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



The years spent here in E.O.H.S. will truly and understandably be an experience we all shall remember. One day we will all look back and think and say . . .















Today, education challenges each individual. If he cannot meet this challenge his chance for success and happiness are greatly reduced. Today, a higher education has become a necessary part of life.


Here at E.O.H.S., we meet this challenge head on and usually conquer it.

ENGLISH


The English Department in any school plays a major part in shaping the student's future success. English is the most commonly spoken and written language we know in this country. To master the language is a giant stride forward.

The English Department also offers courses in Better Writing, Modern Literature, Journalism and the Humanities class. Each course strives to enrich the awareness and character of the student.









HISTORY

The aim of teaching History is to get the student to think logically. There is much activity in the world today which requires reasoning in depth to understand the two sides of every decision, which has been and is currently being made. By studying the past and relating it to the present, the student will recognize parallels in History — some

good, some bad — worth noting.

The History Department reaches to all students in all courses of study. World History traces world heritage. The student is exposed to man's constant struggle for all forms of freedom, from times before United States was born. Civics-Geography teaches the student the working federal offices and the responsibilities he has as a citizen. The student also learns about maps, charts, and the influence of the earth's surface and climate. World Geography is a study of the world and its problems as they exist today. The student can't understand these problems without knowing what influences them.

An elective open to upperclassmen is Afro-Asian History. This course studies little known areas of Africa and Asia and the social, political and cultural ideas of the people in their countries.

U. S. History 1 and 2 are required by state law. The subject is the economic, political and social problems of this country since the colonies were established to the present positions. In Advanced Placement History 1 and 2 this same idea is followed, but the discussions dépend upon the participation readings of the student on the level of college freshmen.

Modern Living classes are offered to young men and to help them understand the social problems

today and the need for self respect.

The Science Department offers four years of complete study in that field.


Basic Science gives the student information in three areas of the sciences including biology, physics, and chemistry.



The Mathematics Department offers courses to aid the student in any chosen field.


The general course develops the student's previous knowledge of mathematics and gives him the basic skills needed to compete in today's business


INDUSTRIAL ARTS




ACTIVITIES


The Booster Club helps capture the spirit of the football games. They march to the stadium and sit on the fifty yard line and urge them on.








The scoring of cross country is slightly different from the usual point system. Each team's first five runners are given points to the place he finishes. Therefore, the team with the lowest score is the victor.


BOWLING








BASEBALL
