## Saturday gridiron activities provided excitement for all,

Scott's 1959 football team produced a $3-6$ record, but the showing was certainly no disgrace. The Scotties had their ups and downs throughout the season, and the near upset of unbeaten Rahway showed the Scarlet's ability.

Coach Walter Williams made a successful debut as head mentor in Scott's $25-6$ victory over a reportedly improved Valley squad. Halfback Frank De Miro and quarterback Ronnie Yarashefski provided the offensive spark. The Scottie eleven displayed great speed in this game and in the West Orange encounter.

Trailing 7-0 at the half to a rugged West Orange team, Scott downed the Cowboys, 14-7, with inspired second-half play. De Miro and Rudy Picardi tallied the touchdowns for Scott in the third and fourth quarters. Picardi recovered a West Orange fumble and raced 55 yards to even the game. De Miro's score came on a one-yard plunge, putting Scott in the lead. West Orange completed a pass play after Scott's final touchdown, and the receiver broke clear of the entire Scott defense for what appeared to be a certain Cowboy score. However, Frank De Miro overhauled the ball-carrier, stopping him with a flying tackle on the Scarlet's five-yard line and preventing a possible tie.

Going to Dover with a $2-0$ record and impressive showings on both offense and defense in its opening encounters, Scott ran head-on into a bigger and better Farmer eleven. Injuries to some first-stringers began to be felt as Dover tumbled the Scotties, 33-0. It has to be said that the Scarlet probably played its poorest game of the season.

Up against an undefeated Summit team that was headed for the Suburban Conference championship, Scott surprised everyone by taking a $13-0$ lead in the second quarter. But rallies by Summit in the second half and the running of half-
back Darnell Mallory combined to hand Coach Williams's team its second setback, 27-13.

Traveling to Rahway the next week and playing on a rain-soaked field, the Scarlet came very close to upsetting the unbeaten Group IV forces before falling 13-6. On two occasions Frank De Miro's electrifying runbacks of punts were called back because of clipping penalties.

Scott invaded Millburn in an effort to snap its losing streak, but to no avail. Battling in a continuous rain on a muddy gridiron, the Scotties gained a 7-6 halftime edge. Early in the third quarter, however, the Millers tallied on a long run from scrimmage and went on to victory, 19-7. Scott's passing attack, with quarterback Yarashefski throwing, clicked for good vardage. The lone Scarlet score came when De Miro skirted his left end on a short scamper.

In the following game the Scotties lost to a mediocre Verona eleven by a disappointing 19-6 score. The Hillbillies were in command after a scoreless first period with their quarterback, Doug Gaffney, standing out on offense. In the third quarter, Frank De Miro went over from the fourteenyard line of Verona for the team's only touchdown.

Giving à peak offensive and defensive performance, Scott demolished Roselle Park, 34-0. De Miro scored three times for the Scarlet with John Bancroft and Al Del Tufo getting the other two six-pointers. In this game the Scotties could do no wrong, and the prospects for a Livingston victory appeared favorable.

However, with Don McKay, Essex County scoring champion, leading the Lancers, Livingston whipped the Scotties, 19-13, in the closing game of the season. Buddy Harris quarterbacked the team, with Yarashefski and De Miro at the halfback positions and Rudy Picardi at fullback.

## In winter the Cagers took the spotlight, . . .

Unfortunately the Scottie basketball team could not defend its Group II Section II title this year because Scott has become a Group III school. Although the hoopsters failed to win the sectional title in its new group, Coach Lyons' boys compiled a 15-7 mark.

With a balanced squad and better reserve strength than last year, Scott won its first five games of the season. The Scotties looked very impressive in their victories over Passaic Valley and West Orange. However, in the next game the team could do little on Bloomfield's home court, and the Bengals handed Scott its first defeat. After downing Bloomfield Tech and Roselle Park, and losing to Millburn, the Scarlet met Livingston, one of the better teams in Essex County. The Lancers fell, 49-36, and Scott established itself as a strong prospect for the Essex County Tournament. Bruzzy Wood scored 27 points for the Scarlet.

The cagers easily trounced a tall Harrison five, 53-33. Looking for revenge after last year's loss to Valley, the Scotties played a sound game but again succumbed, 56-54. Following a solid win over Irvington Tech, a game in which Tech's high-scoring Gene Divorkin was held under fifteen points, Scott lost to Immaculate Conception. Immaculate pulled away in the final minutes of the game after Scott had kept pace most of the way. The team's shooting was sub-
par in this game, partly because of Immaculate's very small gym.

The highlight of the season was the Scarlet's thrilling upset of powerful North Arlington, 49-43, in which Jim Liggins played his best game of the season. The 6-4 center outrebounded the Vikings and was one of the game's leading scorers. Verona invaded Scott next, and the Hillbillies came away limping after suffering a 65-47 drubbing. Jim Larsen, the Scotties' high point man for the season, tallied 24 points in leading the team to victory.

In the Essex County Tournament, the Lyonsmen played a fine South Side five in a low-scoring affair. The 1960 tournament was the most exciting in its history with the Scott-South Side game providing plenty of excitement. The Streaks defeated Scott, 39-37, in a well-played, bitterly-fought contest.

Closing out the regular season with wins over Barringer and Madison and a loss to Columbia, the Scotties drew Springfield Regional in the state tournament. The combination of a good Regional team and a mediocre Scott performance resulted in defeat.

Since most of the squad will return next year, the outlook for the future is most impressive. However, the loss of high scorers Bruzzy Wood and Jim Larsen, who was selected to the All-Orange team, will be felt. Returning in 1961 are Dick Williams, Herb Cohen, Jim Ruhnke, Jim Liggins, Buddy Harris, Chris Kinum, and Richie Williams.

There the girls learn the principles of good nutrition and meal planning as well as the mechanics of making a delicious cake. Our cooks must have the precision of a chemist when it comes to measuring, weighing, and timing, for too much or too little seasoning, and too much or too little cooking can ruin the best of meals.

Economics is important in clothing because good material is expensive, so are good clothes. Our girls learn to be fashion plates on a budget. As in cooking and chemistry, precision is necessary for a seamstress. She must know where to place her pattern and how to put in zippers and button holes. Good taste and judgment are as much a part of this course as operating a sewing machine.

Strength is an important characteristic of a printer. He must lift and maneuver heavy equipment. Again precision comes in, this time along with artistry, because a printer makes judgments about the appropriateness of type face. Our printing staff turns out bulletins and programs for special activities at Scott.
