mathematical operations is stressed, the course also gives the student a glimpse of other areas of math.

Students who plan to enter college may take advantage of a wide variety of courses. Beginning with algebra, the student progresses to geometry, trigonometry, and theory of equations. A special course in probability and statistics is also offered to interested juniors. In the senior year there is an honors course devoted to calculus. The course, which meets ten times a week, acquaints the student with such esoteric topics as integration and differentiation. For seniors who do not wish to take calculus, a comprehensive course is offered which includes an overall treatment of algebra, trigonometry, and calculus. College students can obtain a solid background in mathematics that will stand them in good stead.
