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
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

In accordance with established tradition, we, the freshmen of 1944, were considered by the upperclassmen of that important year to be the smallest, both mentally and physically, of any that ever entered the halls of Scott. However, regardless of their opinion of our poor selves, they did admire our legs so enthusiastically that they requested all freshmen boys to roll up their trousers above the knees.

It would be easy to fill this account of our class of '48 with many other such happenings, but we feel that an accounting of our contribution to our society and our nation are more important. During our first two years at Scott our nation was engaged in the Second World War. With the rest of our school we supported the War Bond and War Stamp Sales, the Penny-A-Week and Red Cross Drives, the Save-A-Child Fund and the other worthwhile causes. In our freshman year we could not understand fully the meaning and effect of this war, nor could we recount philosophically just why we gave our money and time. Yet there was real meaning behind our giving—we gave because we felt, even if we did not completely understand, the larger issues at stake. We were stirred when we heard or read the war reports, saw pictures of devastation, or watched our older

brothers and their friends enlist. We were made thoughtful by the tales of their experiences when they returned, or when another gold star was added to the growing number on the Service Flag of our school.

But there were lighter moments and lighter moods as well. The class of '48 was the first to enjoy a Freshman Party which has now become a traditional festivity of that group. It was planned and given by the upperclassmen, and through their efforts was a great success. Our Town was the play of the freshman year; Romeo and Juliet and The Male Animal tied for honors the next year. The first Scott dance we attended was the Sophomore Dance of 1944; then followed the Junior and Senior Proms. Between these dances the days were brightened by "R" Parties, Pig Skin Hops, concerts by the Voice and Instrumental Departments, and bonfires to celebrate the pre-Thanksgiving football games with Orange High School. Other events were Cheer Fund parties, assembly programs like the Strawbridge Ballet and Abe Lincoln in Illinois, as well as panel discussions of world problems and inter-faith programs at Thanksgiving and Easter.

Of course the most important and thrilling event of our sophomore year was the end of the war. Like all the rest of the world we

had listened to the speeches of politicians who promised a quick return to normalcy and the establishment of a lasting peace. This we hoped would result without too much effort on the part of John Q. Public or of Johnny, Jr. But in the short span of time between the end of the war and today the unreality of such thinking has been shown to the whole world-and to us. Here at Scott we have become aware of the active part we must play if the future is to live up to its promise. And we believe that in our small way we have contributed to that better understanding between peoples needed in a democratic world. We have done this not only through such extra-curricular activities as the Student Federalist Club, but through discussions "to get to the bottom of things" in our study of P.A.D., debates before assemblies, and the practice of democratic proceedings in the Student Council and class meetings. Perhaps this contribution may not seem very great, but when we remember that seniors of '48 are going in the future to exert great influence on the communities in which they live, the importance of this training becomes evident.

For the benefit of the members of the class who many years from now may be straining nostalgically to recall the events of their life at Scott, here is a brief resume of the happenings of the last two years: the Junior Prom, P.A.D., the tenth anniversary celebrations, trips to see movies, plays, and operas in New York, Stage Door and Minick (both school plays), and the traditional annual football game with Orange. This game, with its pep meeting and bonfire, always marks the close of Scott's football year. Yes-the figures show that Orange won every game played during our four years at Scott, but figures are cold and do not tell the whole story. Often the school spirit in the halls of our school declared a moral victory even though the statistics registered defeat!

Another important reflector of the Scotty spirit was *The Bagpipe*. Editorials were frequently controversial, but always interesting. The most-read part of the paper, however, was the "Piper," a column that collected personal items and revealed the informal side of school life.

The crowning social event of the class of '48 was the Senior Dance. We owe many thanks to Mrs. Warbasse, our adviser, for helping us plan this festivity, and for all her guidance throughout the years.

In addition to these big events there were the many small, frivolous, funny—sometimes pathetic—things that happened every day. Yet it is such things that are remembered

long after the date when the Normans invaded England is forgotten. At first there were the attempts at initiation by upperclassmen when we were freshmen; later there were free passes to the big show in Room 109, directions to the swimming pool, and to the elevator to the third floor. There was the game of trying to memorize everybody else's locker combination and in the effort forgetting our own. There were the home room opening exercises, and our first introduction to the intricacies of governing ourselves through the Student Council. There were homework and library assignments that kept us busy in the study halls and at night in Doddtown and Ampere. Not long after we entered, however, the class fell into two groups-those who were to remain in school only for a while, and those who caught on to responsibility and found fun in the hard work of learning to become adults.

The subjects we studied will be remembered with nostalgia too. With history we associate dates, Mrs. Warbasse, Miss Sharpe, Mr. Miller, and Henry VIII; with English, grammar, Shakespeare, "The Admiral," "The Cloak," and iambic pentameter; with math that elusive X, "Put that pencil down," and "Buzz"; with Spanish, Cortez, various ways of bull-fighting, and the Spanish Temperament; with French, Sermons, La Belle France. and the knack of saving tres bien instead of tres beans; with typing, mangled fingers and broken machines; with bookkeeping, columns, debits, ink; with Latin, our boy Julius and our Miss Fison; with chemistry, aromas, and valences; with P.A.D., scumps, term papers, and near suicides. The rest we omit only because the seniors themselves can fill in the blanks when Junior's grandson pulls grandpa's yellowing diploma out from among those funny clothes with the old look and unwraps it from the newspapers carrying a story about the people who thought a thing called the atom bomb was going to end the world way back in 1948.

Now at graduation we are separating, the advice and speeches of our elders salted away. Those who have gone before have presented their challenge. It is the same challenge that has been handed down from generation to generation, and it has never yet been met. That can come about only when one generation will dare to answer that call—the call from a world desperately seeking a brotherhood of man. We, the seniors of 1948 at Clifford Scott, can only hope that we shall succeed where our predecessors have faltered. And with faith that through God and our own efforts we can succeed, we step forward cheerfully into a new life and a new world.




Other outstanding players were Tom Trethaway, defensive guard, and Art Kent, tackle.

• The Student Council is made up of a President and Vice-President who are elected by the entire student body, an elected representative from each home room, and the chairmen of any committees set up under the Council. There are several projects which the Student Council has undertaken which exemplify the spirit of good-will and fellowship the Council helps bring about. 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
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
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
