
MATHEMATICS

their presence is known. Clean, white walls and matching uniforms. Smells of food in the halls. Bright orange chairs. Offices. All working.









It is most evident that our generation and our class perceive the greatness of our responsibilities and our rallying to support this new responsibility is commendable.


This burdensome responsibility that we bear upon our shoulders is the knowledge that we, not the future generation will either bring about a new concept to America or America will not be.

One of the outstanding highlights of this year has been the Black and White Student Exchange Program with Fair Lawn High School. Fair Lawn High, a white suburban school, is located in north New Jersey and has a student population equivalent in number to that of EOHS.

The Black-White Exchange was unique in the Student Exchange Program, in that there were a series of exchanges instead of one. The goal to be achieved was the lifting of the barrier in communication between blacks and whites. The last visit to Fair Lawn included an enlightening Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial. The participants of the program were all from East Orange High School.

Under the enthusiastic leadership of President Tamara Mingo, the Student Council executed several extremely successful projects. Pep rallies for both football and basketball seasons; Thanksgiving Food Drive; Local and State Student Council Conferences; Homecoming; Fashion Show; and the basketball concession stand were all under the auspices of the Council.

Of those fund raising events was the popular "A Snow Ball" dance, whose proceeds were shared by the Student Council and the senior class. Another successful and novel affair was the "Carnival Dance" for the benefit of the junior class. Held on April Fools' Day, it provided dancing in a carnival atmosphere, complete with game booths and prizes.

The major accomplishment of this year's Council was the initiation of the long-awaited student lounge. Established on the experimental basis, the study halls, for the first time, became co-ed. With the former boys' side of the cafeteria as a study hall and the former girls' side as a recreation room, with a soundproof partition dividing them, the long-hoped for objective of integrating a studying atmosphere with that of relaxation was achieved.

As a result of these and many other undertakings of the Student Council, its purposes of supplying an invigorating, educational and entertaining student life, and of building strong leadership characteristics in its members are attained.



Responsible for informing the student body on the current happenings of the school, the East Orange High School News has adequately fulfilled its responsibility. Issued once a month, each involves a complicated routine. Starting with assignment day, the stories are then written, submitted, and are edited on copy day. Galley day, a few days later, is a last minute check on the copy returned from the printer.

Each of the editors started at the bottom of the ladder, commonly called tyro. After three issues of work and accomplishment, the tyro is appointed to the position of reporter. After six more issues, the rank of star reporter is given to him. In March of his junior year, he and other juniors are considered for the six editorial posts for the following year.

The *News* gives a person the opportunity in writing stories, thus they become experienced in the field of journalism.





Who taught us to follow thine every will





Each year, during the month of June, hundreds of boys and girls convene on the campuses of Rutgers, New Brunswick and Douglass College, respectively, for the Boys' and Girls' State program. Sponsored by the American Legion and its Auxiliary; Boys' and Girls' State serves as a learning ground of governmental processes for the chosen representatives.

Each day includes a lecture on the various branches of government; from local to state and legislative to executive. These provide the knowledge and the tools necessary for the student to campaign and become elected to one of over a hundred positions in his model government. ARTS INCORPORATED

An in depth exploration of the five senses has been the primary objective of Arts' Incorporated this year. Formerly Buskin and Brush, the club has been examining current trends in the arts to determine its future course. In a successful attempt to break away from the bonds of traditional theatre, Arts' Incorporated experimented with the idea of using improvisations.

Improvisations are the result of setting up situations and acting within them without scripts. The actors are not informed as to what they are supposed to be, or supposed to say. Therefore, they must rely on their own response to what is presented by fellow actors. This allows the individual to interact through all senses to develop confidence in himself as an actor.

Most improvisations are not long, however, some are developed into full length plays. "Impromptu," by Tad Mosel, and "The Interview," by Jean-Claude Van Itallie, were the two one-act plays presented by this thespian organization.

"Impromptu" concerns four actors who were summoned by a non-appearing stage manager. They make an appearance at a designated theatre, put on an imaginary production for an imaginary audience.

"The Interview" allows four interviewers and four applicants to reveal themselves in an interview, on the street, at a party, and at a political rally. The play raises the question of what happens to a person when his attempts at verbal communication fall on deaf ears.

Arts' Incorporated realizes the countless modes of communication, and experiments with film and verbal and non-verbal means of communication are on the agenda for the future.


HOMECOMING QUEEN


STATE CHAMPS FOOTBALL



Back to back State Champs. Is it possible that Coach Dean has yet one more championship up his sleeve?













